The City Council convened in a Regular Meeting. City Clerk Leticia Vacek took the Roll Call noting the following Councilmembers present:

Mrs. Vacek announced that Councilmember Viagran was out of the country attending the Conference of Organization of the World Heritage Cities.

- 2. Mayor Nirenberg led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Councilmember Sandoval highlighted the neighborhood park that would be constructed in the Woodlawn Hills Neighborhood (Item 10). She thanked everyone for their work and called Mr. Ruben Sanchez, President of the Woodlawn Hills Neighborhood Association, to the podium. Mr. Sanchez stated that he was pleased to promote the park that would provide access for children in the neighborhood.

Councilmember Perry highlighted said item and asked of the Mutual Aid Agreement. Chief Hood stated that the Fire Department worked closely with Joint Base San Antonio (JBSA) to coordinate resources and capabilities to ensure emergency preparedness. He noted that the agreement would allow for a better ability to respond and mitigate situations. General Juan Ayala added that this was a great partnership with JBSA and commended Brigadier General Laura Lenderman for her leadership. Brigadier General Lenderman addressed the City Council and stated that she was pleased with the great partnership between JBSA and the City of San Antonio. She noted that the agreement was critical and would ensure the safety of the community. Councilmember Perry stated that he looked forward to other opportunities for collaboration and finding ways to support the military.

Mayor Nirenberg stated that he was pleased with the strong partnership with JBSA and commended Brigadier General Lenderman for her leadership.

30. City Manager's Report

ALAMO SCULPTURE TRAIL

Mrs. Sculley reported that on October 20, 2016, the City Council approved a donation agreement that would facilitate a sculpture trail of 14 Bronze Statues of Historic Figures in Texas History. She stated that the trail was proposed by local philanthropist Jack Guenther and will connect the Briscoe Western Art Museum to Alamo Plaza. She noted that the Alamo Sculpture Trail includes six city-owned statues and eight newly-commissioned bronze statues funded by private donations. She mentioned that the six city-owned statues were part of a collection in the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center that was donated by Sea World in 2001. She indicated that the eight newly-commissioned statues were underway and some were ready for installation. She added that permanent locations for the statues in Alamo Plaza would be identified through the design process for Alamo Plaza and would be reviewed by the Office of Historic Preservation.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS BOND PROGRAM

Mrs. Sculley provided an update on the 2017-2022 Neighborhood Improvements Bond Program. She reported that staff had evaluated several hundred potential sites and of today; there were two sites under earnest money contract and a city-owned facility being planned for housing redevelopment. She stated that they had issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Workforce Housing Development. She stated that the first project was the East Side Single-Family Infill Project in Council District 2 that includes 12 vacant infill lots on Martin Luther King Boulevard along the MLK March Route. She noted that the RFP sought a developer to build single-family homes that will be sold to families at affordable sales prices. She added that half of the homes would be available for sale at 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) and the balance would be sold for no more than 120% of the AMI as Workforce Housing. She stated that the RFP closed on November 16th and anticipated it would be brought forward for Council Action in December. She reported that the second project was located on Parkdale Drive in the Medical Center in Council District 8. stated that the city issued an RFP for a multi-family residential development with a minimum 150 units with an emphasis on deeper affordability with at least half of the development at or below 60% of the AMI, along with family sized units. She noted that responses for the Parkdale Project were due on November 2nd and anticipated bringing the project to the City Council for consideration in January 2019. She reported that the city-owned site was located

in Council District 3, known as the Southeast Service Center. She stated that the site would be redeveloped as a multi-family affordable rental development and anticipated to be released for bid in early 2019. She added that staff would continue to pursue the most viable, cost effective, and impactful sites to deliver the Neighborhood Improvement Bond Program.
