This memorandum transmits the October monthly financial report for the COVID-19 Emergency Response and Recovery & Resiliency Plan. This report will be presented to the City Council at today's "B" Session.

This report summarizes all revenues and expenses related to the COVID-19 Emergency Response, Health Implementation Plan, Recovery & Resiliency Plan, and other programs. These programs are funded with federal grants awarded to the City specifically to address the impacts of COVID-19 as well as City resources. Highlights of the report are as follows:

- In total the City has spent \$277.1 million since March, including \$144.8 million as part of the City's emergency response;
- As of October 31, the City has spent \$220.3 million or 81.4% of the \$270 million Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF); and
- Overall, the City anticipates spending 100% of CRF funds by December 30, 2020 with certain budget adjustments that will allow for the following:
 - o Increase the Housing Security pillar by \$3.5 million to provide additional services to homeless after December 30
 - o Increase Small Business Support by \$1.5 million for business grants to be disbursed in December
 - o Add General Fund resources of \$4.9 million to the Health Implementation plan to be used in 2021

The following table illustrates a summary of the administrative budget adjustments that will allow the use of all CRF funds by December 30.

Notes:

- a) Housing Security: \$3.5million net budget increase reflects redirecting \$7.4 million in CRF funds to the Housing Pillar to account for expenses incurred thru December 30 in Housing Assistance and Homeless Shelter. A net \$3.9 million in General Fund resources is transferred from the Housing Pillar to the Small Business Pillar (\$1.5 million and Health Implementation Plan (\$2.4 million). Adjustments in unspent CRF in other programs within the Housing pillar are made to allow for \$411,779 in additional utility assistance managed by the Department of Human Services.
 - The additional \$3.5 million will be used for homeless services after December 30 funded with Emergency Services Grant (ESG)
- b) Small Business: \$1.15 million net budget increase reflects a reduction in CRF funds of \$350,000 for Door-to-Door Engagement that will not be spent by Dec 30 and the addition of \$1.5 million in general fund resources to provide additional grants to qualified small business.
- c) Health Implementation: \$1.87 million net budget decrease reflects a reduction in CRF funds of \$6.76 million that will not be spent by Dec 30. This includes funds primarily for testing, contact tracing, and project management (\$5.58million) and funds for equipment, medical director services, and protective equipment (\$1.18 million). This decrease is offset by adding \$4.89 million in General Fund for testing to be used after December 30. This is funded by charging \$2.5 million in eligible Fire payroll expenses to the CRF resulting in capacity in the general fund and by transferring \$2.4 million in general fund from the Housing Pillar.
- d) Emergency Response: \$290,000 net reduction reflects decreases in projected payroll expenses in the general fund \$3.1 million (Police and Metro Health) and decrease in projected supplies of \$3 million. This is offset by charging \$2.5 million in eligible fire payroll expenses, \$1.4 million in eligible residential garbage and recycling resulting from more people staying at home, \$1.3 million in unemployment expenses, and \$590,826 increased code enforcement of the public health orders.
- e) Other Programs: Amount reflects an increase of \$8.3 million in grant funds from the Child Care and Development Block Grant previously received.

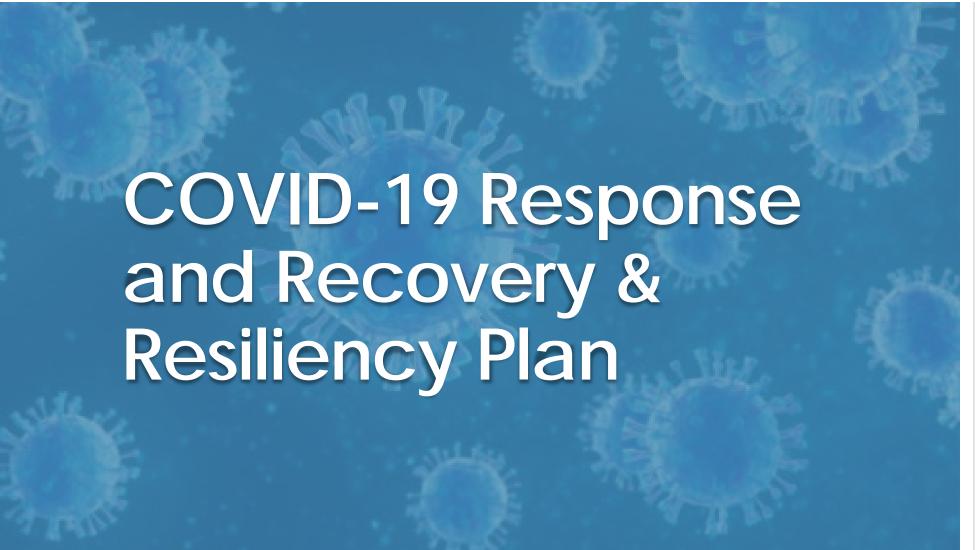

Variance Explanations

- Variance in the spending of Coronavirus Relief Fund resources is the result of the delayed spending in the Emergency Response pillar of the Recovery and Resiliency Plan as described in note 3.
- Variance in the spending of General Fund resources is the result of the delayed spending in the Workforce Development, Small Business and Digital Inclusion pillars of the Recovery and Resiliency Plan as described in notes 5, 6 and 7.
- Variance in the City's Emergency response is primary due to additional Fire payroll expenses that were eligible to be charged based on the recalculation of 3 the cost per call methodology. This additional expense is offset by savings in eligible Health and Police payroll expenses due to deployed employees transitioning back to regular job duties.
- Variance in the Health portion of the Health Implementation Plan is primarily due to savings in the Mental Health Contract with STRAC, Contact Tracing contract as well as vacancies in the Community Health Prevention Team and Congregate Settings
- Variance in Workforce Development spending is due to anticipating that an equal number of participants would be served through the program each month. The initial plan assumed a total of 1,538 residents would be served through October, however, this plan was revised to reflect a ramp up of the program. The revised plan anticipated serving 550 participants through October. In addition, there was also a delay in childcare program enrollments as DHS has only received 114 childcare referrals through November.
- It was anticipated that a total of 20 Train for Jobs SA participants would be enrolled in on-the-job training through October, however, a total of two have 6 been enrolled. The partner agencies are actively working to identify participants interested in the on-the-job training opportunities, as the vast majority of Train for Jobs SA participants have opted for high school equivalency, short-term, and long-term training opportunities.
- The Digital Inclusion variance is due to a purchasing delay resulting from Core Infrastructure and Fiber Connections pricing reviews as well as a timing difference in receiving of infrastructure equipment and mobile devices received in November vs. the planned October arrival.

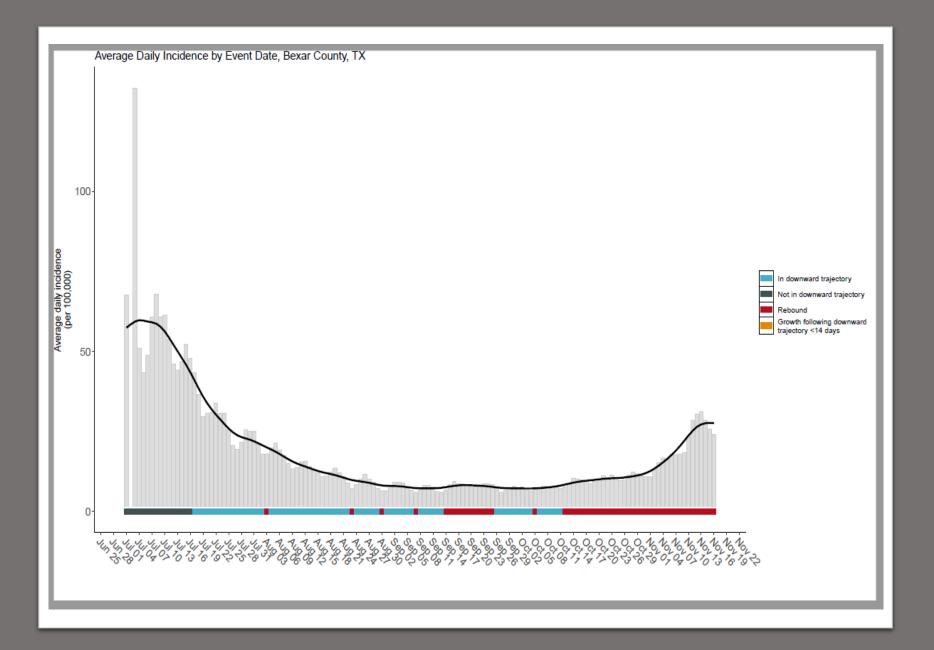

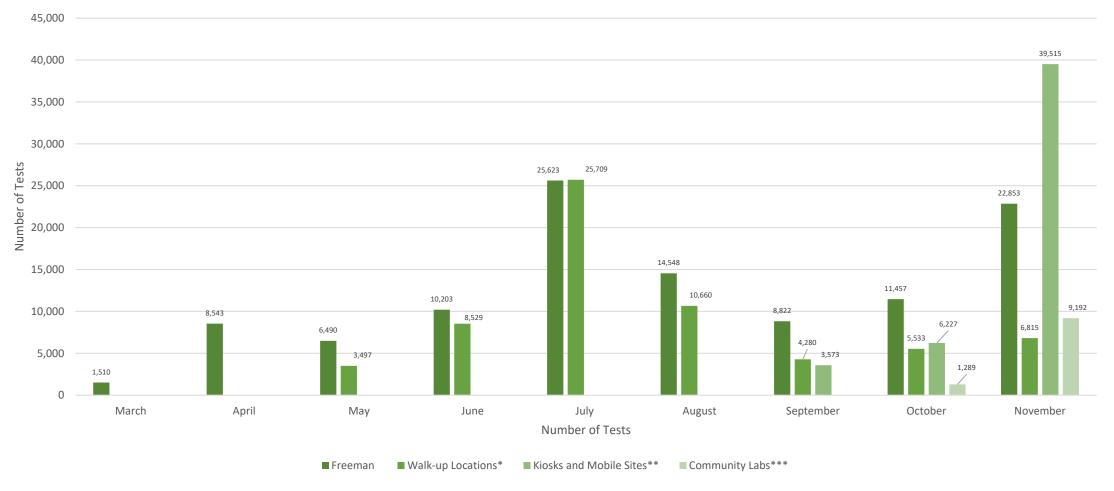

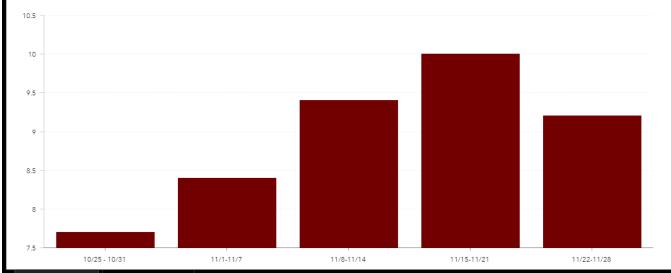

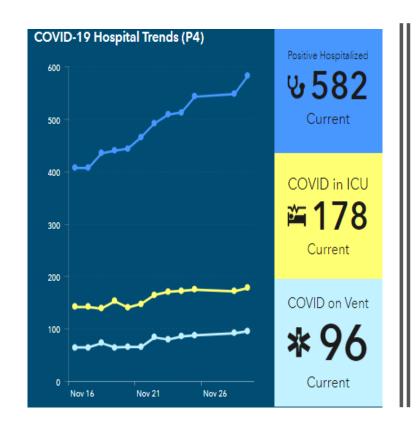

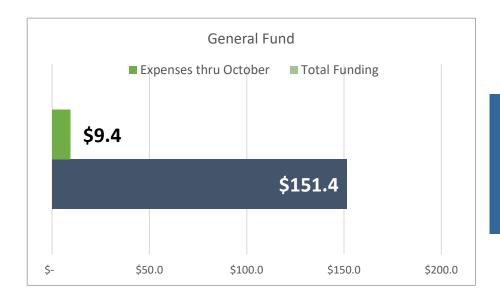
Coronavirus Relief Fund -\$ in Millions

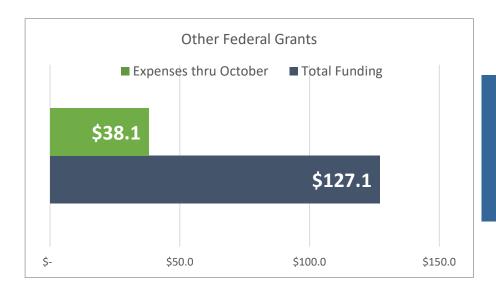

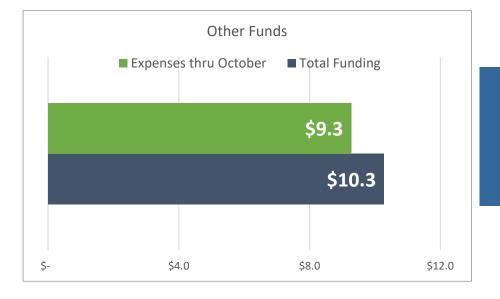

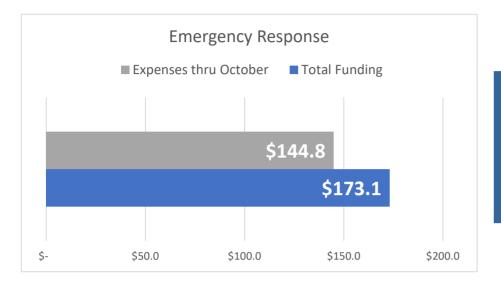

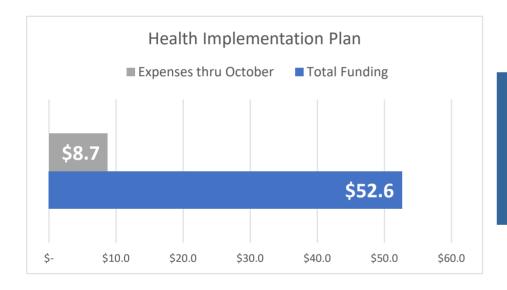

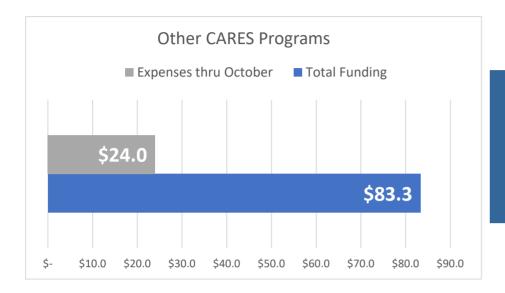
