Councilmember Viagran stated that she was pleased to bring the item forward declaring September Celebrate San Antonio Seniors Month. She recognized Dr. Bill Gonzaba, Founder and CEO of Gonzaba Medical Group and thanked him for his great work with Seniors in the community. Dr. Gonzaba thanked the City Council for the recognition and stated that he was 83 years-old and had been serving the Southside Community for 58 years. He noted that their new clinic had 60 providers to serve the elderly population and

spoke of the quality care they provide. Melody Woosley spoke of the events that would be held at the Comprehensive Senior Centers and highlighted the Diez y Seis Dance at the Convention Center.

The City Council thanked Councilmember Viagran for bringing the item forward and recognized Dr. Gonzaba for his great work. Mayor Nirenberg added his thanks to Dr. Gonzaba and the City/County Commission on Elderly Affairs.

Councilmember Shaw asked if there was a presentation. David McCary replied that there was not but he was available to answer questions.

Mayor Nirenberg called on the citizens registered to speak.

Elizabeth Eguia-Garcia, Executive Director of the Entrepreneur Center, stated that they served small, minority, women, and veteran-owned businesses in the city. She noted that she was supportive of the contract award to the MSE Group who was a tenant client.

TC Calvert representing the Fair Contracting Coalition stated that they were in support of the contract award to the MSE Group. He spoke of the great progress the city was making with regard to providing opportunities for small, minority, and women-owned businesses and commended the City Council.

Christopher Herring stated that he was part of the Fair Contracting Coalition and a member of the Small Business Advocacy Committee in support of the contract award to the MSE Group.

Gene Marck, President of Vista World Travel, spoke in support of the contract award to the MSE Group.

Rhett Smith stated that he was also supportive of the contract award to the MSE Group.

Councilmember Shaw stated that it was important to assist small, minority and women-owned businesses throughout the city. He commended city staff for their work on said item and added that he firmly believed that small businesses build communities.

John Jacks presented an overview of the Downtown Public Improvement District (PID). He stated that the PID was authorized through September 30, 2023 and contracted with Centro San Antonio for management and administration. He noted that staff recommended approval of the FY 2018 Assessment Rate of \$0.15 per \$100 for Commercial and \$0.09 for Residential, as well as the FY 2018 Service and Assessment Plan. He provided a map of

the area and highlighted core services to include maintenance, beautification, and hospitality. He reported various accomplishments since 2014 such as Business Recruitment & Retention, and Downtown Outreach. He mentioned enhancements for 2018 and added that \$267,597 was included in the FY 2018 Proposed Budget.

Mayor Nirenberg opened the public hearing and called upon the citizens registered to speak.

David Adelman, Chair of the PID, stated that he was speaking in support of the PID as a property owner. He highlighted the great work to keep downtown operating at the highest level possible.

Brian Dillard stated that he was a downtown employee and used multi-modal transportation such as bicycling, walking, and the VIA Bus System. He noted that he was in support of the PID and the services provided.

Cathy Siegel, Executive Director of Houston Street Charities, spoke in support of the PID. She highlighted the Cocktail Conference, a large event they host to raise money for children's charities, which is held in the downtown area.

Reverend Ron Brown spoke in support of the PID and stated that it had been a blessing for Haven for Hope and reaching out to the homeless community.

Valerie Salas stated that she was a Downtown Outreach Specialist for Haven for Hope and supportive of the PID. She spoke of her personal experience being homeless in 2013 and now working in partnership with Centro to reach out and assist other homeless individuals.

Ruben Martinez stated that he was supportive of the PID and asked the City Council to always keep families in mind when making decisions.

Kris Keller stated that he was opposed to the PID as he owned property on the edge of the boundary line and did not benefit from the services.

Mayor Nirenberg referenced a letter received from the Familia Cortez in favor of the PID.

Mayor Nirenberg stated that there being no further citizens to speak; the Public Hearing was declared closed.

Councilmember Treviño expressed his support and stated that he was grateful for the momentum occurring downtown. He recognized the work of Centro San Antonio and invited Pat DiGiovanni to speak. Mr. DiGiovanni stated that he was pleased with the partnership with the City of San Antonio and Haven for Hope and highlighted their work in

the downtown area.

Councilmember Saldaña expressed his support and recognized Reverend Brown and Valerie Salas for their work and compassion. Councilmember Gonzales also expressed her support and asked if there were any changes to the contract. Mr. Jacks confirmed that there was no change to the contract. Councilmember Gonzales asked if businesses and individuals moving into the area were made aware of the assessment. Mr. Jacks replied that they would have to perform due diligence and inquire about their potential taxes or assessments prior to purchasing the property. He added that participation was mandatory.

Councilmember Treviño noted that 23 Centro Ambassadors were graduates of Haven for Hope. Mayor Nirenberg spoke of the transformation in the downtown area and recognized the partnership with Haven for Hope.

Councilmember Treviño moved to adopt the Ordinances for Items 19A and 19B. Councilmember Shaw seconded the motion. The motion prevailed by the following vote:

20. City Manager's Report

STD PREVENTION PROGRAM AWARDED MODEL PROGRAM STATUS

Mrs. Sculley reported that the Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) Prevention Program's Public Health Follow Up Team was awarded the "Model Program" Designation by the Texas Department of State Health Services. She noted that the designation signifies the program's continuous commitment to providing excellent service in the community. She mentioned that the Public Health Follow Up Team was responsible for preventing the spread of STDs by conducting thorough disease investigations. She noted that the designation from the State makes the local program a training site for the Texas Department of State Health Services. She congratulated Metro Health's STD Public Health Follow Up Team for earning the prestigious designation and keeping the community safe from the spread of STDs.

WORLD HERITAGE FESTIVAL 2017

Mrs. Sculley reported that the 2nd Annual World Heritage Festival kick off occurred the previous day. She stated that the five-day festival celebrates the anniversary of the San Antonio Missions Designation as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2015. She indicated that proceeds from the festival support non-profit organizations and projects preserve, promote,

and connect the Missions and River. She noted that the festival also provides an opportunity for locals and visitors to celebrate San Antonio's unique history, heritage, and culture though various fun and family-friendly events. She highlighted events to include the San Antonio Living Heritage Symposium led by the Office of Historic Preservation. She recognized Councilmember Viagran for her support of the San Antonio Missions and World Heritage Festival and the many partners that helped host the 2nd Annual Event. Councilmember Viagran encouraged everyone to attend the World Heritage Festival.

Meg Reyes of JBSA stated that they had asked the developer to consider using the Southern Edwards Plateau Compliance Form and also recommended that they perform a habitat assessment. She noted that the assessment had been initiated but was not yet complete. Rod Sanchez added that the Endangered Species Ordinance would take effect upon platting or through Master Plan Development requirements. Mayor Nirenberg stated that he had some concerns and would benefit from additional time.

Councilmember Courage stated that he had the opportunity to discuss the development with Mr. Pugsley and was convinced that staff had done their due diligence. He noted that the developer was trying to build affordable housing in an area that would benefit from it and was supportive of the request.

Councilmember Perry asked that the developer work closely with the neighborhood on a compromise for both parties.

Councilmember Pelaez moved to continue Items P-4 and Z-12 to September 21, 2017. Councilmember Viagran seconded the motion. The motion to continue prevailed by the following vote:
