This correspondence transmits information requested by City Council members at the May 28 City Council briefing on COVID-19 City Response and Community Resiliency & Recovery.

Door-to-Door Outreach

Councilwoman Sandoval and Councilwoman Viagran requested an explanation as to why the budget for the Small Business door-to-door outreach was budgeted at \$1.3 million and the Housing Security door-to-door outreach was budgeted at \$500,000.

The Small Business outreach program focuses on building and leveraging the capacity of place-based business support organizations (BSOs) such as SAGE, Southside First, Centro San Antonio and WDC to engage in the various neighborhood small business corridors located in portions of our city with poor equity assessment ratings. This new program will connect the small businesses to existing programs that can provide financial and business planning, technology and other assistance that will build resilience for the small businesses. This will require significant training and potential temporary staff augmentation for the BSOs and is intended to build on their capacity so they can continue to provide the assistance long after the program ends. The proposed budget of \$1.3 million also includes coordination of these various organizations by the San Antonio Economic Development Foundation and development of business support training curriculum by the Women's Business Center and Launch SA.

The \$500,000 proposed for resident door to door outreach will target residents who have traditionally been marginalized in the community in an effort to increase their connection and utilization of resources and benefits through Financial Recovery Centers. To implement, the Department of Human Services will work with an existing network of non-profit organizations (across multiple funders); local colleges and universities to leverage social work and promotora interns; community volunteers; faith based organizations; and a small pool of temporary staff to perform outreach activities. Outreach activities will include an assessment of current resources and benefits accessed; assisting residents with addressing any barriers to accessing services; and connecting them to appropriate resources. Community neighborhoods targeted for outreach services will be based on an equity driven approach and equity assessment ratings.

Watch Expand Assure Plan

Councilwoman Sandoval inquired about the budgeted amount for Education and Enforcement included in the Watch Expand Assure Plan.

The funds allocated to providing education, enforcement, and information to the public included in the plan is included in the following program expense categories:

Free public parking

Councilwoman Viagran requested that the staff recommendation for free parking at city-owned parking facilities in the downtown area be changed from 5pm to 2am on weekdays to 3pm to 2am from June to August.

The City currently has contracts in the St Mary's Garage and Houston Street Garage with major employers. We are contractually required to provide the employers day time parking. The earliest we could provide free parking at these facilities would be 4pm.

Metro Health Heat Plan

Councilman Courage is requesting to see a copy of the Metro Health Heat Plan that would allow the City to open cooling stations if the heat advisory level requires it.

Office of Sustainability (OS) in coordination with OEM and Metro Health, has leveraged existing support from the American Cities Climate Challenge (ACCC) to convene an Extreme Heat Working Group to assess the current Heat Plan in light of COVID-19, as well as the SA Climate Ready Climate Action and Adaptation Plan. The final report with the revised written Heat Plan will be provided to Council later this week.

Emergency Housing Assistance Program Multiple Requests

Councilwoman Andrews-Sullivan requested the number of people that have made multiple rental assistance request through the Emergency Housing Assistance Program.

Staff is extracting this information and will provide a report the week of June 1.

Parks Grab and Go Food Program

Councilwoman Viagran requested information on the Parks Grab and Go Food program to distribute to council offices so they can put it out to the community – is requesting that as soon as possible.

A complete list of program locations was included in the Return to Work Plan sent out by the City Manager yesterday. The Parks and Recreation Department will provide, by email, the list of sites and the flyer to the Council staff (Chief of Staff and Communications staff) for them to share. They are finalizing the flyer now.

This will be similar to the information already provided to the District Offices for the Summer Day Camps.
