REQUEST:

The applicant is requesting a Certificate of Appropriateness for approval to install a 42-inch tall front yard wood picket fence.

APPLICABLE CITATIONS:

5.Guidelines for Site Elements 2.Fences and Walls B.NEW FENCES AND WALLS

i. *Design*—New fences and walls should appear similar to those used historically within the district in terms of their scale, transparency, and character. Design of fence should respond to the design and materials of the house or main structure. ii. *Location*—Avoid installing a fence or wall in a location where one did not historically exist, particularly within the front yard. The appropriateness of a front yard fence or wall is dependent on conditions within a specific historic district. New front yard fences or wall should not be introduced within historic districts that have not historically had them. iii. *Height*—Limit the height of new fences and walls within the front yard to a maximum of four feet. The appropriateness of a front yard fence is dependent on conditions within a specific historic district. New front yard fence or wall existed historically had them. If a taller fence or wall existed historically, additional height may be considered. The height of a new retaining wall should not exceed the height of the slope it retains.

iv. *Prohibited materials*—Do not use exposed concrete masonry units (CMU), Keystone or similar interlocking retaining wall systems, concrete block, vinyl fencing, or chain link fencing.

v. Appropriate materials—Construct new fences or walls of materials similar to fence materials historically used in the district. Select materials that are similar in scale, texture, color, and form as those historically used in the district, and that are compatible with the main structure. Screening incompatible uses—Review alternative fence heights and materials for appropriateness where residential properties are adjacent to commercial or other potentially incompatible uses.

FINDINGS:

- a. The primary structure at 403 N Palmetto was constructed circa 2017 and features contemporary interpretations of Folk Victorian elements found on the historic structures within the Dignowity Hill Historic District.
- b. FENCE The applicant has proposed to install a 42-inch tall Gothic picket wooden front yard fence to wrap around the front yard including a pedestrian gate.
- c. FENCE DESIGN The applicant has proposed to install a Gothic picket wooden fence, matching the fence design in the submitted example photo. Per the Guidelines for Site Elements 2.B.i., new fences and walls should appear similar to those used historically within the district in terms of their scale, transparency, and character; the design of fence should respond to the design and materials of the house or main structure. Staff finds that a Gothic picket wooden is consistent with the Guidelines and appropriate within the district.
- d. FENCE LOCATION The applicant has proposed to install the fence around the front and side property lines to meet the existing rear privacy fence. Per the Guidelines for Site Elements 2.B.ii., applicants should avoid installing a fence or wall in a location where one did not historically exist, particularly within the front yard; the appropriateness of a front yard fence or wall is dependent on conditions within a specific historic district; new front yard fences or walls should not be introduced within historic districts that have not historically had them.

Staff finds that fences are found on N Palmetto on similar properties and within the Dignowity Hill Historic District.

e. FENCE HEIGHT – The applicant has proposed to install a fence with a height of 42-inches. Per the Guidelines for Site Elements 2.B.iii., applicants should limit the height of new fences and walls within the front yard to a maximum of four feet; the appropriateness of a front yard fence is dependent on conditions within a specific historic district. Staff finds the proposed height is consistent with the Guidelines

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approved as submitted based on the findings.
