In keeping with the spirit of the agreement, MVHA has made direct donations to the Library or Landa Gardens Conservancy in the total amount of \$80,968.99 since the year 2000. Attached is a breakdown of those contributions by year. (This information was gathered from the MVHA annual financial reports.)

An additional point, worthy of note, is the fact that members of the association have donated generously over the years. Attached is a list of major donors to Landa Gardens since 2003, with MVHA members highlighted. We are not privy to the specific dollar amounts of these donations, but if you take only the minimum amount in each category, you will see that the sum is significant.

Without question, there was a lapse in institutional memory on both sides, and it is clear that MVHA has not always complied with the letter of the agreement. We do believe, however, that the donations made by MVHA over the years have fully supported the spirit and intent of the agreement.

Of course, we understand that times change. This is a new day, and it is time to renew our old agreement or develop a new one. We hope that we can continue to use the office under terms that are favorable to both parties. We have met with Heidi Novotny to discuss ways in which we can continue our traditional efforts to support Landa Library, and we have discussed the possibility of sharing the office space with Landa Gardens Conservancy. We understand that it may be time for the Library board to consider collecting some rent, and if that is the case, we would appreciate the opportunity to discuss it with you.

It makes me very happy to have learned more about the historic relationship between the Landa Library and Monte Vista Historical Association, and I now have a much better appreciation for the contribution that both organizations have made to improve the quality of life in Monte Vista. I know that our members join me in the hope that this special relationship will continue in the future.
