

End of First 8-Year Authorization



BETTER JOBS ACT

Statutory Authority

Authorizes City Council to:

- Initiate certain types of workforce development programs, including early childhood education
- Create corporation to develop and implement

Provides that City Council:

- Approves Corporation bylaws
- Appoints Board members
- Approves Corporation budget



BETTER JOBS ACT

Sales Tax Parameters

 $\bullet \bullet \bullet$

Allows for sales tax levy:

- 1. Directed for use of corporation
- 2. Not less than 1/8 of one percent
- 3. Approved by simple majority of voters




WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE



* Results showed positive student achievement using a nationally recognized testing instrument, Teaching Strategies Gold Assessment, which assesses developmental skills in the following areas: Cognitive, Literacy, Mathematics, Oral Language, Physical Skills, and Social-Emotional

Pre-K 4 SA Education Center students had:



BETTER 3RD GRADE MATH SCORES

exceeding the state average score by 16.9 percentage points.



BETTER 3RD GRADE READING SCORES

increasing the share of economically disadvantaged students who met or exceeded the state average score by 12.3 percentage points.



resulting in 7 weeks more instruction.

CONTINUING TO DELIVER ON OUR PROMISE

Four education centers

Competitive Grants to support 1,700 students per year

Professional Development for PK-3rd grade educators

Family Engagement

- Continue to serve San Antonio's children and families with the greatest educational need at four best-inclass demonstration sites
- Create 3,000+ additional free seats for children from middle-class families (\$45-\$65k)
- Award grants to support quality early learning infrastructure across the city
- Offer free professional learning to strengthen San Antonio's early learning teaching corps
- Support and strengthen families as advocates
- Increase access to higher education and workforce


EXPANSION ADDRESS THE GAP

$\bullet \bullet \bullet$

3,000 San Antonio families cannot afford high-quality prekindergarten



OPPORTUNITY: Expand Access to Middle Class



- 1,500 eligible served at Pre-K 4 SA
- 13,000 served at public schools
- **7,500 served in private sector**

Expansion:

- 500 middle class served at Pre-K 4 SA
- 2,500 middle class served at Pre-K 4 SA partners program

REAUTHORIZATION PROCESS

8-year authorization ends June 2021

Reauthorization required in 2020



RECOMMENDATION

$\bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet$

• Authorize for May 2020 Election

• Tax Collection for reauthorization would begin April 1, 2021

HB3: An Important First Step

$\bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet \bullet$

Provides funding for full-day pre-k for 4-year-olds who meet state eligible requirements

25,000 4-Year-Olds in San Antonio **40%** (10,500) Don't Qualify





- Funded by 1/8-cent sales tax rate
- State max. allowable sales tax rate: 8.25%
- Avg. sales tax increase of \$7.81 annually/family
- 8 year authorization
- Approx. \$36 million in annual revenue


