# Application Narrative Grant Introduction (Executive Summary)

1.1 Briefly describe the organization and program operation. Provide a high level summary to the intent of the application and how it will affect the local community. (500 words or less)

The Regional Auto Crimes Team (ReACT) Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional, bi-lingual law enforcement unit in the San Antonio Police Department. It is composed of officers from the San Antonio Police Department (SAPD), the Bexar County Sheriff's Office (BCSO), and the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB). Together the task force has 25 law enforcement officers with extensive training in auto theft investigations. Most task force members have attended basic and intermediate auto theft investigation training, including complex crimes training and title fraud training. The ReACT Task Force combines resources, intelligence and conserves both fiscal and investigative resources for the city and the county.

The ReACT Task Force proposes to reduce vehicle crimes throughout Bexar County and the surrounding areas by collaborating with law enforcement agencies within Bexar County and the surrounding counties by conducting covert operations, surveillance, salvage yard and business inspections and sharing intelligence of prolific offenders.

The ReACT Task Force and the National Insurance Crime Bureau agent work closely together by providing intelligence information, leads and working as a liaison for insurance companies.

The REACT Task Force provides assistance to various law enforcement agencies and other departments within the San Antonio Police Department to identify suspects involved in motor vehicle thefts and provide assistance in the recovery of stolen vehicles and stolen property. The task force also provides investigative and technical assistance to agencies within our service area on auto theft, vehicle burglaries and insurance fraud cases.

The ReACT Task Force serves the community needs by combating vehicle crimes through the investigation of motor vehicle

#### **Grant Problem Statement**

2.1 Provide an assessment of the motor vehicle burglary (including theft of parts) problem in the coverage area of this application.



In 2016, the San Antonio Police Department received 18,018 burglary of a motor vehicle reports, a 26.93% increase from 2015.

In 2016, the San Antonio Police Department received 5,807 burglary of motor vehicle parts, a 10.67% increase from 2015

Contributing factors that lead to burglary of vehicles includes vehicle owners leaving valuable items in plain view inside vehicles and leaving their vehicles unlocked. Items stolen during vehicle burglaries are turned into profit at flea markets, pawn shops, garage sales, and online classified ads. Victims leave their keys in the vehicle and their motors running giving criminals the opportunity to steal their car and stripping the vehicle for parts. Each month the ReACT Task Force finds chop shops where the victims' vehicles are found dismantled.

The sophisticated and organized criminals coordinate attacks on car dealerships by removing dozens of tires, rims or parts, such as the 180 wheels stolen from Ancira-Winton Chevrolet, Leon Valley, Texas on November 25, 2015.

2.2 Provide an assessment of the motor vehicle theft problem in the coverage area of this application

In 2016, the San Antonio Police Department reported 7233 vehicles stolen. This was an increase of 1057 vehicles or 17.11% from 2015.

Texas has 13 major border crossings. Nine of these are direct routes leading to two primary interstate highways through San Antonio. Commerce from the United States and Mexico use Bexar County and San Antonio as a transportation hub for legitimate industry.

Vehicle crimes are no longer child's play; vehicles are being stolen from rental car agencies, targeted by auto theft rings by using fraudulent credit cards to victimize businesses. Vehicles are stolen from car dealerships and auto auctions by obtaining access to the key or key fob and by fraudulent means.

Vehicle crimes are a rapidly evolving criminal endeavors managed by Mexican cartels, drug rings, and criminal street gangs. Given the fact that the Mexican border is a short distance away, this gives criminals the opportunity to cross into Mexico before the vehicle is reported stolen. Mexican cartels and gangs like the durability of heavy-duty pickups because they allow for escape through rough terrain which law enforcement is unable to pursue through. Stolen vehicles are used as a gateway to execute other crimes. The most popular benefit is transporting illegal contraband. Cartels and criminal gangs continue to transport drugs, weapons, cash, and human cargo between the U.S. and Mexican border. It is becoming an increasingly dangerous endeavor as the violence between rival gangs spills into the United States.

2.3 Describe the geographical target area intended for this application. Include information about the taskforce governing and command structure. Include a description of the coverage area(s) and the nature of support and agreements supporting this application.

Bexar County has a total area of 1,256 square miles. Bexar County is located in south central Texas approximately 190 miles west of Houston and 140 miles from the US-Mexico border. Bexar County includes San Antonio which is the second largest city in Texas and the 7th largest city in the United States. Bexar County has 23 incorporated cities, 7 unincorporated communities and rural areas. Four (4) Interstate Highways, 4 U.S. Highways, 2 State Highways, and 2 Loops run through San Antonio, making it an ideal transportation hub. In addition, four (4) active military installations and 1 military medical center are located in the city.

The counties adjacent to Bexar County are Kendall County (north), Comal County (north), Guadalupe County (northeast), Wilson County (southeast), Medina County (west), and Bandera County (northwest).

The Regional Auto Crimes Task Force (ReACT) is a multi-jurisdictional law enforcement task force that includes the San Antonio Police Department, the Bexar County Sheriff's Office, and the National Insurance Crime Bureau. Together these agencies are housed under one umbrella located at the San Antonio Police Vehicle Crimes Office. The ReACT goals for this multi-agency collaboration are the same, to reduce vehicle thefts and burglary of a vehicle; to reduce the sale of stolen vehicles or parts through enforcement, the detection and apprehension of criminals, and to conduct public awareness through crime prevention and educational presentations.

The San Antonio Police Vehicle Crimes command structure is as follows:

The Chief of Police, Assistant Chief, Deputy Chief, Captain, Vehicle Crimes Lieutenant, 2 Vehicle Crimes Sergeants, 18 Vehicle Crimes Detectives, and 3 Administrative Assistants.

3.1 Functions of the Proposed Program Related to Burglary of a Motor Vehicle

The function of the proposed program is to reduce the burglary of motor vehicles through law enforcement investigations, by identifying, arresting, and successfully charging criminals and includes crime prevention techniques through public education/awareness presentations. Task force members will work with surrounding county and local jurisdictions to help identify known burglary of vehicle offenders and will share intelligence as it relates to these criminals. Task force members will monitor both brick and mortar locations known to deal in stolen property and online sites to recovery stolen property before the criminals can profit from their crimes. Problem locations will be targeted for covert operations and multi agency cooperation with be coordinated as a force multiplier. By meeting the goals and strategies stated in this proposal the task force will reduce burglary of motor vehicles by making timely arrests, recovering stolen property thereby reducing the profitability of the crime and clearing cases.

If awarded additional detectives and a crime analyst, the 6 new detectives will focus on proactive investigations as a priority and will direct their focus towards surveillance of known offenders and problem areas as directed by current crime trends and information from the crime analyst. The 6 new detectives will work on a team concept and will cover work hours when the task force is traditionally closed.

The addition of the 6 new detectives will allow for greater inter-agency cooperation and will increase intelligence sharing between local and county agencies.

3.2 Functions of the Proposed Program Related to Theft of a Motor Vehicle

ORIGINAL

The function of the proposed program is to reduce the theft of motor vehicles through law enforcement investigations, by identifying, arresting, and successfully charging criminals and includes crime prevention techniques through public education/awareness presentations. Intelligence sharing and force multiplying as it relates to covert operations and investigations will be achieved through inter-agency cooperation with surrounding counties and jurisdictions. The monitoring of online sites that sell stolen property and timely implementation of sting operations will lead to an increase in arrests and recovery of stolen property and reduce the profitability of criminal participation in vehicle crimes. By meeting the goals and objectives stated in this proposal the task force will reduce the theft of motor vehicles by making timely arrests, recovering stolen property thereby reducing the profitability of the crime and clearing cases.

If awarded additional detectives and a crime analyst, the 6 new detectives will focus on proactive investigations as a priority and will direct their focus towards surveillance of known offenders and problem areas as directed by current crime trends and information from the crime analyst. The 6 new detectives will work on a team concept and will cover work hours when the task force is traditionally closed.

The addition of the 6 new detectives will allow for greater inter-agency cooperation and will increase intelligence sharing between local and county agencies.

# 3.3 Functions of the Proposed Program Related to Motor Vehicle Burglary and Theft Prevention

The function of the proposed program is to reduce the theft of motor vehicles and the burglary of vehicles through crime prevention techniques which include public education/awareness presentations both in person and through social media. The in person presentations are made up of new car buyer clinics, neighborhood association meetings, conventions, static displays at public events, distribution of crime prevention publications and material, VIN etchings, informative citations in public parking lots. The social media outreach will be conducted through multiple Facebook accounts for Bexar County, San Antonio and surrounding agencies that wish to participate. By meeting the goals and strategies stated in this proposal by the task force will reduce the burglary to motor vehicles problem, reduce vehicle theft and increase case clearances.

The addition of a crime analyst will allow for real time trends to be identified and disseminated to the general public and will assist with all crime prevention efforts through social media and public meetings. The crime analyst will help identify potential future victims and thereby allow crime prevention presentations to be focused on those potential crime targets.

## 3.4 Collaboration Effort

Together the task force has 25 law enforcement officers with extensive training in auto theft investigations. Most task force members have attended basic and intermediate auto theft investigation training, including complex crimes training and title fraud training. The ReACT Task Force combines resources and intelligence and conserves both fiscal and investigative resources for the city and the county.

The REACT Task Force provides assistance to various law enforcement agencies and other departments within the San Antonio Police Department to identify suspects involved in motor vehicle thefts and burglary of vehicles and provide assistance in the recovery of stolen vehicles and stolen property. The task force also provides investigative and technical assistance to agencies within our service area on auto theft, vehicle burglaries and insurance fraud.

Task Force members regularly participate in Border Intel Webinars that involve multiple jurisdictions along the Mexico border to include Brownsville, Laredo, El Paso, Victoria and Houston to name a few. Surrounding jurisdictions make phone contact with the task force members on a daily basis and task force members assist with their questions, investigations, arrests and recoveries.

San Antonio is the location for the Southwest Texas Fusion Center which is one of 78 fusion centers in the United States. Interagency cooperation allows the task force to act as a conduit for any agency requesting assistance with any number of intelligence related inquiries.

The end result will determine a percentage decrease or increase of the three goals by comparing previous year statistics.

Goal 1: Reduce the incident of motor vehicle theft through enforcement strategies.

Goal 2: Reduce the incident of theft from motor vehicles through enforcement strategies.

Goal 3: Educate citizens and sworn personnel in prevention of motor vehicle theft, burglary of motor vehicles and theft of vehicle parts and accessories.

Statistical data will be gathered and compiled into a meaningful database from task force daily activity reports. This information will be reported and submitted on the quarterly progress reports to ABTPA.

Monthly and annual reports will detail progress towards meeting goals and objectives and financial information. A comprehensive project review will be provided annually. The final review will provide a full account of the project. The project manager will be responsible for the submission of timely reports. A monthly meeting will be coordinated with the project
