

AN ORDINANCE 2019-12-12-1060

RATIFYING AN AGREEMENT WITH JUDITH GRANT TO PROVIDE FETAL INFANT MORTALITY REVIEW AND MATERNAL MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY REVIEW DATA ABSTRACTION AND FAMILY INTERVIEWING SERVICES FOR THE SAN ANTONIO METROPOLITAN HEALTH DISTRICT IN AN AMOUNT UP TO \$24,999.00 FOR A PERIOD BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 1, 2019 AND ENDING MARCH 31, 2020 WITH OPTIONS TO RENEW FOR FOUR, ONE YEAR TERMS, FOR A TOTAL AMOUNT UP TO \$124,995.00 INCLUSIVE OF RENEWALS.

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WHEREAS, the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District's (Metro Health) Healthy Start Program is responsible for operating a Fetal Infant Mortality Review (FIMR) and/or a Maternal Mortality and Morbidity Review (MMMR); and

WHEREAS, FIMR is a national collaborative effort between the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the Maternal Child Health Bureau dating back to 1990; and

WHEREAS, FIMR is based on a community-wide action-oriented process that examines fetal and infant deaths through clinical abstraction and maternal interviews, determines preventability, and engages communities to take action; and

WHEREAS, FIMR had previously existed in San Antonio from 2008-2011 and was reinstated in May 2015 by Metro Health's Healthy Start Program; and

WHEREAS, the San Antonio Healthy Start (SAHS) Program aims to reduce disparities in infant mortality and adverse perinatal outcomes by: 1) improving women's health, 2) improving family health and wellness, and) promoting systems change; and

WHEREAS, a review of individual cases of mortality and morbidity, and trend analysis over time of these cases is critical to improve pregnancy and infant health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, to these activities with the utmost integrity, it is typical for Healthy Start programs to utilize external contractors to meet the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) requirement for the clinical abstraction, family interviewing and case preparation that is at the core of mortality and morbidity review processes; and

WHEREAS, the DHHS Healthy Start Program is currently authorized to continue through March 31, 2024 and requires Metro Health to secure clinical abstraction services to meet grant requirements through the end of the grant period; and

WHEREAS, through ratification of the contract with Judith Grant, Metro Health’s Healthy Start Program will be able to satisfy the critical mortality and morbidity review requirement, meet the three strategic approaches and continue its efforts in reducing infant and maternal mortality rates in the San Antonio and Bexar County area; **NOW THEREFORE:**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

SECTION 1. The execution of an agreement with Judith Grant to provide Fetal Infant Mortality Review and Maternal Morbidity and Mortality Review data abstraction and family interviewing services for the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District (Metro Health) in an amount up to \$24,999.00 for a period beginning September 1, 2019 and ending March 31, 2020 with options to renew for four, one year terms is hereby ratified. Renewals shall be contingent upon grant award each year. A copy of the agreement is attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes as **Attachment I.**


SECTION 2. The City Manager or designee, or the Director of Metro Health or designee, is further authorized to execute any and all necessary documents to effectuate said agreement.


SECTION 3. Fund 2202236006 entitled “Heathy Start 19-20,” Internal Order 136000000773 and General Ledger 5201040 are hereby designated for use in the accounting for the fiscal transaction in the execution of this contract up to an amount of \$24,999.00. Payment not to exceed the budgeted amount is authorized to Judith Grant upon issuance of a purchase order.


SECTION 4. The financial allocations in this Ordinance are subject to approval by the Deputy Chief Financial Officer, City of San Antonio. The Deputy Chief Financial Officer may, subject to concurrence by the City Manager or the City Manager’s designee, correct allocations to specific Cost Centers, WBS Elements, Internal Orders, General Ledger Accounts, and Fund Numbers as necessary to carry out the purpose of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance is effective immediately upon the receipt of eight affirmative votes; otherwise, it is effective ten days after passage.

AGREEMENT**

This Professional Services Agreement (Agreement) is entered into between the City of San Antonio (hereinafter referred to as "CITY"), a Texas Municipal Corporation, on behalf of the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District (hereinafter referred to as "Metro Health") and Judith Grant (hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR"), hereinafter collectively referred to as the Parties.

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Healthy Start Program's (Healthy Start) purpose is to engage communities in a national effort to reduce infant mortality where the rates are over one and a half times the national average; and

WHEREAS, CITY desires CONTRACTOR to provide data evaluation services for Healthy Start's Fetal Infant Mortality Review Initiative (FIMR) in order to promote the mission of Metro Health's Healthy Start Program; and

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR represents that it possesses the knowledge, ability, professional skills, and qualifications to perform this work in an expeditious and economical manner consistent with CITY's interests:

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises, mutual covenants, and agreements contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

DEFINITIONS

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have meanings as set out below:

"CITY" is defined in the preamble of this Agreement and includes its successors and assigns.

"CONTRACTOR" is defined in the preamble of this Agreement and includes its successors and assigns.

"Director" means the director or interim director of Metro Health.

"Healthy Start Program" is defined as the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Healthy Start Program Grant which provides funding for this Agreement.

I. TERM

1.1 The term of this Agreement shall commence on September 1, 2019 and end on March 31, 2020. Upon agreement of the parties and availability of funding, this Agreement may be renewed for four, one-year terms on the same terms and conditions. Renewals shall be in writing and signed by the Director without further action by the San Antonio City Council.

1.2 CONTRACTOR further agrees and understands that the City expects to pay all obligations of this Agreement from DHHS Healthy Start Program Grant funding. Accordingly, if funding is not received by City in a sufficient amount to pay any of City's obligations under the terms of this Agreement, then this Agreement will terminate and neither City nor CONTRACTOR will have any further obligations hereunder. Lack of funding is not and will not be considered a breach of this Agreement.

II. SCOPE OF SERVICES

2.1 CONTRACTOR agrees to provide the services described in this Article II entitled Scope of Services during the term of the Agreement in exchange for the compensation described in Article III Compensation:

- a) CONTRACTOR will review and abstract information from medical records for the FIMR and Maternal Morbidity and Mortality Review (MMMR) projects to be completed within a specified time period as determined by Metro Health.
- b) CONTRACTOR shall contact hospitals and other provider agencies and access medical records for specified cases, review those records, complete appropriate abstraction forms, and provide clinical interpretation.
- c) CONTRACTOR shall attend monthly FIMR case review team meetings, monthly FIMR leadership team meetings, and at least quarterly MMMR case review team meetings, as scheduled by the CITY.
- d) CONTRACTOR shall obtain birth and death certificates from the Office of the City Clerk Vital Records Program. Select cases to be abstracted will be based on FIMR and/or MMMR case review team's selection criteria.
- e) CONTRACTOR shall prepare a minimum of five infant death case summaries per month for review at the FIMR case review team meetings, excluding the months of April and December. The CITY may authorize less than five monthly FIMR cases and a specified number of quarterly MMMR cases. Case summaries should include data abstracted from, but not limited to, hospitals, doctors, EMS, Child Protective Services and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) records, as well as from maternal interviews, when applicable.
- f) CONTRACTOR shall obtain approval from the medical records department of each hospital and other local medical providers in order to access medical records for FIMR and MMMR reviews under this Agreement.
- g) CONTRACTOR shall submit a monthly roster of hospitals' and other provider agencies' contact information whose medical records were accessed by CONTRACTOR.
- h) CONTRACTOR shall develop and submit a database of cases prepared and reviewed with general recommendations within 10 days of each monthly FIMR case review team meeting or scheduled MMMR meeting.
- i) CONTRACTOR will invoice the CITY for work performed on a monthly basis and will include a progress report with each invoice. The CITY will provide the requirements to be included in each progress report.
- j) CONTRACTOR will meet with the Healthy Start Program Epidemiology Coordinator weekly to report and discuss progress.

2.2 CONTRACTOR agrees to provide any and all documentation required by the CITY for inclusion in any report concerning the CITY's Healthy Start Program. All work performed by CONTRACTOR hereunder shall be performed to the satisfaction of Director. The determination made by Director shall be final, binding and conclusive on all Parties hereto. CITY shall be under no

obligation to pay for any work performed by CONTRACTOR, which is not satisfactory to Director. CITY shall have the right to terminate this Agreement, in accordance with Article V. Termination, in whole or in part, should CONTRACTOR's work not be satisfactory to Director; however, CITY shall have no obligation to terminate and may withhold payment for any unsatisfactory work, as stated herein, even should CITY elect not to terminate.

III. COMPENSATION TO CONTRACTOR

3.1 In consideration of CONTRACTOR's performance in a satisfactory and efficient manner, as determined solely by the Director, of all services and activities set forth in this Agreement, City agrees to pay CONTRACTOR a fee of THIRTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$35.00) per hour, plus approved mileage and parking fees incurred in the course of work per IRS mileage rate for the period within, for a total amount not to exceed TWENTY FOUR THOUSAND, NINE HUNDRED NINETY NINE DOLLARS (\$24,999.00) as total compensation, to be paid to CONTRACTOR in the manner set forth in Section 3.2.

3.2 CITY and CONTRACTOR agree that reimbursement for eligible services shall be made within thirty (30) days after the date on which CITY receives an invoice, with appropriate documentation as required by CITY, from CONTRACTOR for said services.

3.3 No additional fees or expenses of CONTRACTOR shall be charged by CONTRACTOR nor be payable by CITY. The parties hereby agree that all compensable expenses of CONTRACTOR have been provided for in the total payment to CONTRACTOR as specified in section 3.1 and 3.2 above. Total payments to CONTRACTOR cannot exceed that amount set forth in section 3.1 and 3.2 above, without prior approval and agreement of all parties evidenced in writing and approved consistent with appropriate City policy.

3.4 It is expressly understood and agreed by the CITY and CONTRACTOR that CITY's obligations under this Agreement are contingent upon the actual receipt of adequate grant funds from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Healthy Start Initiative Grant to meet the CITY's liability hereunder. Lack of funding is not and shall not be considered a breach of this Agreement. If CITY does not receive adequate grant funds to pay obligations under this Agreement, then this Agreement shall terminate and neither CONTRACTOR nor CITY shall have any further obligations hereunder.

3.5 Final acceptance of work products and services require written approval by CITY. The approval official shall be Director. Payment will be made to CONTRACTOR following written approval of the final work products and services by Director. CITY shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party, other than CONTRACTOR, for the payment of any monies or the provision of any goods or services.

3.6 CONTRACTOR agrees to provide any and all documentation required for inclusion in any report concerning the Healthy Start Program. All services required under this Agreement will be performed to CITY's satisfaction, and CITY will not be liable for any payment under this Agreement for services which are unsatisfactory and which have not been approved by CITY. The payment for services provided hereunder will not be paid until required reports, and documentation have been received and approved by the CITY.

IV. RECORDS RETENTION

4.1 CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors, if any, shall properly, accurately and completely maintain all documents, papers, and records, and other evidence pertaining to the services rendered hereunder (hereafter referred to as "documents"), and shall make such materials available to the CITY at their respective offices, at all reasonable times and as often as CITY may deem necessary during the Agreement period, including any extension or renewal hereof, and the record retention period established herein, for purposes of audit, inspection, examination, and making excerpts or copies of same by CITY and any of its authorized representatives.

4.2 CONTRACTOR shall retain any and all documents produced as a result of services provided hereunder for a period of four (4) years (hereafter referred to as "retention period") from the date of termination of the Agreement. If, at the end of the retention period, there is litigation or other questions arising from, involving or concerning this documentation or the services provided hereunder, CONTRACTOR shall retain the records until the resolution of such litigation or other such questions. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that CITY shall have access to any and all such documents at any and all times, as deemed necessary by CITY, during said retention period. CITY may, at its election, require CONTRACTOR to return said documents to CITY prior to or at the conclusion of said retention period.

4.3 The Public Information Act, Government Code Section 552.021, requires the CITY to make public information available to the public. Under Government Code Section 552.002(a), public information means information that is collected, assembled or maintained under a law or ordinance or in connection with the transaction of official business: 1) by a governmental body; or 2) for a governmental body and the governmental body owns the information or has a right of access to it. Therefore, if CONTRACTOR receives inquiries regarding documents within its possession pursuant to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall within twenty-four (24) hours of receiving the requests forward such requests to CITY for disposition. If the requested information is confidential pursuant to state or federal law, the CONTRACTOR shall submit to CITY the list of specific statutory authority mandating confidentiality no later than three (3) business days of CONTRACTOR's receipt of such request. For the purposes of communicating and coordinating with regard to public information requests, all communications shall be made to the designated public information liaison for each Party. Each Party shall designate in writing to the other Party the public information liaison for its organization and notice of a change in the designated liaison shall be made promptly to the other Party.

V. TERMINATION

5.1 For purposes of this Agreement, "termination" of this Agreement shall mean termination by expiration of the Agreement term as stated in Article I. Term, or earlier termination pursuant to any of the provisions hereof.

5.2 Termination Without Cause. This Agreement may be terminated by CITY or CONTRACTOR upon 7 calendar days written notice, which notice shall be provided in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. CITY will pay CONTRACTOR for all work or services provided up to the day of termination, subject to submission of an invoice by CONTRACTOR and approval and acceptance of work by CITY.

5.3 CITY's Termination For Cause. Upon written notice, which notice shall be provided in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, CITY may terminate this Agreement as of the date provided in the notice, in whole or in part, upon the occurrence of one or more of the following events, each of which shall constitute an event for cause under this Agreement:

- 5.3.1 The sale, transfer, pledge, conveyance or assignment of this Agreement without prior approval, as provided in Article IX. Assignment and Subcontracting.
- 5.3.2 Any material breach of the terms of this Agreement, as determined by CITY.

5.4 Defaults With Opportunity for Cure. Should CONTRACTOR default in the performance of this Agreement in a manner stated in this section 5.4 below, same shall be considered an event of default. CITY shall deliver written notice of said default specifying such matter(s) in default. CONTRACTOR shall have ten (10) business days after receipt of the written notice, in accordance with Article XXIV. Notice, to cure such default. If CONTRACTOR fails to cure the default within such ten-day cure period, CITY shall have the right, without further notice, to terminate this Agreement in whole or in part as CITY deems appropriate, and to contract with another contractor to complete the work required in this Agreement. CITY shall also have the right to offset the cost of said new Agreement with a new contractor against CONTRACTOR's future or unpaid invoice(s), subject to the duty on the part of CITY to mitigate its losses to the extent required by law.

- 5.4.1 The sale, transfer, pledge, conveyance or assignment of this Agreement without prior approval, as provided in Article X. Assignment and Subcontracting;
- 5.4.2 Bankruptcy or selling substantially all of company's assets;
- 5.4.3 Failing to perform or failing to comply with any covenant herein required;
- 5.4.4 Performing unsatisfactorily;
- 5.4.5 The failure to meet reporting requirements of the Healthy Start Program, as set out and determined by City;
- 5.4.6 Notification of any investigation, claim or charge by a local, state or federal agency involving fraud, theft or the commission of a felony.

5.5 Termination not sole remedy. In no event shall CITY's action of terminating this Agreement, whether for cause or otherwise, be deemed an election of CITY's remedies, nor shall such termination limit, in any way, at law or at equity, CITY's right to seek damages from or otherwise pursue CONTRACTOR for any default hereunder or other action.

VI. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS AND INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

6.1 Any and all records, data, finished or unfinished documents, writings, reports, charts, schedules, or information produced by, or on behalf of, CONTRACTOR, and any related responses, inquiries, correspondence and materials which has come into CONTRACTOR's custody, even if not produced by, or on behalf of, CONTRACTOR, in whatsoever form and character (hereinafter referred to as "documents") pursuant to the provisions of this CONTRACT are the exclusive property of CITY; and no such documents shall be the subject of any copyright or proprietary claim by CONTRACTOR.

6.2 CONTRACTOR understands and acknowledges that as the exclusive owner of any and all such documents, CITY has the right to use all such documents as CITY desires, without restriction or further compensation to CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall deliver, at CONTRACTOR's sole cost and expense, all contract related documents and reports to the CITY in accordance with the dates established under this agreement, and in a timely and expeditious manner, and if a delivery date is not specified, then upon termination of the agreement.

6.3 CONTRACTOR shall notify CITY immediately of any requests for information from a third party which pertain to documents obtained and/or generated pursuant to this agreement.

CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that CITY will process and handle all such requests.

6.4 In accordance with Texas law, CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that all local government records as defined in Chapter 201, Section 201.003 (8) of the Texas Local Government Code created or received in the transaction of official business or the creation or maintenance of which were paid for with public funds are declared to be public property and subject to the provisions of Chapter 201 of the Texas Local Government Code and Subchapter J, Chapter 441 of the Texas Government Code. Thus, CONTRACTOR agrees that no such local government records produced by or on the behalf of CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Contract shall be the subject of any copyright or proprietary claim by CONTRACTOR.

6.5 CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations governing documents and ownership, access and retention thereof.

VII. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

CONTRACTOR acknowledges that funds for this Agreement are from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Healthy Start Initiative Grant. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the following terms and conditions associated with said funds as directed by the City or as required by this Agreement:

I. RECORDS RETENTION

- a. Contractor shall retain and preserve records in accordance with applicable state and federal statutes, rules and regulations. At a minimum, Contractor shall maintain all records, including but not limited to financial that are generated or collected by Contractor under the provisions of this Contract for a period of four years after the termination of this Contract.

II. ASSURANCES AND CERTIFICATIONS

- a. Certification. Contractor certifies the following and will include such in all of its subcontracts:
 - i. It is not disqualified under 2 CFR § 376.935 or ineligible for participation in federal or state assistance programs;
 - ii. Neither it, nor its principals, are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any federal or state department or agency in accordance with 2 CFR Parts 376 and 180 (parts A-1), 45 CFR Part 76 (or comparable federal regulations);
 - iii. It has not knowingly failed to pay a single substantial debt or a number of outstanding debts to a federal or state agency;
 - iv. It is not subject to an outstanding judgment in a suit against Contractor for collection of the balance of a debt;
 - v. It is in good standing with all state and/or federal agencies that have a contracting or regulatory relationship with the Contractor;
 - vi. That no person who has an ownership or controlling interest in Contractor or who is an agent or managing employee of Contractor has been convicted of a criminal offense related to involvement in any program established under Medicare, Medicaid, or a federal block grant;

- vii. Neither it, nor its principals have within the three year period preceding this Contract, has been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a private or public (federal, state or local) transaction or contract under a private or public transaction, violation of federal or state antitrust statutes (including those proscribing price-fixing between competitors, allocation of customers between competitors and bid-rigging), or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements or false claims, tax evasion, obstruction of justice, receiving stolen property or any other offense indicating a lack of business integrity or business honesty that seriously and directly affects the present responsibility of Contractor or its principals;
- viii. Neither it, nor its principals is presently indicted or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (federal, state or local) with the commission of any of the offenses in subsection (g) above; and
- ix. Neither it, nor its principals within a three year period preceding this Contract has had one or more public transaction (federal, state or local) terminated for cause or default.

If Contractor's status with respect to the items certified in this Article changes during the term of this Contract, Contractor shall immediately notify the City.

- b. Authorization. Contractor certifies that it possesses legal authority to contract for the services described in this Contract and if applicable, a resolution, motion or similar action has been duly adopted or passed as an official act of Contractor's governing body, authorizing the binding of the organization under this Contract including all understandings and assurances contained in this Contract, and directing and authorizing the person identified as the authorized representative of Contractor to act in connection with this Contract and to provide such additional information as may be required.

III. TRANSACTIONS BETWEEN RELATED PARTIES

- a. Contractor shall identify and report to City any transaction between Contractor and a related party that is part of the work that City is purchasing under this Contract before entering into the transaction or immediately upon discovery. A related party is a person or entity related to Contractor by blood or marriage, common ownership or any association that permits either to significantly influence or direct the actions or policies of the other. Contractor, for purposes of reporting transactions between related parties, includes the entity contracting with the City under this Contract as well as the chief executive officer, chief financial officer and program director of Contractor.
- b. Contractor shall submit to the City the name, address and telephone number of the related party, how the party is related to Contractor and the work the related party shall perform under this Contract.
- c. Contractor shall maintain records and supply any additional information requested by the City, regarding a transaction between related parties, needed to enable the City to determine the appropriateness of the transaction pursuant to applicable state or federal law, regulations or circulars, which may include 45 CFR §74.42.

VIII. INSURANCE

8.1 Prior to the commencement of any work under this Agreement, Contractor shall furnish copies of all required endorsements and completed Certificate(s) of Insurance to the City's Health Department, which shall be clearly labeled "Judith Grant Professional Services Agreement-FIMR" in the Description of Operations block of the Certificate. The Certificate(s) shall be completed by an agent and signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The City will not accept a Memorandum of Insurance or Binder as proof of insurance. The certificate(s) must be signed by the Authorized Representative of the carrier, and list the agent's signature and phone number. The certificate shall be mailed, with copies of all applicable endorsements, directly from the insurer's authorized representative to the City. The City shall have no duty to pay or perform under this Agreement until such certificate and endorsements have been received and approved by the City's Health Department. No officer or employee, other than the City's Risk Manager, shall have authority to waive this requirement.

8.2 The City reserves the right to review the insurance requirements of this Article during the effective period of this Agreement and any extension or renewal hereof and to modify insurance coverages and their limits when deemed necessary and prudent by City's Risk Manager based upon changes in statutory law, court decisions, or circumstances surrounding this Agreement. In no instance will City allow modification whereby City may incur increased risk.

8.3 A Contractor's financial integrity is of interest to the City; therefore, subject to Contractor's right to maintain reasonable deductibles in such amounts as are approved by the City, Contractor shall obtain and maintain in full force and effect for the duration of this Agreement, and any extension hereof, at Contractor's sole expense, insurance coverage written on an occurrence basis, unless otherwise indicated, by companies authorized to do business in the State of Texas and with an A.M Best's rating of no less than A- (VII), in the following types and for an amount not less than the amount listed below:

8.4 As they apply to the limits required by the City, the City shall be entitled, upon request and without expense, to receive copies of the policies, declaration page, and all required endorsements.

Contractor shall be required to comply with any such requests and shall submit requested documents to City at the address provided below within 10 days. Contractor shall pay any costs incurred resulting from provision of said documents.

8.5 Contractor agrees that with respect to the above required insurance, all insurance policies are to contain or be endorsed to contain the following provisions:

- Name the City, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers, and elected representatives as additional insureds by endorsement, as respects operations and activities of, or on behalf of, the named insured performed under contract with the City, with the exception of the workers' compensation and professional liability policies;
- Provide for an endorsement that the "other insurance" clause shall not apply to the City of San Antonio where the City is an additional insured shown on the policy;
- Workers' compensation, employers' liability, general liability and automobile liability policies will provide a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City.
- Provide advance written notice directly to City of any suspension or non-renewal in coverage, and not less than ten (10) calendar days advance notice for nonpayment of premium.

8.6 Within five (5) calendar days of a suspension, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage, Contractor shall provide a replacement Certificate of Insurance and applicable endorsements to City. City shall have the option to suspend Contractor's performance should there be a lapse in coverage at any time during this contract. Failure to provide and to maintain the required insurance shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

8.7 In addition to any other remedies the City may have upon Contractor's failure to provide and maintain any insurance or policy endorsements to the extent and within the time herein required, the City shall have the right to order Contractor to stop work hereunder, and/or withhold any payment(s) which become due to Contractor hereunder until Contractor demonstrates compliance with the requirements hereof.

8.8 Nothing herein contained shall be construed as limiting in any way the extent to which Contractor may be held responsible for payments of damages to persons or property resulting from Contractor's or its subcontractors' performance of the work covered under this Agreement.

8.9 It is agreed that Contractor's insurance shall be deemed primary and non-contributory with respect to any insurance or self insurance carried by the City of San Antonio for liability arising out of operations under this Agreement.

8.10 It is understood and agreed that the insurance required is in addition to and separate from any other obligation contained in this Agreement and that no claim or action by or on behalf of the City shall be limited to insurance coverage provided.

IX. INDEMNIFICATION

9.1 CONTRACTOR covenants and agrees to FULLY INDEMNIFY, DEFEND and HOLD HARMLESS, the CITY and the elected officials, employees, officers, directors, volunteers and representatives of the CITY, individually and collectively, from and against any and all costs, claims, liens, damages, losses, expenses, fees, fines, penalties, proceedings, actions, demands, causes of action, liability and suits of any kind and nature, including but not limited to, personal or bodily injury, death and property damage, made upon the CITY directly or indirectly arising out of, resulting from or related to CONTRACTOR'S activities under this Agreement, including any acts or omissions of CONTRACTOR, any agent, officer, director, representative, employee, consultant or subcontractor of CONTRACTOR, and their respective officers, agents employees, directors and representatives while in the exercise of the rights or performance of the duties under this Agreement. The indemnity provided for in this paragraph shall not apply to any liability resulting from the negligence of CITY, its officers or employees, in instances where such negligence causes personal injury, death, or property damage. IN THE EVENT CONTRACTOR AND CITY ARE FOUND JOINTLY LIABLE BY A COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION, LIABILITY SHALL BE APPORTIONED COMPARATIVELY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS FOR THE STATE OF TEXAS, WITHOUT, HOWEVER, WAIVING ANY GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY AVAILABLE TO THE CITY UNDER TEXAS LAW AND WITHOUT WAIVING ANY DEFENSES OF THE PARTIES UNDER TEXAS LAW.

9.2 The provisions of this INDEMNITY are solely for the benefit of the parties hereto and not intended to create or grant any rights, contractual or otherwise, to any other person or entity. CONTRACTOR shall advise the CITY in writing within 24 hours of any claim or demand against the CITY or CONTRACTOR known to CONTRACTOR related to or arising out of CONTRACTOR's activities under this AGREEMENT and shall see to the investigation and defense of such claim or demand at CONTRACTOR's cost. The CITY shall have the right, at its option and at its own expense, to participate in such defense without relieving CONTRACTOR of any of its obligations under this paragraph.

9.3 Defense Counsel - City shall have the right to select or to approve defense counsel to be retained by CONTRACTOR in fulfilling its obligation hereunder to defend and indemnify City, unless such right is expressly waived by City in writing. CONTRACTOR shall retain City approved defense counsel within seven (7) business days of City's written notice that City is invoking its right to indemnification under this Agreement. If CONTRACTOR fails to retain Counsel within such time period, City shall have the right to retain defense counsel on its own behalf, and CONTRACTOR shall be liable for all costs incurred by City. City shall also have the right, at its option, to be represented by advisory counsel of its own selection and at its own expense, without waiving the foregoing.

9.4 Employee Litigation - In any and all claims against any party indemnified hereunder by any employee of CONTRACTOR, any subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the indemnification obligation herein provided shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor under worker's compensation or other employee benefit acts.

X. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

10.1 CONTRACTOR shall supply qualified personnel as may be necessary to complete the work to be performed under this Agreement. Persons retained to perform work pursuant to this Agreement shall be considered the employees or contractors of CONTRACTOR.

10.2 It is CITY's understanding that this Agreement is made in reliance thereon that CONTRACTOR does not intend to use subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement.

10.3 Any work or services approved for subcontracting hereunder shall be subcontracted only by written contract and, unless specific waiver is granted in writing by the CITY, shall be subject by its terms to each and every provision of this Agreement. Compliance by subcontractors with this Agreement shall be the responsibility of CONTRACTOR. CITY shall in no event be obligated to any third party, including any subcontractors of CONTRACTOR, for performance of services or payment of fees. Any references in this Agreement to an assignee, transferee, or subcontractor, indicate only such an entity as has been approved by the CITY.

10.4 Except as otherwise stated herein, CONTRACTOR may not sell, assign, pledge, transfer or convey any interest in this Agreement, nor delegate the performance of any duties hereunder, by transfer, by subcontracting or any other means, without the consent of the CITY. As a condition of such consent, if such consent is granted, CONTRACTOR shall remain liable for completion of the services outlined in this Agreement in the event of default by the successor CONTRACTOR, assignee, transferee or subcontractor.

10.5 Any attempt to transfer, pledge or otherwise assign this Agreement without said written approval, shall be void ab initio and shall confer no rights upon any third person. Should CONTRACTOR assign, transfer, convey, delegate, or otherwise dispose of any part of all or any part of its right, title or interest in this Agreement, CITY may, at its option, cancel this Agreement and all rights, titles and interest of CONTRACTOR shall thereupon cease and terminate, in accordance with Article V. Termination, notwithstanding any other remedy available to CITY under this Agreement. The violation of this provision by CONTRACTOR shall in no event release CONTRACTOR from any obligation under the terms of this Agreement, nor shall it relieve or release CONTRACTOR from the payment of any damages to CITY, which CITY sustains as a result of such violation.

XI. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

11.1 CONTRACTOR covenants and agrees that it is an independent contractor and not an officer, agent, servant or employee of CITY; that CONTRACTOR shall have exclusive control of and exclusive right to control the details of the work performed hereunder and all persons performing same, and shall be responsible for the acts and omissions of its officers, agents, employees, contractors, subcontractors and consultants; that the doctrine of *respondeat superior* shall not apply as between CITY and CONTRACTOR, its officers, agents, employees, contractors, subcontractors and consultants, and nothing herein shall be construed as creating the relationship of employer-employee, principal-agent, partners or joint venturers between CITY and CONTRACTOR. The parties hereto understand and agree that the CITY shall not be liable for any claims which may be asserted by any third party occurring in connection with the services to be performed by the CONTRACTOR under this Agreement and that the CONTRACTOR has no authority to bind the CITY.

XII. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

12.1 The Charter of the City of San Antonio and its Ethics Code prohibit a City officer or employee, as those terms are defined in the City's Ethics Code, from having a financial interest in any CONTRACT with CITY or any CITY agency such as CITY owned utilities. An officer or employee has a "prohibited financial interest" in a CONTRACT with the City or in the sale to CITY of land, materials, supplies or service, if any of the following individual(s) or entities is a party to the CONTRACT or sale: a City officer or employee; his parent, child or spouse; a business entity in which the officer or employee, or

his parent, child or spouse owns ten (10) percent or more of the voting stock or shares of the business entity, or ten (10) percent or more of the fair market value of the business entity; a business entity in which any individual or entity above listed is a subcontractor on a CITY contract, a partner or a parent or subsidiary business entity.

12.2 CONTRACTOR warrants and certifies, and this CONTRACT is made in reliance thereon, that it, its officers, employees and agents performing on this CONTRACT are neither a City officer nor an employee as defined by Section 2-52 (e) of the City's Ethics Code. CONTRACTOR further warrants and certifies that it has tendered to the City a Discretionary Contracts Disclosure Statement in compliance with the City's Ethics Code.

XIII. AMENDMENTS

13.1 Except where the terms of this Agreement expressly provide otherwise, any alterations, additions, or deletions to the terms hereof, shall be effected by amendment, in writing, executed by both City and Contractor. The Director shall have authority to execute amendments on behalf of the City without further action by the San Antonio City Council, subject to and contingent upon appropriation of funds for any increase in expenditures by the City.

13.2 It is understood and agreed by Parties hereto, that changes in local, state and federal rules, regulations or laws applicable hereto, may occur during the term of this CONTRACT and that any such changes shall be automatically incorporated into this CONTRACT without written amendment hereto, and shall become a part hereof as of the effective date of the rule, regulation or law.

XIV. SEVERABILITY

14.1 If any clause or provision of this Agreement is held invalid, illegal or unenforceable under present or future federal, state or local laws, including but not limited to the CITY Charter, CITY Code, or ordinances of the City of San Antonio, Texas, then and in that event it is the intention of the parties hereto that such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other clause or provision hereof and that the remainder of this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision was never contained herein; it is also the intention of the parties hereto that in lieu of each clause or provision of this Agreement that is invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, there be added as a part of the Agreement a clause or provision as similar in terms to such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision as may be possible, legal, valid and enforceable.

XV. LICENSES/CERTIFICATIONS

15.1 CONTRACTOR warrants and certifies that CONTRACTOR and any other person designated to provide services hereunder has the requisite training, license and/or certification to provide said services, and meets all competence standards promulgated by all other authoritative bodies, as applicable to the services provided herein.

XVI. COMPLIANCE AND MONITORING

16.1 CONTRACTOR shall provide and perform all services required under this Agreement in compliance with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations.

16.2 CONTRACTOR agrees that CITY may carry out reasonable monitoring and

evaluation activities, and CONTRACTOR shall provide reasonable access to CITY for such activities, so as to ensure compliance by CONTRACTOR with this Agreement and with all other laws, regulations and ordinances related to the performance hereof.

XVII. ADMINISTRATION OF AGREEMENT AND RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF FUNDS

17.1 Prohibited Political Activity. CONTRACTOR agrees that no funds provided from or through the CITY shall be contributed or used to conduct political activities for the benefit of any candidate for elective public office, political party, organization or cause, whether partisan or non-partisan, nor shall the personnel involved in the administration of the Project provided for in this Agreement be assigned to work for or on behalf of any partisan or non-partisan political activity.

17.2 CONTRACTOR agrees that no funds provided under this Agreement may be used in any way to attempt to influence, in any manner, a member of Congress or any other State or local elected or appointed official.

17.3 The prohibitions set forth in Sections 17.1 and 17.2 above include, but are not limited to, the following:

- a) an activity to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office or for any activity undertaken to influence the passage, defeat or final content of local, state or federal legislation;
- b) working or directing other personnel to work on any political activity during time paid for with CITY funds, including, but not limited to activities such as taking part in voter registration drives, voter transportation activities, lobbying, collecting contributions, making speeches, organizing or assisting at meetings or rallies, or distributing political literature;
- c) coercing personnel, whether directly or indirectly, to work on political activities on their personal time, including activities such as taking part in voter registration drives, voter transportation activities, lobbying, collecting contributions, making speeches, organizing or assisting at meetings or rallies, or distributing political literature; and
- d) using facilities or equipment paid for, in whole or in part with CITY funds for political purposes including physical facilities such as office space, office equipment or supplies, such as telephones, computers, fax machines, during and after regular business hours.

17.4 Adversarial proceedings. Except in circumstances where the following is in conflict with federal law or regulations pertaining to this grant, the CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the following special provisions,

- a) Under no circumstances will the funds received under this Agreement be used, either directly or indirectly, to pay costs or attorney fees incurred in any adversarial proceeding against the CITY or any other public entity; and
- b) The CONTRACTOR, at the CITY's option, could be ineligible for consideration to receive any future funding while any adversarial proceeding against the CITY

remains unresolved.

17.5 Unless disclosure is authorized by the CITY, CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain in confidence all information pertaining to this Agreement or other information and materials prepared for, provided by, or obtained from CITY including, without limitation, reports, information, project evaluation, project designs, data, other related information (collectively, the "Confidential Information") and to use the Confidential Information for the sole purpose of performing its obligations pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall protect the Confidential Information and shall take all reasonable steps to prevent the unauthorized disclosure, dissemination, or publication of the Confidential Information. If disclosure is required (i) by law or (ii) by order of a governmental agency or court of competent jurisdiction, CONTRACTOR shall give the Director of Metro Health prior written notice that such disclosure is required with a full and complete description regarding such requirement. CONTRACTOR shall establish specific procedures designed to meet the obligations of this Article, including, but not limited to execution of confidential disclosure agreements, regarding the Confidential Information with CONTRACTOR's employees and subcontractors prior to any disclosure of the Confidential Information. This Article shall not be construed to limit the CITY's or its authorized representatives' right to obtain copies, review and audit records or other information, confidential or otherwise, under this Agreement. Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall return to CITY all copies of materials related to the Project, including the Confidential Information. All confidential obligations contained herein (including those pertaining to information transmitted orally) shall survive the termination of this Agreement. The Parties shall ensure that their respective employees, agents, and contractors are aware of and shall comply with the aforementioned obligations.

CONTRACTOR shall comply with standard practices of confidentiality of patient information as required by Metro Health and mandated by The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) and Texas State privacy laws. CONTRACTOR will enter into a Business Associate Agreement with the CITY which is attached hereto as **Attachment I** and incorporated herein as a part of this Agreement for all purposes.

CITY policies regarding authorization for access to confidential information and review of medical records will be followed by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR assumes full responsibility for any breach of confidence by its staff or its participating medical professionals with regard to activities under this Agreement.

XVIII. NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY

18.1 Non-Discrimination. As a party to this contract, CONTRACTOR understands and agrees to comply with the Non-discrimination Policy of the City of San Antonio contained in Chapter 2, Article X of the city code and further, shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, veteran status, age or disability, unless exempted by state or federal law, or as otherwise established herein.

18.2 The CONTRACTOR shall comply with all federal, State, or local laws, rules, and orders prohibiting discrimination, and shall not engage in employment practices which have the effect of discriminating against any employee or applicant for employment, and will take affirmative steps to ensure that applicants are employed and employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, handicap, or political belief or affiliation. Consistent with the foregoing, CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with Executive Order 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity", as amended by Executive Order

11375, and as supplemented by regulations at 41 C.F.R. Part 60. CONTRACTOR further agrees to abide by all applicable provisions of San Antonio City ordinance number 69403, as amended, on file in the City Clerk's Office. Additionally, CONTRACTOR certifies that it will comply fully with the following nondiscrimination, minimum wage and equal opportunity provisions, including but not limited to:

- a) Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended;
- b) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended;
- c) The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended;
- d) Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended; (Title 20 USC sections 1681-1688);
- e) Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended;
- f) Equal Pay Act of 1963, P.L. 88-38; and
- g) All applicable regulations implementing the above laws.

XIX. SMALLBUSINESSECONOMICDEVELOPMENTADVOCACY

19.1 Non-discrimination. As a condition of entering into this Agreement, CONTRACTOR represents and warrants that it will comply with CITY's Commercial Nondiscrimination Policy, as described under Section IILC.1 of the SBEDA Ordinance. As part of such compliance, CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, ancestry or national origin, sex, age, marital status, sexual orientation, or on the basis of disability or other unlawful forms of discrimination in the solicitation, selection, hiring or commercial treatment of subcontractors, vendors, suppliers, or commercial customers, nor shall CONTRACTOR retaliate against any person for reporting instances of such discrimination. CONTRACTOR shall provide equal opportunity for subcontractors, vendors and suppliers to participate in all of its public sector and private sector subcontracting and supply opportunities, provided that nothing contained in this clause shall prohibit or limit otherwise lawful efforts to remedy the effects of marketplace discrimination that have occurred or are occurring in CITY's Relevant Marketplace. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that a material violation of this clause shall be considered a material breach of this Agreement and may result in termination of this Agreement, disqualification of CONTRACTOR from participating in CITY contracts, or other sanctions. This clause is not enforceable by or for the benefit of, and creates no obligation to, any third party. CONTRACTOR shall include this nondiscrimination clause in all subcontracts for the performance of this Agreement.

XX. NONWAIVER OF PERFORMANCE

20.1 Unless otherwise specifically provided for in this Agreement, a waiver by either party of a breach of any of the terms, conditions, covenants or guarantees of this Agreement shall not be construed or held to be a waiver of any succeeding or preceding breach of the same or any other term, condition, covenant or guarantee herein contained. Further, any failure of either Party to insist in any one or more cases upon the strict performance of any of the covenants of this Agreement, or to exercise any option herein contained, shall in no event be construed as a waiver or relinquishment for the future of such covenant or option. In fact, no waiver, change, modification or discharge by either party hereto of any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been made or shall be effective unless expressed in writing and signed by the party to be charged. In case of CITY, such changes must be approved by the City Council, as described in Article XIII. Amendments. No act or omission by a Party shall in any manner impair or prejudice any rights, powers, privileges, or remedies to be always specifically preserved hereby.

XXI. LAW APPLICABLE

21.1 THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE CONSTRUED UNDER AND IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND ALL OBLIGATIONS OF THE PARTIES CREATED HEREUNDER ARE PERFORMABLE IN BEXAR COUNTY, TEXAS.

21.2 Any legal action or proceeding brought or maintained, directly or indirectly, as a result of this Agreement shall be heard and determined in the City of San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas.

XXII. LEGAL AUTHORITY

22.1 The signer of this Agreement for CONTRACTOR represents, warrants, assures and guarantees that he has full legal authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of CONTRACTOR and to bind CONTRACTOR to all of the terms, conditions, provisions and obligations herein contained.

XXIII. PARTIES BOUND

23.1 This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, and successors and assigns, except as otherwise expressly provided for herein.

XXIV. NOTICE

24.1 Except where the terms of this Agreement expressly provide otherwise, any election, notice or communication required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and deemed to have been duly given if and when delivered personally (with receipt acknowledged), or three (3) days after depositing same in the U.S. mail, first class, with proper postage prepaid, or upon receipt if sending the same by certified mail, return receipt requested, or upon receipt when sent by a commercial courier service (such as Federal Express or DHL Worldwide Express) for expedited delivery to be confirmed in writing by such courier, at the addresses set forth below or to such other address as either party may from time to time designate in writing.

XXV. DEBARMENT

25.1 CONTRACTOR certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from participation in any State or Federal Program.

25.2 CONTRACTOR shall provide immediate written notice to CITY, in accordance with Article XXIV. Notice, if, at any time during the term of this contract, including any renewals hereof, CONTRACTOR learns that its certification was erroneous when made or has become erroneous by reason of changed circumstances.

XXVI. PROHIBITION ON CONTRACTS WITH COMPANIES BOYCOTTING ISRAEL

26.1 Texas Government Code §2270.002 provides that a governmental entity may not enter into a contract with a company for goods or services, unless the contract contains a written verification from the company that it:

- (1) does not boycott Israel; and
- (2) will not boycott Israel during the term of the contract.

"Boycott Israel" means refusing to deal with, terminating business activities with, or otherwise taking any action that is intended to penalize, inflict economic harm on, or limit commercial relations specifically with Israel, or with a person or entity doing business in Israel or in an Israeli-controlled territory, but does not include an action made for ordinary business purposes.

"Company" means a for-profit sole proprietorship, organization, association, corporation, partnership, joint venture, limited partnership, limited liability partnership, or limited liability company, including a wholly owned subsidiary, majority-owned subsidiary, parent company, or affiliate of those entities or business associations that exists to make a profit.

By submitting an offer to or executing contract documents with the City of San Antonio, Company hereby verifies that it does not boycott Israel, and will not boycott Israel during the term of the contract. City's hereby relies on Company's verification. If found to be false, City may terminate the contract for material breach.

XXVII. PROHIBITION ON CONTRACTS WITH COMPANIES ENGAGED IN BUSINESS WITH IRAN, SUDAN, OR FOREIGN TERRORIST ORGANIZATION

27.1 Texas Government Code §2252.152 provides that a governmental entity may not enter into a governmental contract with a company that is identified on a list prepared and maintained under Texas Government Code §§2270.0201 or 2252.153. CONTRACTOR hereby certifies that it is not identified on such a list and that it will notify CITY should it be placed on such a list while under contract with CITY. CITY hereby relies on CONTRACTOR's certification. If found to be false, or if CONTRACTOR is identified on such list during the course of its contract with CITY, CITY may terminate this Agreement for material breach.

XXVIII. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

28.1 This Agreement, together with its authorizing ordinance and its exhibits, if any, constitute the final and entire agreement between the parties hereto and contain all of the terms and conditions agreed upon. No other agreements, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind the parties hereto, unless same be in writing, dated subsequent to the date hereto, and duly executed by the parties, in accordance with Article XIII. Amendments.



HIPAA BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

This HIPAA Business Associate Agreement is entered into by and between the City of San Antonio (Agreement) is entered into by and between the City of San Antonio ("Covered Entity"), and Judith Grant, a Business Associate ("BA"), referred to collectively herein as the "Parties."

WHEREAS, the City of San Antonio and BA have entered into a Professional Services Contract ("Service Contract"), executed on 9.30.19, whereby BA provides professional services to the Covered Entity; and

WHEREAS, Covered Entity and BA may need to use, disclose and/or make available certain information pursuant to the terms of the Service Contract, some of which may constitute Protected Health Information ("PHI"); and

WHEREAS, Covered Entity and BA intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI disclosed to each other pursuant to the Service Contract in compliance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA") and regulations promulgated thereunder by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (the "HIPAA Regulations"), Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH Act") and other applicable laws; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Agreement is to satisfy certain standards and requirements of HIPAA and the HIPAA Regulations, including, but not limited to, Title 45, Section 164.504(e) of the Code of Federal Regulations ("C.F.R."), as the same may be amended from time to time;

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties, intending to be legally bound, hereby agree as follows:

A. Definitions. For the purposes of this Agreement, the following terms have the meanings ascribed to them:

- (1) "Breach" shall mean an impermissible use or disclosure under the Privacy Rule that compromises the security or privacy of the protected health information. An impermissible use or disclosure of protected health information is presumed to be a breach unless the covered entity or business associate, as applicable, demonstrates that there is a low probability that the protected health information has been compromised based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:
 - (a) the nature and extent of the protected health information involved, including the types of identifiers and the likelihood of re-identification;
 - (b) the unauthorized person who used the protected health information or to whom the disclosure was made;
 - (c) whether the protected health information was actually acquired or viewed; and
 - (d) the extent to which the risk to the protected health information has been mitigated.

- (2) "Designated Record Set" shall have the same meaning as the term "designated record set" in 45 C.F.R. 164.501.
- (3) "Disclosure" with respect to PHI, shall mean the release, transfer, provision of access to or divulging in any other manner of PHI outside the entity holding the PHI.
- (4) "Health Information" is defined in 45 C.F.R. 160.103 as any information, including genetic information, whether oral or recorded in any form or medium that: (1) is created or received by a health care provider, health plan, public health authority, employer, life insurer, school or university, or health care clearinghouse; and (2) relates to the past, present, or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual; the provision of health care to an individual; or the past, present, or future payment for the provision of health care to an individual.
- (5) "Individual" means the person who is the subject of protected health information and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(g).
- (6) "Individually Identifiable Health Information" is defined in 45 C.F.R. 160.103 as information that is a subset of health information, including demographic information collected from an individual, and: (1) is created or received by a health care provider, health plan, employer, or health care clearinghouse; and (2) relates to the past, present, or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual; the provision of health care to an individual; or the past, present, or future payment for the provision of health care to an individual; and (i) identifies the individual; or (ii) with respect to which there is a reasonable basis to believe the information can be used to identify the individual.
- (7) "Privacy Rule" shall mean the regulations for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164, Subpart E.
- (8) "Protected Health Information" or "PHI" shall have the same meaning as the term "protected health information" in 45 C.F.R. 160.103, limited to the information created or received by BA from or on behalf of Covered Entity. PHI includes "Electronic Protected Health Information" or "EPHI" and shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Rule, including but not limited to 45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162, 164, and under HITECH.
- (9) "Required By Law" means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use or disclosure of protected health information and that is enforceable in a court of law. Required by law includes, but is not limited to, court orders and court-ordered warrants; subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a governmental or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the production of information; a civil or an authorized investigative demand; Medicare conditions of participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program; and statutes or regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that require such information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits. 45 C.F.R. 164.103.
- (10) "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services or his designee.

- (11) "Security Rules" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of Electronic Protected Health Information codified at 45 C.F.R. Part 164.
- (12) The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health ("HITECH") Act shall mean Division A, Title XII of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Pub. L. 111-5).

B. BA Obligations and Activities. BA agrees that it shall:

- (1) Not use or disclose the PHI other than as permitted or required by this Agreement or as Required by Law;
- (2) Establish and maintain appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect, consistent with the services provided under this Agreement, the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of the electronic protected health information that it creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of Covered Entity;
- (3) Mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to BA of a use or disclosure of PHI by BA in violation of the requirements of this Agreement;
- (4) Report to Covered Entity any use or disclosure of PHI of which BA is aware or becomes aware that is not provided for or allowed by this Agreement as well as any Security Incident as defined by 45 C.F.R. 164.304 that BA becomes aware of;
- (5) Ensure that a business associate agreement is in place with any of its agents or subcontractors with which BA:
 - (a) does business, and
 - (b) to whom it provides PHI received from, or created or received by BA on behalf of, Covered Entity; and ensures such agents or subcontractors are aware of and agree to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this Agreement to BA with respect to such information, and further agree to implement reasonable and appropriate administrative, physical and technical safeguards that render such PHI unusable, unreadable and indecipherable to individuals unauthorized to acquire or otherwise have access to such PHI;
- (6) Provide access, at the request of Covered Entity, and in a reasonable time and manner as agreed by the Parties, to PHI in a Designated Record Set to Covered Entity or, as directed by Covered Entity, to an Individual in order to meet the requirements 45 C.F.R. §164.524;
- (7) Make any amendment(s) to PHI in a Designated Record Set that the Covered Entity directs or agrees to pursuant to 45 C.F.R. 164.526 at the request of the Covered Entity or an Individual, and in a reasonable time and manner agreed to by the Parties;
- (8) Make available to the Covered Entity or to the Secretary all internal practices, books and records, including policies and procedures and PHI, relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by the BA on behalf of the Covered Entity, for purposes of the Secretary in determining Covered Entity's compliance with the Privacy

Rule;

- (9) Document disclosures of PHI, and information related to such disclosures, as would be required for Covered Entity to respond to a request from an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528;
- (10) Provide Covered Entity or an Individual, in a reasonable time and manner as agreed to by the Parties, information collected in accordance with Section B(9) of this Agreement, to permit Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528;
- (11) Immediately, and in no event later than three days from discovery, notify Covered Entity of any breach of PHI, including ePHI, and will coordinate with Covered Entity to identify, record, investigate, and report to an affected individual and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, as required, any covered PHI breach. Breach notification to Covered Entity must include: names of individuals with contact information for those who were or may have been impacted by the HIPAA Breach; a brief description of the circumstances of the HIPAA Breach, including the date of the breach and date of discovery; a description of the types of unsecured PHI involved in the breach; a brief description of what the BA has done or is doing to investigate the breach and mitigate harm. BA will appoint a breach liaison and provide contact information to provide information and answer questions Covered Entity may have concerning the breach;
- (12) Comply with all Security Rules requirements;
- (13) Comply with the Privacy Rule for any obligation Covered Entity delegates to BA;
- (14) Under no circumstances sell PHI in such a way as to violate Texas Health and Safety Code, Chapter 181.153, effective September 1, 2012, nor shall BA use PHI for marketing purposes in such a manner as to violate Texas Health and Safety Code Section 181.152, or attempt to re-identify any information in violation of Texas Health and Safety Code Section 181.151, regardless of whether such action is on behalf of or permitted by the Covered Entity.

C. Permitted Uses and Disclosures by BA

- (1) Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, BA may use or disclose PHI to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, Covered Entity as specified in the Service Contract, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the Privacy Rule if done by Covered Entity.
- (2) Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, BA may disclose PHI for the proper management and administration of the BA, provided that disclosures are Required By Law, or BA obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the information is disclosed that it will remain confidential and used or further disclosed only as Required By Law or for the purpose for which it was disclosed to the person, and the person notifies the BA of any instances of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached.
- (3) Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, BA may use PHI to provide Data Aggregation Services to Covered Entity as permitted by 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i)(B).

- (4) BA may use PHI to report violations of law to appropriate Federal and State authorities, consistent with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(j)(1).

D. Obligations of Covered Entity. Covered Entity shall inform BA of its privacy practices and restrictions as follows. Covered Entity shall:

- (1) Notify BA of any limitations in its notice of privacy practices in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect BA's use or disclosure of PHI;
- (2) Notify BA of any changes in, or revocation of, permission by any Individual to use or disclose PHI, to the extent that such changes may affect BA's use or disclosure of PHI;
- (3) Notify BA of any restriction to the use or disclosure of PHI that Covered Entity has agreed to in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.522 to the extent that such changes may affect BA's use or disclosure of PHI.
- (4) Coordinate with BA regarding any PHI breach and make timely notification to affected individuals within 60 days of discovery.

E. Permissible Requests by Covered Entity.

Covered Entity shall not request BA to use or disclose PHI in any manner that would not be permissible under the Privacy Rule if done by Covered Entity, except that the BA may use or disclose PHI for data aggregation or management and administrative activities of the BA.

F. Term and Termination.

- (1) This Agreement becomes effective on the date it is signed by the last Party. This Agreement shall terminate when all PHI encompassed by this Agreement is destroyed or returned to Covered Entity or, if it is infeasible to return or destroy the PHI, protections are extended to such information in accordance with the termination provisions in this Section.
- (2) Termination for Cause. Upon Covered Entity's knowledge of a material breach by BA, Covered Entity shall either (a) provide an opportunity for BA to cure the breach in accordance with the terms of the Service Contract or, if the BA does not cure the breach or end the violation within the time for cure specified in the Service Contract, end the violation and terminate this Agreement and the Service Contract; or (b) immediately terminate this Agreement and the Service Contract if BA has breached a material term of this Agreement and cure is not possible. If neither termination nor cure is feasible, Covered Entity shall report the violation to the Secretary.
- (3) Effect of Termination.
 - (a) Except as provided below in paragraph (b) of this Section F(3), upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, BA shall return or destroy all PHI received from the Covered Entity, or created or received by BA on behalf of Covered Entity. This provision shall apply to PHI that is in the possession of BA or its subcontractors or agents. BA shall not retain any copies of PHI.


- (b) In the event that BA determines that returning or destroying PHI is infeasible, BA shall provide to Covered Entity written notification of the condition that makes the return or destruction of PHI infeasible. Upon BA's conveyance of such written notification, BA shall extend the protections of this Agreement to such PHI and limit further uses and disclosures of such PHI to those purposes that make its return or destruction infeasible, for so long as BA maintains such PHI.
- (4) Notwithstanding any other provision under this Agreement, the Parties agree that the Service Contract may be terminated by either Party without penalty should the other Party violate a material obligation under this Agreement.
- H. Amendment to Comply with Law. The Parties agree to take written action as is necessary to amend this Agreement to comply with any Privacy Rules and HIPAA legal requirements for Covered Entity without the need for additional council action.
- I. Survival. The respective rights and obligations of the BA under Sections B, C (2) and (4), and F(3) shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- J. Interpretation. Any ambiguity in this Agreement shall be interpreted to permit Covered Entity to comply with the Privacy Rule.
- K. Regulatory References. A reference in this Agreement to a section in the Privacy Rule means the section as in effect or amended.
- L. No Third Party Beneficiaries. Nothing express or implied in this Agreement is intended to confer, nor shall anything herein confer upon any person other than Covered Entity, BA, and their respective successors or assigns, any rights, remedies, obligations, or liabilities whatsoever.
- M. ***INDEMNIFICATION. BA WILL INDEMNIFY, DEFEND AND HOLD COVERED ENTITY AND ITS OFFICERS, DIRECTORS, EMPLOYEES, AGENTS, SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS HARMLESS, FROM AND AGAINST ANY AND ALL LOSSES, LIABILITIES, DAMAGES, COSTS AND EXPENSES ARISING OUT OF OR RELATED TO ANY THIRD-PARTY CLAIM BASED UPON ANY BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT BY BA IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE INDEMNITY PROVISIONS IN THE SERVICE CONTRACT, WHICH ARE HEREBY INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE FOR ALL PURPOSES.***
- N. Reimbursement. BA will reimburse Covered Entity for reasonable costs incurred responding to a PHI breach by BA or any of BA's subcontractors.
- O. Waiver. No provision of this Agreement or any breach thereof shall be deemed waived unless such waiver is in writing and signed by the party claimed to have waived such provision or breach. No waiver of a breach shall constitute a waiver of or excuse any different or subsequent breach.
- P. Assignment. Neither party may assign (whether by operation of law or otherwise) any of its rights or delegate or subcontract any of its obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Covered Entity shall have the right to assign its rights and obligations hereunder to any entity that is an affiliate or successor of Covered Entity, without the prior approval of BA.
- Q. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the complete agreement between Business Associate and Covered Entity relating to the matters specified in this Agreement, and supersedes

all prior representations or agreements, whether oral or written, with respect to such matters. In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the Service Contract or any such later agreement(s), the terms of this Agreement shall control unless the terms of such Service Contract comply with the Privacy Standards and the Security Standards. No oral modification or waiver of any of the provisions of this Agreement shall be binding on either party. This Agreement is for the benefit of, and shall be binding upon the parties, their affiliates and respective successors and assigns. No third party shall be considered a third-party beneficiary under this Agreement, nor shall any third party have any rights as a result of this Agreement.

R. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas. Venue of any court action brought directly or indirectly by reason of this Agreement shall be in Bexar County, Texas.
