
The Library celebrated the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Forest Hills Branch Library on Saturday, October 13, 2018. District 7 Councilwoman Ana Sandoval and Board Chair Paul Stahl attended and delivered remarks as part of the program. The Library featured programs and activities around the theme of 1980's – the decade the Forest Hills Branch Library opened- throughout the day.

Assistant Director Kathy Donellan represented Library Administration at the City of San Antonio Service Appreciation Event on October 7, 2018. The event celebrates City staff, Library included, who have reached years of service milestones in their career with the City of San Antonio.

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar met with Alexandra van de Kamp, the new Executive Director GeminiINK, a local literary organization to discuss potential partnership opportunities.

On October 14, Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar attended the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library's Arts and Letters Award Ceremony to introduce acclaimed author John Philip Santos who was recognized as part of the awards ceremony.

The design team has created materials to prepare for several programs, events and other design support: Homework Help Brainfuse to transition to a new vendor contract, Gabriela Gonzalez author event, Native American Heritage Month materials, 123 Andres materials, Mission City Film Fest call for submissions and Teen Arts Fest.

The team is currently planning for Our Family Reads: The Mayor's Book Club, Teen Arts Fest and preparation for upcoming public input meetings on the Bond projects at branch locations. In addition, the team has been busy with preparations for the Catrina Ball. The Forest Hills 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary event was a big success with more than 200 in attendance. Also, the Voter Registration Day Press Conference on September 25 drew in a crowd of about 60 and three different media outlets. The voting campaign will continue through the November 6 election.

#### **DIGITAL SERVICES**

On September 19, Digital Library Services Supervisor Rolf Laun worked with Innovative Interfaces to remove old fine data in accordance with Fiscal policy. This annual procedure freed up over 9,000 juvenile patron accounts and 19,000 adult patron accounts.

Coordinator of Digital Services Ron Suszek and Mr. Laun participated in the October 9 kickoff meeting for the SAPL Digital Signage Project. The Digital Signage Project committee is looking to define specifications and identify a system-wide, digital signage solution. Digital Services Specialist Adam Spana will also be working with this committee.

The Mr. Suszek, Mr. Laun, Digital Services Analyst Tricia Masterson, and Mr. Spana met with Library Services Administrator Candelaria Mendoza and ITSD to outline plans for the next steps in Pharos implementation. Next phases will include unlimited sessions, scanning, wireless printing, faxing at selected locations and the payment kiosks.

On October 12, Mr. Suszek and Mr. Laun as part of the Committee for selecting a new Incident Reporting System for SAPL began reviewing proposals for systems to replace the Library's current Incident database.

Ms. Masterson has begun scheduling the retro-fitting of the Pharos payment kiosks to bring them into compliance with newer technologies and other requirements.

#### LITTLE READ WAGON

Every Child Ready to Read Workshops for Parents—Last May, Family Specialists in Northeast Independent School District scheduled workshops for the 2018-19 school year. Encino Park,

Montgomery, and Roan Forest elementary schools hosted parent workshops during this reporting period, with several more campuses scheduled in the next two months. Parent workshops were also presented at John Glenn Elementary, Glenoaks Elementary, Martin Elementary, and Pre-K 4SA North.

Services to Pregnant and Parenting Teens—Early literacy workshops were offered at Excel Academy, and Brackenridge, LEE, Burbank, Jefferson, and Churchill high schools. Although there have been changes to the manner in which school districts support school age parents, the social workers, counselors, and family specialists across Bexar County remain dedicated to inviting Little Read Wagon to share library and early literacy information with students.

Outreach Story Time Programs—Story time programs were offered at Nurturing Hearts, Navarro Early Learning Center, Joys of Heaven, Naomi, and King of Kings early childhood centers. Using data from the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and the American Community Survey, several additional centers in zip codes with high poverty rates have been identified for outreach in coming months.

Play & Learn—The wildly popular series at Rolling Oaks Mall concluded September 25 with lots of questions about when the program might return. A mini Play & Learn was offered at House of Neighborly Service in conjunction with a puppet show presented by Say Si. Play & Learn returned to the park with the series kickoff at Southside Lions on October 10. This series will feature the use of loose parts: collections of items for open-ended play such as cardboard tubes, blocks, scarves and other pieces of fabric.

Workshops for Professionals—Another "Early Literacy Basics" workshop was presented October 6. The third "Why? Using nonfiction books in early childhood settings" workshop was presented October 13. The very full crowd commented on how much they appreciated the book pairings, scavenger hunt, and discussion of nonfiction and informational books for young children.

Building Connections—Staff from the Metro Health Department visited the Little Read Wagon office to talk about Project Worth and our common audiences (pregnant and parenting teens, parents of young children). Both teams hope to do more collaborative work in the future, starting with cross-referrals.

Cresencia Huff accompanied Viki Ash at the Library Resource Roundup hosted by the Region 20 Education Service Center. Ms. Huff helped promote the Young Pegasus Poetry Competition and invited librarians from across the region to attend the National Latino Children's Literature Conference, to be held at the end of February at the downtown campus of the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Plans for a play group with Brighton Early Childhood Intervention were cancelled by Brighton hosts due to weather.

Julia Lazarin, Clair Lark, Megan Cruz, and Mary Grace Moreno attended the Congress on Children hosted by Voices for Children. Speakers included Father Boyle and a legislative panel.

Ms. Huff represented the Library at Siclovia. Balance challenges and bubbles were provided along with library information.

Elizabeth Huber, a volunteer deputy voter registrar, assisted with voter registration at Tynan Early Childhood Center and Avance San Antonio's Dia de la Familia.

Ms. Larkin presented library information with a focus on BrainFuse at the monthly meeting of Northeast Independent School District Family Specialists. She encouraged the group to contact their local branch to arrange presentations for parents on school age services.

System wide support—Mary Grace Moreno and Megan Cruz presented Toddler Time at the Cortez Library while the new children's librarian was completing processing and orientation.


## CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Fall Outreach—With school back in session, fall is a season filled with opportunities for children's services to reach out into the community and promote the library. The following outreach events were scheduled through the Children's Coordinator's office. Additional outreach events, handled exclusively at the Branch level, are not included in these highlights.

- September 20: Library Resources Roundup at Region 20. SAPL hosted a table at this full day event for regional school librarians. Staff promoted temporary electronic library cards for students needing eBooks and/or Homework Help, the Young Pegasus Poetry Competition and the upcoming National Latino Children's Literature Conference hosted by UTSA.
- September 22: Dorrie Miller Academy Family Resource Fair. Braulia Carrillo (Carver Children's Librarian) and Viki Ash (Children's Coordinator) invited participants to enjoy building with Straws & Connectors – experiencing first-hand the challenges of engineering a stable and sturdy structure.

Councilman Cruz dropped by to assist with the construction.

 September 26: Bonham Academy Literacy Night—Newlyappointed Principal David Nungaray used "Our Family Reads" as his inspiration for a school-sponsored family reading challenge. Both SAPL and the Bibliotech were both on hand to register students and parents for cards after hearing Councilwoman Sandoval and Councilman Treviño discuss September's theme of sustainability.



In House Special Events—Included among the many programs offered for children and adults working on behalf of children are three events of particular note.

- October 6: KLRN SciGirls Meet-Up. The SciGirls project provides opportunities for girls ages 8-13
  to share and embrace their love for ALL KINDS of science. The October Meet-Up, hosted at the
  Thousand Oaks Branch, included conversation about Viki's academic journey from kindergarten
  to a PhD in Library and Information Science as well as problem-solving experiences building a
  homemade hovercraft and engineering tissue paper parachutes.
- October 8: Students preparing to be teachers at UTSA visited the Central Library for an
  orientation of what the library offers and insights into how SAPL can be assistance once they
  have their own classrooms. Dr. Miriam Martinez, who teaches the children's literature course at
  UTSA reached out to arrange this visit after discovering that none of her students had visited the
  Central Library and very few had library cards.

# **TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)**

Partnership/Fiesta Youth—Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) worked with Erica Alcocer (Youth Facilitator, Fiesta Youth) to host two of four partnership programs scheduled for Fall 2018. In September, the teens at Pan American were excited about their upcoming Haunted House event at the branch and decided to promote it with a video. Teens took on a variety of roles such as director, actor/actress, and stylist in order to create a short promotional video with the help of Alcocer's background in film.

In October, the teens at Encino got into the Halloween spirit by making "Hallo-memes." Taking inspiration from popular memes, famous LGBTQ icons, and other relatable content, teens used blank templates as well as cutouts from magazines to create their own memes that utilized the humorous aspect of meme culture to convey personal and powerful messages. A special thanks to Nicole Garza (Library Assistant/Teen Liaison, Pan American) and Julia Pouliot (Teen Services Librarian I, Encino) for welcoming Fiesta Youth to their branches and helping facilitate this program.

Partnership/Off-Site Service—J.D. Elizondo (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) organized a book club with the librarian at Providence High School. The book club will be hosted at the Teen Library beginning in November.

During the reporting period, J.D. organized a visit to the Teen library for the principal and 29 teachers from Fox Tech High School. Teen Library staff will discuss resources available for teens at the Teen Library.

Off-Site Service—Adam Tutor, Teen Outreach Specialist for the system, visited several high schools during the reporting period:

Brennan HS – September 26—In partnership with Teen Services Librarian I Stephanie Vasquez of Great Northwest Library, Adam Tutor has begun a unique partnership with Brennan High School and their library department. In an effort to bring more students into their library, Brennan HS asked SAPL to provide programming and offer resources to teens during their lunch periods.

Adam demonstrated the value of the new portable recording system that Teen Services is utilizing as an example of the resources available at Central's Teen Library. Adam engaged with students interested in music production, as well as special needs students, by showcasing music production programs, live instruments, and new technology. The students then created their own music with Adam's help, and it created an atmosphere where all were able to participate.

Jefferson HS –October 1-4 & 12—Adam joined Jefferson HS Librarian Esperanza Garza-Danweber for a full week of day-long engagement and connection with teens from sophomores to seniors. This was a unique outreach, as it was the first time to display the new portable recording studio in a more formal setting, and offer a more hands-on approach to how to enjoy the library's vast resources.

Adam did this by creating unique beats and songs via the program Garage Band, sharing it with students, and then inviting them to contribute to the song with live instruments/vocals. Over the course of the engagement students created their own songs using the keyboard, recorded an official theme song for Jefferson Library, and participated in a live improvised session including guitar, violin, and trombone. The music also got the teachers and librarian engaged and culminated in the whole library clapping along as if a true concert were underway.

Adam also used this opportunity to promote a new initiative, *Live* @ *Teen Central*, a behind the scenes look at local singer /songwriters, producers, and bands that are actively creating music as a part of their living. They are coming into the Teen Library's professional recording studio to perform a live concert, share stories about their creative process, and engage with teens in an organic jam session or musical lesson. Students will come away with new musical skills, practical resources for contributing to the creative class, and inspiration from top artists in our city. *Live* @ *Teen Central* will kick-off on October 17, with special guest artists Andrea "Vocab" Sanderson and Jeff Palacios

Edison HS- October 9—Adam brought the Live @ Teen Central promotion to Edison for a full day of demonstration with the recording studio. This outreach specifically targeted art, choir, mariachi, and band students in order to create a deeper level of connection. Highlights included a live mariachi performance recorded, and vocalists stepping up to explore their sound in front of their classmates.

Clark HS- October 11—Adam joined Amy Rae Weaver, Teen Services Librarian I at Cody Branch, for a lunchtime session with the *Live* @ *Teen Central* promotion. Students stepped out of their traditional lunchtime socializing to take part in presentations from Adam and Amy, which culminated in a live jam session and students creating their own unique songs with the portable recording studio.

Programming—The annual Rock the Plaza event took place on the Central Library Plaza on Saturday, October 6. J.D. Elizondo (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) has organized the event for several years (in coordination with a committee comprised of teen librarians and liaisons from around the system). Rock the Plaza proved to be not only a great concert with teen performers, but also a community-building event. There were several talented teen musicians, as well as the Providence Progressions dance team. The Teen library has gained valuable partners in the Network for Young Artists, High Voltage Music, and Guitar Center, in addition to past and present partners in Providence Progressions Dance and the AM project.

J.D. and Georgina Salinas (Teen Services Librarian II, Bazan Library), along with a committee of teen librarians and liaisons, have been planning and organizing the upcoming annual Teen Arts Fest, which will take place at the Central Library on Saturday, November 3. J.D. and Georgina appeared on the SAPL podcast to promote both Rock the Plaza and the Teen Arts Fest.

To promote both Rock the Plaza and Teen Arts Fest, J.D. visited several schools and youth-serving organizations during the reporting period, including: Taft High School, Marshall High School, Cornerstone Christian Schools, Brennan High School, East Central High School, the NISD Fine Arts Director, Artpace, and local artist Alex Rubio.

System-wide support—Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) assisted with the Encino Branch Library's 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Cosplay Con on Saturday, September 22. Dressed in a unicorn onesie, Loaiza greeted patrons as they entered the building, directed attendees to the different activities at the event, signed up contestants for the cosplay competition, and served as a judge for the cosplay competition. Loaiza also coordinated with a volunteer to take photos of the event.

In support of the new Youth Re-engagement Center being opened by the Department of Human Services in the coming year, Jennifer Velasquez (Coordinator of Teen Services) and Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) worked with the DHS Committee as well as Project Worth/Metropolitan Health District and Fiesta Youth to organize a focus group of teens. On Tuesday, September 25, this teen group met at the Teen Library @ Central to provide their insights on the center's purpose, message, name, logo, and a variety of other topics.

Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) led a Teen Services Convention & Outreach Workgroup meeting with other Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons. This workgroup is

seeking to identify new local conventions and events for Teen Services to have a presence at, as well as new ways to promote Teen Services, our resources, and the San Antonio Public Library at these conventions and events. In November, Teen Services will be at two local conventions: Nerdvana Con (presented by Northside ISD at Stevens High School) as well as PokéFest SA. At both conventions, Teen Services will be hosting console/virtual reality gaming areas.

Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and J.D. Elizondo (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) are participating in the SAPL's Mentor Program for the second time. Kathleen and J.D. will both serve as mentors during the six-month program.

## **ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)**

As part of a grant obtained by the San Antonio Public Library Foundation, a digital literacy instructor has been engaged for the rest of 2018. Daniel Gomez will be traveling to various branch libraries to provide computer classes including the following topics: Computer Basics, Internet Basics, Introduction to Email, Resume Writing, Online Job Searching, Introduction to Microsoft Word, and Introduction to Microsoft Excel. Some of the classes will be offered in Spanish as well. The most up-to-date class schedule can be found on the Library's online calendar. In addition, the instructor will be offering one on one technology assistance when he is not leading classes. Mr. Gomez has been a volunteer at the Bazan Branch Library for three years leading a weekly ESL book club as part of Learn and SAPL.

The STEAM for Adults series of programs will continue throughout the rest of October. Sessions focusing on Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math are being offered at 25 locations. Some highlights include astronomy nights at Collins Garden on October 23 and at San Pedro on October 30, exploring the paranormal at Bazan on October 24, and Forest Hills' annual STEM day on October 27. This year's topic is Forensic Science and experts will be on hand to discuss Crime Scene Investigation, Forensic Pathology, and more.

Coordinator of Services to Adult Haley Holmes completed ten speeches in the past year to become a Competent Communicator through Toastmasters International. She will be serving as President for the City of San Antonio Toastmasters Club for FY2019.

#### **CENTRAL LIBRARY**

#### CHILDREN'S

Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin presented engaging *Play & Learn* and *Toddler Time* programs this month. She and Librarian Nicole Cubillas teamed up to present pizza themed programs that saw children "cooking" play dough pizzas in a cardboard "oven" and experiencing a tub full of plastic vegetables. Needless to say, everyone left the events hungry! Ms. Seglin created story times with a bath time theme. Children gave baby dolls baths in soapy warm water, "splashed" in a kiddie pool full of bubble wrap, filled a butcher paper bathtub with paper ducks and bubble shapes, and enjoyed a sensory bin full of white pompoms. The imaginative play continued with a seasonal fall theme. Toddlers gleefully jumped into a large pile of paper leaves and showered them down onto forest animal puppets. They experienced the sensory elements of play dough mixed with bird seed, examined a variety of acorns using magnifying glasses and made their own leaf rubbings. Ms. Seglin crafted a scavenger hunt series of programs in which children were challenged to spot hidden shapes around the Story Room. They got in the detective

spirit with guessing game books and special "I Spy" wands to help them on their hunt. They also tried to discover items hidden inside the play dough they kneaded.

Librarian Nicole Cubillas presented *Bilingual Story Times* to a preschool audience. In celebration of "Talk Like a Pirate Day," she read stories about pirates and introduced a shark bean bag toss game and encouraged them to explore a "treasure chest" full of plastic bead necklaces. Children enjoyed a food themed program that celebrated traditional Latino dishes. They crafted tamales from play dough and wrapped them in real *hojas*. Ms. Cubillas presented her own spin on the system-wide Hispanic Heritage Month program, *Celebrando el Sol*, by sharing bilingual songs and imaginative play experiences that featured the sun. Children planted seeds in a cardboard "garden" and gave a weather forecast in front of a cardboard camera! Bilingual Story Time focused on animals with sensory bins full of animal toys, an animal collaborative art activity and animal habitat building using DUPLO bricks.

Librarian Lea Ann McDonald continued to create unique Family Fun experiences for families visiting on Saturdays. She shared stories and information about Native American cultures of the Pacific Northwest, focusing on the totem art form for further creative exploration. Ms. McDonald presented an engaging program with a seashore theme by providing real seashell specimens and magnifying glasses. Children learned the names of common shells with a matching game and contributed to a collaborative seashore art piece. Children also decorated boxes with colored sand designs to take home and store their treasures in. Ms. McDonald shared stories featuring African American artists including Kadir Nelson, Maya Angelou, Kehinde Wiley, Romare Bearden, Jean Michel Basquiat, and Langston Hughes. Her selections represented a wide variety of successful African American artists, including their creativity, talent and contributions to our world. Children discovered new approaches to artwork and poetry with collage activities and writing prompts.

The Central Children's department enjoyed a visit from Jorge Ochoa of Tambo Rhythms. He led the group of over 50 people on an interactive drumming and rhythm experience. Children took turns leading the group of enthusiastic drummers, much to their delight.

Ms. McDonald led a group of homeschooling families on a tour of the Central Library. She shared the wealth of resources available at the library for children of all ages, especially those specific to the needs of homeschoolers. In what has become a reoccurring event every semester, students from San Antonio College's Early Childhood Studies program and the Family Services Association Early Childhood Education program visited the Central Children's Department as part of their coursework. Central Children's staff gathered book selections on a wide array of topics that were central to their education in early childhood development, such as different family types, cycles of life and multiculturalism. It can be time-consuming for the novice library user to track books like these down, so the students benefited greatly from the librarians' expertise in gathering materials for them.

An array of spooky book displays popped up in the Central Children's department in anticipation of Halloween. Ms. McDonald created a large Halloween picture book display, complete with a decorated cart to hold all the chilling reads. Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez crafted a display sign full of question marks to entice patrons to her selection non-fiction books about unexplained phenomenon. Ms. Cubillas highlighted middle grade novels featuring cryptid creatures and monsters with an eye-catching collage poster with images of Bigfoot, UFOs and the Loch Ness monster.

Central Children's department staff continued their monthly outreach visits. Ms. Seglin shared stories and songs with students in two classes at Madison Square Child Development Center, where she delivered several bags of books in support of the school's curriculum. Ms. Cubillas worked with administrators at Central Christian Childcare Center to select and deliver books for use in their classrooms. Ms. McDonald started a new relationship with The Discovery School, delivering them their

first set of specially selected books relating to their lesson plans this month. Ms. Fernandez visited the San Antonio College Early Childhood Center and read Halloween stories to two classes of children. She also dropped off Halloween books for the groups to enjoy all month.

Ms. Seglin attended the 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Congress on Children Conference, which educated professionals on the stress and adverse childhood experiences that many children face. Several speakers who have had success in creating a positive change for kids with negative childhood experiences shared their stories with the group. Ms. Seglin came away from the experience with a renewed sense of compassion and determination to ensure that the library be a place where kids and families feel welcome, accepted, and safe.

Manager Kate Simpson is participating in the SAPL Mentor Program as a mentor to Landa Branch Manager Kiyanna Stephens.

#### **TEENS**

Mondays with J.D. Elizondo (Library Assistant)—J.D. continued to facilitate Eclectic Electric music programming in the Teen Library's recording studio. Teens are invited to play instruments for fun and/or for school practice and record their music if they wish. With J.D. facilitating, teens have been planning and creating the annual Teen Library Haunted House.

J.D. took on the role of advisor for teen Morgan's Girl Scout Golden Project. Morgan is planning on creating an art installation with the theme of recycling and would like to display her work at the Library in the winter.

Tuesdays with Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager—): The Nintendo Switch continues to attract new and veteran gamers to Tuesday night's programming. Teens continued to play through "Lovers in a Dangerous Spacetime," with one group finally beating the game—on easy. Although they were determined to continue their winning streak, teens quickly realized that their spacecraft-flying skills needed a little more fine-tuning before conquering a harder difficulty mode. Taking a departure from indie gaming, "Mario Kart 8 Deluxe" has also been a hit for teens looking for something a little more competitive and familiar. The amount of customization available for teens throughout the game allows for a great deal of creativity and independence, and although teens are quick to race for first place, they are just as willing to cooperate during team modes. Due to a high interest in "Fortnite," Loaiza is also working with a group of teens who are eager to plan a series of events around the game.

Dungeons & Dragons—: In mid-September, a group of teens officially embarked on a new adventure through the magic of Dungeons & Dragons at the Teen Library @ Central. Matthew previously worked with the group to determine what resources they would like to request, as well as when and how often they would like to meet. With one teen taking on the role of the Dungeon Master and the others embodying brave adventurers, the group will meet every Sunday at the Teen Library @ Central to continue their campaign.

Wednesdays with Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT)—Every Wednesday evening, Ciana facilitates technology programming in the lab in the Teen Library to assist teens with designing 3D models to print and finding printed models online. She also facilitates use of the Oculus Rift, a Virtual Reality headset loaded with games for teens.

Thursdays with Regina Almanza (Library Assistant)—Celebrating culture, both genuine and pop, teens created, cooked, and crafted during programming sessions, some that they took an active part in planning with staff encouragement. For a celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, teens imitated an Aztec hot chocolate in a more palatable way, using chocolate, cinnamon and chiles, in honor of Aztecs who ground the cacoa bean into a thick spicy drink. Teens also used pushpins to mark outlines in photo mat frames that they threaded embroidery floss through to create stitched artworks.

Natalie, Teen Library volunteer, suggested a Star Wars night, complete with movies and crafts. Teens made Yoda Soda, character-themed pancakes, bubble magnets and paper lanterns with character cutouts.

The start of October began a series of Halloween-themed programs. The first saw teens use a recipe chosen from a new library book based on the popular online cooking channel Tasty, two teen boys recommended the pretzel cheeseburger bombs, that they would make skull-shaped for Halloween. The recipe proved doable and delicious. Teens paired the skulls with a candy corn layered drink. Teen Brianna wondered if Teen Library could have a Halloween tree. Using the top half of a Christmas tree headed to the trash, Brianna painted it black and began making Halloween ornaments, encouraging her friends to participate. The tree is set at the end of the computer table at Teen Library. Other teens have been encouraged to contribute to the tree by making items using craft supplies from the craft box area.

A crowd favorite, baking and decorating cookies was brought back. Teen shaped cookies like skulls, cats, pumpkins and bats. Afterwards, teens took Model Magic to create eerie coverings for plastic stemware.

Fulfilling the nutrition lesson for the month (for the San Antonio Food Bank's sponsorship requirements), teens learned of the benefits of popcorn. Learning that the nutritional value of popcorn is at its highest when unflavored, teens knew they wouldn't eat it without some sort of flavoring. So, without adding loads of melted butter and salt that they would get with microwave or pre-packaged bags, teens used a sprinkle of canola oil, cinnamon, and mini chocolate chips on air-popped popcorn that required no oils to pop. This newfound way to appreciate a favorite snack in a heart-healthy way lessened calories as well.

After most Thursday night food and craft times, teens request a gaming system, where they engage in some friendly competition. Harry Potter Party Saturday (September)—Pairing nicely with the recent hubbub of the 20th anniversary of the first Harry Potter book, teen volunteers Esteban and Olivia collaborated to make signage, decorations, and produce a list of activities and foods for the traditional Harry Potter teen party. Teens made butterbeer, chocolate and non-chocolate frogs, stenciled painted banners, beadsprites, potion bottle jewelry, keychains, and wands, pumpkin caramel crescents and had cake, jellybeans and slugs.

Basketball Saturday (October) —To celebrate the beginning of a new basketball season, one sporty teen suggested having a basketball day. The day consisted of making basketball decorated cupcakes, using the buttonmaker to make team buttons and making perler bead items. Watching basketball-themed movies: a new funny favorite *Uncle Drew* and an old favorite *Space Jam*, and eating popcorn made for a pleasant Library Saturday.

#### REFERENCE

During a recent New Employee Training at Central, Reference staff learned that Heather Swindell, a new Library Assistant at Westfall Branch, used the Jobs and Small Business Center to apply for the job. Ms. Swindell recalled that Reference Librarian, Deedee Lu helped with her application. Ms. Swindell also rang in her good news by ringing the JSBC Bell which is encouraged when someone gets a job!

This month San Antonio Public Library's podcast *Tuned In* discussed current reading selections for the team and books that inspired them to re-read over and over in a segment called *What's on your bookshelf?* Online listeners were also encouraged to share what was on their bookshelf in the comment section. Teen Services staff members J. D. Elizondo and Georgina Salinas, representing Central and Bazan branches respectively and were interviewed for the *Teen Arts Fest/Rock the Plaza* segment. The SAPL Podcast celebrated receiving 1,000 visits on *Soundcloud!* 

In recognition of Hunger Action Month the Reference team not only created a display with books about the socioeconomic, cultural, and global impacts of hunger but, partnered with the San Antonio Food Bank to host a food drive at Central and four other branches. With the help of staff and patrons, Central was able to fill its fifty-five gallon donation container to help reach the goal of 1,000 pounds of food!

In the Computer Basics Class held at the end of September, participating patrons were introduced to the parts of a computer. From that beginning, attendees learned how to navigate the Desktop and gain access to the Internet; time was also spent on developing "mouse" skills. Upon completing the course, students were happy to save their well-deserved certificates on brand new flash drives.

To support the National Voter's Registration Day event held at Central on September 24, Reference staff created a display which included eye-catching signs (shared on social media and seen on KSAT 12 evening news); one sign in English – "Your Vote, Your Voice" and a sign in Spanish – "Su Voto, Su Voz".

A Frankenstein themed display greets Central Library visitors in the first floor lobby. It was created under the direction of Vicky Villalobos (Librarian I). The display celebrates the 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the publication of Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*. The display design uses imagery suggesting lightening and the Monster's neck bolts. Books displayed are inspired by and adapted the original novel.

# LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER

On Saturday, September 22<sup>nd</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center hosted the workshop 'Border/Bordad: Writing, Embroider, Creating Autohistoria in San Antonio' with Laurie Ann Guerrero, Bonnie Cisneros, and Sarah Castillo. All three women carry the legacy of culture making and art through their mothers, who first taught them how to wield both ink and thread as children. Guerrero is a local writer, 2016-17 Poet Laureate of the State of Texas, and Writer-in-Residence at Texas A&M-San Antonio. Cisneros has taught middle school English and Social Studies at an inner-city charter school and earned an MFA in Creative Writing from Texas State University. Castillo is a local mixed media artist and earned her MA in Bicultural Studies. The event drew 30 attendees.

On Saturday, September 22<sup>nd</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center hosted acclaimed author David Bowles for a unique presentation where he discussed his book "Feathered Serpent, Dark Heart of Sky: Myths of Mexico" and his unparalleled research of Mexican folklore, which includes speaking Nahuatl, the Uto-Aztecan language.

On Wednesday, October 3rd the Latino Collection and Resource Center partnered with the Texana/Genealogy unit to present a lecture by author and scholar of Chicano arts and culture Tomás Ybarra-Frausto. The presentation was in honor of Hispanic Heritage Month and American Archives month, highlighting the importance of documenting and preserving Latino archives.

On Thursday, October 4<sup>th</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center partnered with Gemini Ink to present 'Three Centuries of Latino Writing and Resistance in San Antonio', a public conversation to discuss the history of Tejana writing and the role of newspapers in the 19<sup>th</sup> century San Antonio. Moderated by moderated by Tomás Ybarra-Frausto & Carmen Tafolla, with guest panelists Jerry Poyo, and Raúl Coronado. This event drew 60 attendees.

On Saturday, October 6<sup>th</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center was host to UTSA Associate Professor Gabriela Gonzalez who provided a unique presentation regarding her recent publication 'Redeeming La Raza: Transborder Modernity, Race, Respectability and Rights'. This event drew 20 attendees who learned the history of Mexican-American transborder activism in the United States, how Mexican women challenged patriarchal structures, and more.

On Monday, October 8<sup>th</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center was host to photographer Joel Salcido Ruiz who read excerpts from his book, "The Spirit of Tequila" and provided a guided tour of his photo exhibit in the Central Library Gallery. Salcido, who now lives in San Antonio, documented the tequila-making process in Mexico and has returned to South Texas to display his work. This partnership with the San Antonio Cocktail conference drew 45 attendees who enjoyed a tequila tasting after the program.

On Tuesday, October 9<sup>th</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center was host to 'Chocolate and Tequila' in partnership with the San Antonio Cocktail Conference. 30 participants enjoyed a variety of dark, flavorful chocolate with sips of a variety of tequilas courtesy of Chocollazo.

On Saturday, October 13<sup>th</sup> the Latino Collection and Resource Center was host to 'My Tejano Roots' with author and historical researcher Edna Campos Gravenhorst in partnership with the Texana/Genealogy unit. Gravenhort's focus is to encourage Latinos, Hispanics, Mexican-Americans and Tejanos to find their sense of place in Texas history with a mission is "to encourage nuestra gente, our people, to donate information to our institutions". Additionally, Gravenhorst is San Antonio Certified Tourism Ambassador. This event drew 18 attendees, who were also able to digitize their personal photos and videos using SAPL memory lab equipment.

## TEXANA/ GENEALOGY

Texana team members participated in the White Glove Fundraising Event that was hosted by the San Antonio Public Library Foundation in the Texana room on September 24. Staff curated seven table-top exhibits and engaged with guests in sharing their knowledge of the special collections held in Texana.

Librarian II Matt DeWaelsche presented a Preserving Family Treasures class on September 18 for patrons at the Igo Library.

On September 28-29 Texana staff members Debbie Countess (Assistant Manager), Sylvia Reyna (Librarian I), and Clarissa Chavira (Library Assistant) attended the 39<sup>th</sup> State Hispanic Genealogical & Historical Conference organized by the Los Bexarenos Genealogical Historical Society. The event included daily workshops with a focus on history, education and genealogy related to the San Antonio's Tricentennial as well as presentations by international speakers on history and genealogy topics. Librarian Sylvia Reyna was an invited speaker and presented a lecture on Texana/Genealogy resources.

Ms. Reyna participated in the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Historic Homeowner Fair at the Pearl Stable on September 29. The free event hosted by the City's Office of Historical Preservation provided an opportunity for owners of aging and historic homes to connect with local professionals learn about caring for and maintaining their properties.

Ms. Countess presented a Beginning Genealogy class on October 2 for seniors at the Morningside Manor through Oasis San Antonio, a unique educational program for older adults.

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month and American Archives Month, on Oct 3 Author and scholar of Chicano arts and culture Tomás Ybarra-Frausto presented his lecture *Bringing Shadows into Light: The Latino Archive to Be*, which highlighted the importance of documenting and preserving Latino archives.

Ms. Countess led the class *Intro to Ancestry (Library Edition)* for patrons at the Pan Am Library on October 4.

On Saturday, October 6 staff provided a tour of Texana to visiting 4<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade educators who participated in the Alamo Educator Workshop *Texas History and ELA*.

On October 13 Author, historical researcher, Edna Campos Gravenhorst, presented "My Tejano Roots" tracing her lineage which touches on ranching in South Texas. Her focus was to encourage Latinos, Hispanics, Mexican-Americans and Tejanos to find their sense of place in Texas history. #### **BAZAN**

Children's Librarian Hope Sonnen was invited to Irving Academy's Open House Night on September 18 to promote the library to attendees. She saw fourteen adults and sixteen children visit her table and learn about library resources and programs. Ms. Sonnen also started her book clubs at Crockett and Margil Academies in late September. The book clubs will meet through the year.

All students agreed that the tour helped to allay their fears and anxiety about the citizenship application process. The group was personally escorted by District Director Mario Ortiz, who oversees USCIS services from San Antonio to El Paso.

On Wednesday, September 19, Training Officer Emily Flores attended the San Antonio Housing Authority Early Engagement Program Resource Fair held on the KIPP St. Anne's Campus. The event, a mandatory orientation for new housing program residents, had an incredible turnout.

Bazan library partnered with the San Antonio Food Bank to offer afterschool snacks on Mondays and Wednesdays for children eighteen and younger starting in October and ending in May. Teen librarian Georgina Salinas offered teen programs following the afterschool snack program on Mondays and Wednesdays.

On Tuesday October 2 Ms. Salinas represented Bazan Library at the Guadalupe Arts Center during National Night Out, a well-attended event. Ms. Salinas along with library assistant Edward Mayberry visited Lanier High School during Teen Read Week to advocate reading to young adults. Teenagers who visited the library booth left with free young adult books along with other library swag and information about programming events at Bazan Library.

In celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, the Bazan branch showed the movie Cesar Chavez and the documentary Willie Velasquez: Your Vote Is Your Voice.

On September 26, Coloring for Grown-Ups welcomed several new patrons who came to listen to some music, eat snacks and color along with some of our regular attendees.

The Bad Girls Romance Club met on September 29. Three new patrons attended in addition to our regulars who meet monthly to discuss romance books, movies and TV shows. Although the reading club is open to all adults, the group saw its first male attend in September! He decided to join when he overheard his fiancée listening to the audio version of the current read, *Stuck up Suit by VI* Keeland and Penelope Ward, and became interested in the story.

The Alamo City Browncoats met on Sunday September 30 with its regular members in attendance. They discussed cosplay in relation to the Firefly series and episodes that had the best costumes/outfits.

On October 3 Bazan held a sushi making workshop with Chinatsu Oku from UTSA's East Asia Institute. Over a dozen patrons came to learn about food in Japan and how sushi differs in America versus Japan. After the presentation by Chinatsu, patrons had the opportunity to put their culinary skills to the test and made their very own rolls to eat. The participation was great and families really enjoyed the experience!

The Midnight Paranormal Group gathered again at Bazan on October 10 for another series of ghost hunting programs. The group presented three previous successful programs in the summer at Bazan and has returned for fall STEAM programming.

The Bazan journaling meet up group is going very well! Several patrons have been attending monthly meetings to learn and discuss journaling techniques with program facilitator Library Aide Stephanie Perez. The group swaps materials, shares ideas while enjoying music and snacks.

#### **BROOK HOLLOW**

In September, Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas continued weekly early literacy programming at Brook Hollow with Baby Time, Toddler Time, and Story Time. Baby Time program attendance numbers continue to grow with over twenty babies and their caregivers attending weekly. The addition of a play element after Toddler Time continues to be a big hit with families as the majority of children and their caregivers stay after the stories to play for the remainder of the hour.

Brook Hollow branch continues to provide children's programs after school for older children with Read to a Dog, Come & Go Crafts, and Tween Time offered weekly and a bimonthly Lego Club. Lego Club still struggles to get a regular attendance, but every week families visit Brook Hollow to build together and tackle the building challenge. The Read to a Dog program at Brook Hollow continues to draw over forty people a week as children pet and read and cuddle with various therapy dogs that visit Brook Hollow on Friday afternoons. Tween Time attendance continues to grow with children ages nine to twelve dropping in for fun activities ranging from games to art. Library Assistant Elissa Vura continues to share in the responsibly of Tween Time with Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas as they alternate who develops and runs the weekly program. In September, Assistant Manager Caroline Mossing also assisted with Tween Time engaging the tweens in various one minute challenge games.

For the last two Fridays in September, Brook Hollow also hosted in-house storytimes for the Country Home #2 three year and four year old classrooms. Ms. Salinas arranged storytimes and fun activities that included playing with play dough and straws and connectors. After the storytime, one of the teachers of the four year old classroom came back to the library during her break to check out the books read and grab a few other books recommended by Ms. Salinas. She commented that Ms. Salinas was really good with children and in the perfect job.

On the first Tuesday in October, Ms. Salinas also presented the first Play and Learn program for the fall. The program was all about blocks and building and included playdough, art, and sensory bin activities for ages one to five years old. Almost fifty children attended the program with their caregivers, and the children had fun building and playing for the entire hour.

Brook Hollow hosted artist Sierra Kioko Arteaga who taught an art class for school age children on how to draw ponies. Several children came with their caregivers for the art lesson, and enjoyed their time learning how to perfect their drawing abilities.

Also in October, Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas and Part-Time Library Aide Elizabeth Jimenez, a native Spanish speaker, presented a bilingual story time for Hispanic Heritage month. Twenty-five children along with their caregivers joined us for fun movement songs and books about the sun. After dancing, singing, and stories, the children made a sun craft to take home and played with bright sunny yellow play dough.

Ms Salinas also visited the Head Start Rhapsody and presented story times and dropped off books to five classrooms ranging in age from three to five years in September. She made arrangements to visit the site monthly for the coming school year. Additionally, in October, Ms. Salinas began visiting the Heimer KinderCare location, and provided storytimes for three classrooms. She is in the process of coordinating monthly visits with this day care center, and will in the future also drop off books for classroom use.

Library Assistant Jennifer Olivarez helped Ms. Salinas design two book displays in the children's area that featured books that rhyme in honor of the kickoff of Young Pegasus and books that featured Latino authors and illustrators in honor Hispanic Heritage Month.

During the reporting period, teens at Brook Hollow played video games and crafted unique slimes. Teens used the branch's Wii U to play in Mario Kart and Super Smash Bros. Participants compared their best moves and engaged in friendly competition, complete with some gentle ribbing about players' skill and misfortune in the game. On another day, participants opted to experiment with chemistry and made slimes using different formulas. Most opted to include glitter for pizazz and shaving cream for maximum fluff. Some combinations worked better than others, and when a slime was insufficiently goopy, the group researched possible fixes and experimented with these. (Hot tip: warm water worked better than lotion for the teens at Brook Hollow.)

On Wednesday, September 19, the Wednesday Evening Book group met to discuss *Go Set A Watchman* by Harper Lee. The group also added a new member to have eleven members total. The group continues to grow and looks forward to meeting at the library each month.

On September 26, Brook Hollow hosted its second program on Acrylic Pouring. At this program, back by popular demand, thirteen patrons had the hands on experience of learning this messy art technique.

Brook Hollow Library Assistant Jennifer Olivarez presented a Jack O'Lantern book craft on October 10. Discarded books were used to make jack o'lanterns with the pages of the book. Patrons found it festive and wanted to try more in the future.

#### **CARVER**

Assistant Manager Monty Holcomb hosted four Chess Events which continue to be steadily attended by a variety of patrons. Mr. Holcomb also hosted four official Teen Time events with the Wii. Mr. Holcomb also continues to facilitate both the weekly Tai Chi program and Easy Yoga program, both of which consistently have high attendance rates. Mr. Holcomb continued to host the Book Club at the District 2 Senior Center, making four visits during this period.

Mr. Holcomb also did an outreach visit to Davis Middle School, where he taught several dozen students chess and presented details about the chess and teen programs at Carver Library. Mr. Holcomb and a work study student also gave a digital camera presentation as part of the system-wide STEAM programming.

#### CODY

Tweens sat in a circle on the floor and rolled the ball back and forth. While rolling the ball back and forth, tweens asked ice breaker questions that everyone answered on their turn.

The Music Fairy stopped by during *Story Time* on September 19<sup>th</sup> to share action songs and stories set to music. The children were delighted by the talented singing fairy and learned a lot more about music.

During a *Come & Go Crafts* program on September 20<sup>th</sup> children made coffee filter fall leaves. First they cut leaf shapes out of the coffee filters, and then they colored the leaves with markers. Once they were finished coloring, they sprayed their leaves with water, a favorite fine-motor skill building activity, and watched the colors diffuse throughout their leaves.

On September 24<sup>th</sup> tweens learned how to make soap slime, a type of slime that you can actually use to wash your hands. Tweens learned the importance of measuring the ingredients correctly when making slime.

Children made fun out of all the rain that we've had lately with a rain themed *Kid's Time* on September 26<sup>th</sup>. Children learned how to make rain sticks, did a science experiment with shaving cream to see how clouds release rain, and created shaved crayon raindrops.

Tweens made Pumpkin Cake Pops during *Tween Time* on October 1<sup>st</sup>. Tweens learned how to make cake pops and then learned how to decorate them to look like pumpkins.

Children's Librarian Kristin Yourdon visited Locke Hill Elementary School on October 2<sup>nd</sup> to lead an after-school writing club for 4<sup>th</sup> grade students.

Children celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month with a craft program on October 4<sup>th</sup>. Kids made both individual Folk Art Mexican suns and one big collaborative sun to hang in the children's area.

On Tuesday October 2 Cortez Branch hosted their second annual "National Night IN" event. Over fifty local customers came to play games, color, snack, and socialize. During the event the Branch was visited by Library Board Member Andrea Sanchez, SAFFE Officer Lupe Rodriguez and PSA Jake Odland.

The Branch is happy to announce that Children's Librarian Angela O'Malley began working for SAPL on September 29. Her welcome brunch was held at the Branch on October 11 after her training and orientation were completed.

Branch Manager Brantley wants to again recognize those who helped get the Branch through the month of September without a Children's Librarian: Rozanna Bennett from McCreless as well as Mary Grace Moreno and Megan Cruz from Little Read Wagon. She would also like to extend a huge thank you to Cortez staff members Madeline Vasquez and Esmeralda Staudt for conducting programming during this period.

On September 19 the staff continued their practice of celebrating anything and everything by taking part in "Talk Like a Pirate Day". Several staff members wore costumes and all of the Children's activities that day included pirate stories and related crafts.

Bilingual Baby Time (Esmeralda Staudt)—Mrs. Staudt presented a series of lap songs and rhymes about counting, clapping, and playing peek-a-boo in both English and Spanish. Music and dancing were a welcome addition to this month's programs. Board books focusing on the ocean, sea animals, and pirates were read aloud. Afterward babies enjoyed some time to crawl around and play while parents socialized with Mrs. Staudt and each other. As the only bilingual Baby Time in the city Cortez receives visitors from near and far.

Teen Librarian Julia Pouliot hosted eight programs for teens during this reporting period including a joint program with San Antonio's LGTBQ organization for teens, Fiesta Youth. For this special edition *Teen Club*, teens got in the Halloween spirit by making Hallow-memes with upcycled magazines, comic books, and manga from the teen closet, all of which are now on display in the teen room. Our monthly *Teen Board Gaming* was extra fun this month with two teens bringing games from home to share with the group. Lastly, our weekly *Teen Anime Club* screened over six different anime shows this month, finally settling on one we have all been enjoying about a demon who works part-time at a fast food restaurant.

Ms. Pouliot visited David Lee "Tex" Hill Middle school for Teen Read Week again this year. She presented to five classes of 8<sup>th</sup> grade English students about the resources that the public library has to offer, as well as the continuing and the upcoming programs for teens at the Encino Library. Twenty students also received new library cards during her visit.

Children's Librarian Robin Alcorta continues to get excellent attendance to Baby Time, Toddler Time, and Story Time. Each story time is scheduled for one hour, with about 40 minutes focused on literacy, rhymes, and song; and the second part focused on play. Play is one of the most important parts of Toddler Time. Children's Librarian Robin Alcorta started a new STEM+ focused program for elementary-aged children. STEAM Tuesdays have been quite fun and exciting. Bubble experiment day was the most enjoyable! Children pondered questions like "why do bubbles pop?" and "does the shape of the wand determine the shape of the bubble?" Children made their own bubble solution and watched a short demonstration by Ms. Alcorta on bubbles. She explained that if a person wets anything, they can make a bubble as big as the table. The children talked about air taking up space and the more gas there is, the bigger the bubble will be. Children designed their own bubble wands and went outside to experiment with them. Lastly, food coloring was added to some of the bubble solution and the children made bubble art.

Tween Time is a regular favorite program at Landa. This month, the tweens experimented with bath bombs. They made their own customized bath bombs. The tweens experimented with different colors and scents. They even created their own shapes. The best part was watching the bath bombs fizz and dissolve in water.

Landa Teen programming continued to grow this month. Alongside Teen Liaison Rebekah Corley, the group held their bi-annual Movie Month, this time celebrating all things Marvel via film screenings, crafts and thematic cooking how-tos. Teen Study Spot continued to provide a dedicated space for teens to study and socialize afterschool and Drop In Volunteering had teens building book displays, posting pics on SAPL Teens' 210 Flickr, and continuing to help plan for Landa Boo.

Ms. Corley attended the Texas Teen Book Festival in Austin, attending several YA author panels, information sessions and even seeing some of SAPL's teens! She also attended a community National Night Out with Landa's Assistant Branch Manager, Karen Sebesta, where they promoted Landa events and took photos with the branch green screen.

Additionally, Ms.Corley supported an outreach at Edison High School with Teen Outreach Specialist, Adam Tutor, where they spoke to over 200 students, sharing information about SAPL's homework resources and teen programs across the system. Teens had the chance to participate in a live demonstration of Teen Libraries' mobile music studio, too

Adult programming is back in gear for the fall. Expert financial planner Paul Darr was here for a return visit to talk about his "boxes" method for securing one's retirement income. His method is a good mix of stocks, savings, and real estate. Paul is very personable and low-key and always gets good comments from his audience.

Teen Librarian Rebekah Corley teamed up with Adult Programming Librarian Karen Sebesta once again to represent Landa at the National Night Out at Laurel Heights United Methodist Church. They greeted a number of regular Landa patrons and introduced others to the programs, materials, and services that Landa has to offer.

Ms. Corley and Ms. Sebesta also team up to supervise Landa's volunteers. Several of them are teens who work with the Teen Leadership Committee to plan and produce teen programs (and clean up afterward!). Others work at library tasks such as assisting with router, shelving holds, pulling items from created lists and helping produce children's craft material. Landa also has a Trinity University

Landa's adult book programs, Reader's Ink, the Mystery Book Club, and the Book Club at the Village at the Incarnate Word are all growing in members. This session, Reader's Ink read John Berendt's *Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil*, a true-crime book that reads like a novel. It is set in the colorful city of Savannah, Georgia which is as much a character as the people in the book. The Mystery Book Club read M.C. Beaton's *Death of a Ghost*—a light mystery set in Scotland featuring Police Detective Hamish MacBeth. In fact, this volume is number thirty-three in the MacBeth series. The Village at the Incarnate Word group read *The Curious Charms of Arthur Pepper* by Phaedra Patrick. Set primarily in England, it is the story of a recent widower who discovers a charm bracelet that belonged to his late wife. It's bangles lead him on a series of adventures to uncover facts about the life his wife led before they met. It is delightful.

On Sunday, October 14, Landa hosted Martha Miller, author of New Times Roman, a memoir about a couple who sell their possessions and move to Italy. This local author is a delightful presenter and loves to present to book groups. Adult Program Librarians should contact Karen at Landa for Ms. Miller's contact information.

#### LAS PALMAS

On Monday, September 17, Children's Librarian Barbaraella Frazier and Library Assistant Elvia Ramos attended the Literacy Night event held at *Kipp Un Mundo Dual* Language Academy. Ms. Frazier and Ms. Ramos promoted Las Palmas Branch programs, especially for children, and spoke with families about library cards and resources available through the San Antonio Public Library.

The Las Palmas Library celebrated National Play Dough Day twice. Once on Monday, September 17 during Family Fun, and on Tuesday the 18<sup>th</sup> during Bilingual Story Time, where children learned the names of different colors in Spanish and English before practicing with the colors of the play dough. Play dough is an excellent medium for helping children develop fine motor skills and exercise their imaginations.

On Monday September 24, children learned about Zoos during Family Fun. In addition to learning about animals and playing a game to recognize different species of animals, children also created crafts to make their own "dream" zoo.

During Family Fun on Monday, October 1, Las Palmas families learned about the ecosystems of rivers, including animals that might be found around rivers. Children played a guessing game to identify animal tracks or did a craft for making animal tracks. The books *A City Through Time:* From Ancient Colony to Vast Metropolis and A Street Through Time by Steve Noon were used to show children how humans have used rivers to develop cities and settlements throughout history. Children helped create a cooperative riverbed craft and their own riverbed creation to take home.

On Tuesday, October 3, Children's Librarian Barbaraella Frazier participated in *National Night Out* at Jubilee Lakeview University Prep, promoting library events, programs and resources.

On Monday, October 8, Las Palmas celebrated Hispanic Heritage during Family Fun. Families made craft projects with *Mosaic* and traditional designs.

On Friday September 21st and Friday October 5th, Children's Librarian Barbaraella Frazier visited Jubilee Lakeview University Prep and performed story-time for different classes with children in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, first grade, and second grade. Ms. Frazier read *Spoon* and the sequel *Chopsticks* by Amy Krouse Rosenthal, Halloween themed books such as *Frankenbunny* by Jill Esbaum and *Bonaparte Falls Apart* by Margery Cuyler. Most of the Halloween books were items that the San Antonio Public Library just added in 2018.

Las Palmas held a Walking Dead Day for teens and adults to celebrate the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the graphic novel. There were three types of zombie tabletop games plus the Plants Vs Zombies video game. Each participant received a gift bag with a Walking Dead comic, buttons, bandanas and other goodies.

#### **MAVERICK**

While the Ladies Choice Book Club met on September 29, the Lady Mavs Book Club met on Tuesday, October 9. The South Texas Role Playing Games Group met on the remaining two Sundays in September and the first two Sundays in October. The Granaderos y Damas de Galvez provided a thorough living history presentation of Spain's contribution toward the American Revolution. The audience was captivated with the presenter's colonial uniforms, relics and interesting historic stories.

Braun Hollow Homeowners Association met on September 28. Maverick's Friends of the Library held its Fall Used Book sale on October 13 and 14. The Friends Group diligently planned and worked together to have another successful book sale event.

The Maverick Chess Club met on Monday, September 17 and October 1.

Maverick Library welcomed a couple groups of children to the branch. On September 24, Pre-K and Kinder students from Scenic Hills Adventist School attended preschool story time and then Children's Librarian, Amy Roberts, gave them a tour of the library. Also, preschool aged kids from Kids R Kids Daycare came to preschool story time on October 1. Ms. Roberts also provided the children a tour after storytime.

Children's Librarian, Ms. Roberts, conducted outreach to the afterschool program at Bandera TLC Daycare on October 9. Ms. Roberts read a STEM related book and then the children created things out of straws and connectors that she provided.

Amy Roberts attended the children's Librarian's Meeting on October 11. Ms. Roberts read two books from the 700's to discuss and was the note taker for the meeting. Ms. Roberts continues to serve on the TLA's Children's Round Table 2x2 Selection Committee. So far, she and her colleagues have read over 750 books geared from ages 2 through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. The committee will narrow the list to 20 titles in January 2019.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl facilitated four Teen Time programs during the reporting period, assisted by Library Aide Sarina Hackworth. Maverick Teens attended at least 3 different high schools and 2 middle schools. It has been a wonderful opportunity to see teens from different areas come together, engage and connect with one another.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl and Circulation Attendant Eraani Perez created a large, attention getting display during Banned Books week. Bleichwehl and Perez exhibited several books and audiobooks as well as a few DVDs and a music CD. Several of the items had information regarding its challenge and lists of the top 100 books challenged were available for patrons to take. The attractive display elicited many comments from patrons.

#### **McCRELESS**

Rozanna Bennett, Children's Librarian has been doing weekly Toddler Times that include stories, songs and activities. On October 11<sup>th</sup>, Librarian Bennett invited San Antonio Fire Department to Toddler Time. Staff from the department read stories to children and their families and gave them a chance to tour a fire truck. One parent was heard saying "I'm so glad we came today."

The branch hosted a come and go craft day celebrating Spanish Heritage Month, making suns from tissue paper and paper plates on Saturday Oct. 6th.

McCreless teens continued to enjoy the use of Teen Services' Oculus Rift virtual reality game during weekly Teen Time. In addition, this month teens made tasty cake balls, colored bookmarks and played Unstable Unicorns. At the teens request, Librarian DeBow will start hosting a monthly Anime club on the third Saturday of every month starting on November 17<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 pm. Teens are hard at work designing the promotional flyer.

Librarian DeBow, along with the Highlands High School Engineering Magnet School coordinator, Michelle Garcia, facilitated a STEAM for Adults event on Wednesday, September 26<sup>th</sup>. Those in attendance were able to explore the fun of robotics with R2D2 and BB8 Spheros, mini-spheros and Finch robots. Everyone enjoyed the SAPL branded VR glasses which were given out to all participants. Librarian DeBow demonstrated their use on her phone with a VR Rollercoaster ride app.

Librarian DeBow prepared and presented another STEAM for Adults program which involved making alcohol ink coasters. Participants enjoyed the process of using liquid watercolors and alcohol spray to create beautiful felt-padded coasters.

Patrons and staff of McCreless continued the summer's McCreless Walking Club Program with new fall hours. The Walking Club is enjoying earlier hours and cooler temperatures along the Salado Creek Green Way on our 2 mile hike from Southside Lions East to Comanche Park and back. This program is an ongoing program due to popularity and will continue throughout the fall on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month.

Patrons of all ages and all skill levels created scrapbook pages of photos, mementos and keepsakes. Well over a dozen crafters learned new techniques and brushed up on old skills. Pages were designed and assembled using both pre-fabbed kits and handmade custom pieces. Art journal painting and collage techniques were also demonstrated and used by the participants. Each participant received a scrapbook album to catalogue their ongoing and growing collection. Due to popularity this class will be a monthly program for October through December.

New teen volunteer, Jemma, designed and created a new bulletin board for the teen area as well as a "Hot YA Reads" book display. Her creativity and artistic talent is much appreciated.

## **MEMORIAL**

The branch celebrated Play-Doh Day on Saturday, September 15. The family of a child with special needs was among the attendees. The child was very engaged and, while largely non-verbal, appeared to have a great time.

Children's Librarian Christine Deffendall held a special story time to celebrate International Talk Like a Pirate Day. Attendees made an eyepatch from craft foam, sang pirate-themed songs, and listened to pirate-themed stories.

In observance of International Talk Like a Pirate Day, the branch showed the animated film, *The Pirates!*: Band of Misfits.

Library manager Maria Gonzales presented "Colorin Colorado" a bilingual story time for children. Her music selection by Jose-Luis Orozco was "Esta es mi Tierra" (This Land is Your Land) *Animal Talk* by Cynthia Weill was the selected story book.

Interim Teen Liaison Circulation Attendant Michelangelo Sosa attended an outreach event at Sam Houston High School where he presented on E Commerce to 6 classes.

Michelangelo also attended an outreach event and presented library resources to approximately 300 students and parents at Longfellow Middle School as the school presented free iPads for every 1-2 children in a family

Mr. Sosa assisted with hosting Rock the Plaza at Central Library. The event drew a significantly large audience of teens.

Teen liaison Rene Leija attended the Barrio Network meeting for the back to school Backpack Drive.

The branch set up a welcoming table by the entrance doors and offered chips, salsa, and queso dips to patrons in honor of Hispanic Heritage Month. About thirty-six patrons freely indulged in this tasty treat.

Library aide Guadalupe Pinales and librarian Freddy Hudson created a hybrid Hispanic Heritage Month/Halloween display. It featured both home-made sugar skulls for Hispanic Heritage Month and theme books for Halloween.

The branch hosted a fun adult sugar skulls creating program on September 25. Twenty-one patrons attended this event and enjoyed creating and decorating their own sugar skulls. Thanks to Angelita Merla from the Esperanza Peace & Justice Center for teaching the workshop.

Adult services librarian Freddy Hudson attended and completed all SET Modules training during the month of September.

On October 9<sup>th,</sup> the branch screened the documentary, *Suicide: The Ripple Effect*, in conjunction with the San Antonio Behavioral Healthcare Hospital. The film tells the story of Kevin Hines, how his attempted suicide affected others in his life. A mental health advocate since that time Kevin Hines has made this health issue his dedicated work. The purpose of the documentary is to spread awareness of mental health issues and bring hope to those suffering from them. The branch also did a display to promote the program.

The branch continued its celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month with a film festival on during October. Three films were screened throughout the day: *Todo México*, a history of Mexico in the Spanish language, *Los Hermanos Muerte*, a story of three brothers with a cry of "Land and Freedom" but in reality are seeking to enrich themselves within the spirit of the Mexican Revolution and *Viva la Raza: The Legacy of Eddie Guerrero*, although he came from a line of wrestlers, he was born with charisma and his championships are exhibited in footage from some of his popular matches in Mexico, Japan and the World Wide Wrestling Entertainment (WWE).

The studious teens at Mission Library came in for homework and snacks this month, many spending Teen Time working on school assignments. The Wii U, always a popular choice, was a favorite this month with teens playing games like Super Smash Brothers and Super Mario 3D World.

National Play Dough Day on September 17th, was a lot of fun. The kids had a great time getting creative with lots of different play-dough, including black with glitter.

A group of teachers from PreK4SA visited for the first time and were given a tour of the library and catalog instruction. The children's librarian spoke to them about the many services the library has that will help them in the classroom.

#### PAN AMERICAN

Pan American branch started fall in style with brand new carpet throughout the library. The library was closed the last week of September to complete our makeover. New carpet, endcap signs and desk signs were installed. Pan American has received positive feedback from the community on the changes to the library.

Pan American Branch hosted a National Night Out program for the community. The branch stayed open past usual business hours to host this event. A large Jenga, Connect 4, bean bag toss and other yard games were set up in the East parking lot. Representatives from the Friends of the Library group were on hand to meet with the Pan American community. CPS Energy came out to give out information on energy conservation and reducing your electric bill. MoveOn Texas setup a table to

register eligible voters. Every member of the Pan American staff played an integral role in this program for the community.

Every month the Pan American Library hosts Pan Am Pix Flix, a movie screening where patrons decide which movie will be shown. This month, the theme was pigskin classics. Patrons voted for a screening of the movie "Remember the Titans". Pan Am staff provided popcorn, snacks and crafts related to the movie.

Pan American Branch Library continues to host a weekly Qigong and Yoga classes. These are put on in partnership with the San Antonio Parks and Recreation department and are a part of the Family Fit Pass Program.

Adult Services Librarian Steven Barrera spent a morning at the Elivra Cisneros Senior Community Center hosting an adult coloring program. The seniors spent their time coloring mandala designs while listening to relaxing new age music.

Steven Barrera and Library Assistant Cassandra Garza represented Pan American Branch Library at the Low-Brary Car Show at Mission Marquee Plaza. Although the event was canceled due to weather, they worked as a team with other SAPL employees to set up and prepare for the event. It provided an excellent team building opportunity for all those that worked to get the program together.

The Children and their families have greatly enjoyed the new furniture from our renovation. There is more shared activities within the families being it reading together, crafting, or using the AWE computers.

Valerie Shelley, Children's Librarian, had Community Helpers as the theme for Toddler Time. Lego Club met biweekly with crafts being the weeks between. Craft activities were also available on a daily basis.

Outreach was held at Stonewall-Flanders ES during their Literacy Night. Library cards were issued to those who wanted the card.

On September 19, library assistant and teen liaison Nicole Garza facilitated a food demonstration with Pan American teens. Last month the teen group learned how to create a bento box lunch and this teen time they learned how to master the art of making rice balls. The teens used a rice maker to make sushi rice and then used a rice ball mold to easily shape their rice balls. There was also an array of various rice ball spices and seasonings that the teen group used to spice up their rice balls.

On October 2, Ms. Garza assisted with the branch's first national night out event. The teen services Vroom van made a lasting impression with the community. The Vroom van was equipped with children sized chairs, tables and crafts for all ages. A button maker was the top choice for crafts included within the Vroom van.

On October 3, Ms. Garza and the teen group at Pan American began decorating the meeting room for our first ever Haunted house. The teen group decided to create, design and build their

own haunted house this year and hopefully many years to come. Several of teens invited their friends to help participate with building the haunted house.

On October 6, Eclectic Electric presented Rock the Plaza event at Central library and Ms. Garza assisted event coordinator J.D Elizondo. Ms. Garza reached out to the Network of Young Artists with Mr. Elizondo and was able to secure teen performers for Rock the Plaza. The event was a showcase of local teen musicians.

On October 9, Ms. Garza and Mr. Elizondo conducted informational sessions at Brennan High school to speak about Teen Art Fest. The informational sessions focused on a call to artists to submit their pieces to display at the Teen Art Fest. The team spoke to during all the art class students throughout the entire day.

On October 10 and October 17, during teen time Ms. Garza and the teen group continued to work on building decorations for Pan American's Haunted house. The teens were able to build an entire movable wall for one of the rooms in the haunted house. A group of teens also were working on coverings to help black out the meeting room walls. The teen group decided to add an extra day for the haunted house to be open for a kid friendly viewing.

On September 23 and October 7, Pan American hosted the Pokémon champions group. The group was informed of a new Pokémon trading card set coming out and we reviewed several of the new additions to the set. Ms. Garza showed the group how to price some of their valuable cards as well as how to protect their valuable cards with special card sleeves.

#### PARMAN

In the reporting period, Children's Librarian II Katie Thonen went to Lopez Middle School for an outreach and library card sign-up event. A table was set up during lunch and in the library until the end of the school day to connect with students and faculty while providing library cards and information on tween/teen services at Parman. Additional outreach events with local elementary and middle schools are in planning stages.

The children's department at Parman continued with its weekly programming schedule and recorded one of the highest weekly program attendances in 2018 FY during one of our Friday Toddler Times presented by Melissa Moser. .Program numbers are steadily growing for and there is an increase in repeat program attendees from week to week. A Kid's Discovery Time program has been added to the program schedule. This program, presented by children's Librarian I, Katy Dillard, offers S.T.E.A.M. based projects and crafts for children aged 5-8.

Parman is very excited to have Katy Dillard on board! She stepped up and took over programming when Katie T. was out on vacation and has fully taken over Baby Time on Mondays. She has jumped in with two feet and has already proven to be a great addition to the Parman Team!


The Dungeons and Dragons group organized by teen librarian Megan Coker and presented by the volunteer /professional DD master, has continued to grow, with a core group of about a half dozen students who are always eager to go on epic adventures. Tabletop roleplaying games like Dungeons and

Dragons are not only a wonderfully fun way to spend an evening, but also develop creative writing skills, allow participants an excellent way to exercise mathematical capabilities (as well as providing deft examples of the laws of probability through the rolls of various many-sided dice), and even cultivate students' emotional intelligence as they walk a mile in someone else's shoes and consider how someone would behave in different circumstances based on their motivations. And who wouldn't enjoy the opportunity to do all of that while making friends and going on magical quests?

Tween Time has facilitated several adventures for ages 9-12. The tweens have discovered an enthusiasm for making pixel art with perler beads, as well as several other activities, including making their own shadow puppets (and acting out scenes from favorite series) and trying out different board games – not only well-known classics like the Game of Life (which has changed a lot since yesteryear), but also less well-known favorites like Ravensburger's Labyrinth game of finding magical objects in an ever-changing maze. Whether it's trying a new medium or sharing with others their favorite activities, the tweens have displayed great eagerness and gusto, and are always interested in what we're going to do next.

Adult Programming returned for the fall with a new adult series: "Making it @ Parman" - programs for crafters and makers! Barbara K. presented a program in which patrons learned and tasted differences between white, green, oolong and black teas, Moroccan mint tea, Turkish vs. English black tea, Russian chai vs. Indian chai, loose tea vs. tea bags etc. In her second program secrets of afternoon tea were revealed. Program was very well received and attendees (another record number 2018 FY) requested a creation of regular program "Adults Night Out".

Leissa Kimball adult librarian II and a new assistant manager prepared and delivered smashing program to celebrate the 200th birthday of Frankenstein's Monster. In this program patrons learned how to do a monster makeup for Halloween, and watched the classic 1931 thriller. In another edition of "Making it at Parman" patrons learned to make their own prickly plants out of felt.



#### **POTRANCO**

The Potranco library hosted Celebra el Sol/ Celebrate the Sun, a program that highlighted and celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month. The program brought to attention the prominence of the sun in connection with Hispanic culture. The presentation featured arts and crafts, poems, and stories praising Hispanic Heritage for school-age children. Children's librarian, Angela Bilbe, observed parents bonding with children over the literature and developing deeper connections with themselves and their Latino neighbors. They became engaged in the beautiful art and history, and expressed themselves through the artwork of the suns. Children's librarian, Bilbe, detected a sense of delight radiating from the Latino children. Their culture was being represented and praised at the library; giving them a sense of belonging. Within the Hispanic culture, the sun symbolizes beauty, and flourishing of life. The children blossomed and beamed with pride during the program.

Early literacy skills and development begin at birth, therefore the Potranco library hosts baby time every Tuesday in the early morning hours. Children's librarian, Angela Bilbe, has noticed parents become more active in participating in the songs, and motions during baby time. Bilbe reports an increased engagement between guardian and cild during the program. Due to this, the infants appear to be able to recognize the sounds, and rhythms of the nursery rhymes that are being sung and read from the books. The program is inspiring parents to be more engaged in reading activities, which greatly benefits their child in early literacy development.

During the reporting period September 17 – October 14, Potranco continued hosting the Sunday morning I Heart Vinyl series, curated and deejayed by Paschal Booker. Audio lineups included such themes as Indie Music, Hispanic Heritage Month, and the music of Tejas/Texas. Awareness of the series in the Potranco Library community continues to grow, as reflected by our regular attendees. Booker has observed increased and ongoing discussions throughout the week with vinyl-collecting patrons. Patrons enjoy offering suggestions for future themes. Patrons are required to turn in records at the Ask Desk due to the vulnerability of possible breakage. The Potranco Team works together to at the Ask Desk to engage patrons in conversations about their likes and dislikes regarding music. The Team has found it is a wonderful way to build relationships, much akin to our chats with patrons about their reading preferences. Booker reports the Potranco community makes phone calls during the week inquiring about the upcoming Sunday theme. Booker and Team, believe patrons going out of their way to come to Potranco Branch for a Sunday morning listening experience is a particularly noteworthy development. While the ongoing goal in the future is to build a listening community whose participants will bring their own music to share, we also want to continue to build a vinyl collection that reflects the lives, heritage, and interests of community patrons.

October 4th the Potranco book club gathered to discuss the book, The World According to Garp by John Irving. Facilitator and Circulation Attendant Miranda O'Neill chose this book because it was on the banned book list. This year Banned Books Week fell between September 23 and 29. In an effort to engage patrons at the book club, O'Neill felt this would be a great pick offering plenty of discussion. Irving touches on feminism, rape, transgender, and infidelity in this novel. Although the novel was published decades ago, these same topics hold relevancy in 2018. As the meeting drew closer, O'Neill realized the books topics paralleled several heated national debates. Court hearings were recently been held between Dr. Christine Blasey Ford and now Justice Brett Kavanagh. O'Neill reports attendees sparked a thoughtful conversation about these topics and easily drew similarities in the main character and what they see happening to women today. O'Neill says, "It's these meaningful conversations with these women that reinvigorate my joy in being a part of this book club."

## PRUITT at ROOSEVELT HS

Children's fall events at Pruitt Library are off to an exciting start. Kids and parents enjoyed a fun-filled time celebrating National Playdough Day. Participants were thrilled for the opportunity to make their own homemade playdough in a variety of colors and shaping it to form all kinds of objects and animals.

What a terrific time families had during the children's Hispanic Heritage Month celebration of the sun! Attendees learned about different forms of Mexican folk art. They constructed their own form of folk art featuring colorful suns made with paper plates and colorful ribbons. It was evident to see how library events can bring families together. In attendance was a ninety-seven-year old great grandmother and her great granddaughters. All had a great time preparing their craft while discussing the day's events.

Librarian Cynthia Saenz recently participated in an outreach event at Harmony School of Innovation's Language Arts and Math Night. She met with several parents, students, and teachers and informed them about the many resources available with their San Antonio Public Library card. Everyone expressed interest in attending programs offered for patrons of all ages at the various branches throughout the city.

The new Teen Librarian Sheri Watkins joined the Molly Pruitt staff on September 24. The Monday lunchtime chess lessons with Chess Master Alex Weinberg continued, allowing teens to have another opportunity to hone their critical-thinking skills and improve their chess game in their leisure time.

Pruitt teens completed a survey to determine their preferences for programming activities at their library branch. Based on the results, activities will rotate throughout the month and will include movies, crafts, board games, and periodic holiday celebration events.

During Teen Read Week, Pruitt teens kept with the theme, "Its Written in the Stars," by creating LED light constellation canvas art. Participants in this activity explored their STEM creativity during conception and creation of circuits that took the shape of constellations in the sky.

The first STEAM for Adults activity, calligraphy, was a big hit. Sűmeyye Akin, the calligraphy artist hails from Turkey where she learned from a master teacher. She has spent years perfecting her craft and it showed. The class used the sets of calligraphy pens that were provided for the STEAM for Adults grant from USAA. The adults really enjoyed the bookmark she made for each participant.

Due to the multiple requests, Librarian Rae Downen began conducting classes on Sundays to prepare adults to become naturalized citizens. On Wednesdays, she is hoping that Roosevelt High School LEO Club and National Honor Society students will provide free childcare in exchange for service hours. Some women that are getting ready to apply for citizenship are bound to the house because they are the primary caregiver of their children, and the cost of childcare is too much for most. By providing childcare during the Wednesday night classes, Ms. Downen is trying to ensure that our community can help break this barrier.

For Hispanic Heritage Month adults prepared for Dia de los Muertos by decorating clay that was rolled out flat and imprinted with the decorative sugar skull patterns. Patrons enjoyed letting their creative juices flow.

#### **SAN PEDRO**

Outreach Story Time Programs—Ms. Dalton presented monthly story times to children at Educare Child Care Center (two classes), Monte Vista Montessori (two classes), and Laurel Heights Weekday School (1 class). This school year Betsy added the eleven Will Smith Zoo School classes and four Respite Care classes. Fifteen to twenty books were also delivered to each child care/preschool class for their use during the month. Monte Vista, Will Smith Zoo School, and Laurel Heights request thematic books for topics they will be discussing in their respective classes and the teachers are very appreciative to this enrichment to their curriculum.

Kids Time Programs—Minecraft Monday and LEGO® Club on Wednesdays are continuing.

Toddler Time Programs—This program continued during this reporting time with a small but very loyal group.

Outreach School Age Book Club—Ms. Dalton spoke with the librarians at several schools and has set up eight book clubs in the service area for 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> graders for this school year. These schools include Monte Vista Montessori, St. Anthony's School, and 3 SAISD schools: Hawthorne

Academy, Rogers Academy and Twain Academy. She also assists the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade teachers at Advanced Learning Academy by providing them on a monthly basis with thematic books.

Family Fun—Two Family Fun events were held during this reporting period. On September 23, Tambo Rhythms provided a lively program, allowing families to release their inner percussionists! On October 14, families made celebrated Hispanic Heritage by making collage suns.

Hawthorne Family Literacy Night—Ms. Dalton represented SAPL at Hawthorne Academy's Family Literacy Night, promoting the various services the library provides to families.

Ms. Dalton and Ms. Roja attended training on the use of Brain Fuse, the replacement for Homework Help.

Becky Grissom, Friends of San Pedro Library Vice President, attended the Beacon Hill National Night Out event on Tuesday, Oct. 6. She spoke to fifty neighbors about library services and invited them in for a visit.

Circulation attendant Chrystal Hernandez is participating in a group known as San Antonio Rocks. She has painted designs on several small rocks, and is placing them in easy to find places, such as the San Pedro Park and on the San Antonio College campus. When the rock is found, the person is able to keep it or rehide it. They can post a picture on Facebook, too. The note on the back of the rock invites the person to come visit the library. So far 2 of the rocks have been found and posted on Facebook!

## **SCHAEFER**

Kids at Schaefer celebrated Hispanic Heritage month on Monday, Oct. 8 by making colorful mosaic suns out of paper plates and tissue paper.

Children's librarian Leslie Elsasser and library assistant Sara Ramirez made an appearance on Salado Intermediate School's morning show on Sept. 19. They promoted library cards, fall programs and Young Pegasus. Leslie Elsasser also went to Evelyn King PCI on Oct. 3 for her monthly outreach. She read stories to the preschool and toddler classrooms.

Weekly children's programs continue to be popular at Schaefer. Baby Time is steadily increasing in numbers and LEGO Time continues to draw in large crowds of enthusiastic builders. During the past few weeks, Story Time and Toddler Time participants have heard stories about squirrels, autumn, monsters and owls.

Library Assistant Sara Ramirez facilitated one Science Time program during the reporting period. On October 9th, Science Time explored the world of animal superheroes. Teen programs for the reporting period included a metal art tile project in celebration of Hispanic Heritage month, two 3D print labs, and a robot program. Teen volunteers also facilitated their own program, the Teen Coloring Club.

Schaefer Library's Robot Roundup program, facilitated by Circulation Attendant Reuben Duron, has continued its success into the school year! Every other Thursday, from 4:00-5:00, kids twelve and under have been using a variety of droids like BB-8, R2-D2, BB-9E, Ollie, and Sphero Minis. They've done activities like obstacle courses, races, tag, and robot soccer. To get in the Halloween spirit this month we did monster bowling and the kids enjoyed it! We also utilize our 3D Printer to create small trophies and collectables for the winners. Robot Roundup allows the kids to learn more about these droid devices every time they attend the program, which is an important tool as these devices will become more and more prevalent in the future. Robot Roundup allows kids to become familiar with STEAM based devices and have fun at the same time.

Schaefer Library's Fortnite Sunday program, facilitated by Circulation Attendants Reuben Duron and Noah Reese, has stayed a popular program for kids/teens! On Sundays from 4:00-5:00, anyone 13 and older can come and play the most popular game in the world at Schaefer Library. Kids 12 and under are allowed to play with parent's permission. We've gotten quite a few families to come in and give the game a try and they all loved it. This past Sunday we had our highest amount of patrons come to our program with 23! Fortnite Sundays gives families a chance to do something different at the library and have fun while doing it!

For the 2018 Nation Night Out on October 2nd, Library Assistant Mason Matthews provided a chess program to the Lavaca & King William Neighborhood Associations. LA Matthews taught chess skills and facilitated friendly chess matches between National Night Out participants at G.W. Brackenridge High School. Library Assistant Sheridan Richardson attended the Lakeside Neighborhood Association's National Night Out event at Tealer Park. Community members enjoyed playing with Legos and hearing about the programs Schaefer offers. The Schaefer branch library was also invited to attend the Artisan at Willow Springs Apartments National Night Out event. Maria Adams represented the library by sharing information and explaining the benefits of having a library card to residents of the complex.

Monday evenings at Schaefer, patrons gather for Chess Club. From 1800 to 1930 hours children and adults play friendly games of chess in Schaefer's Community Flex Space. Patrons solve chess puzzles, observe historic chess matches, and learn the basics of strategy with Library Assistant Mason Matthews. Tournament Style Chess Sets provided by a generous donation from our friends at Dollar General.
