




Priority 1: Strengthen Texas' Homeless Crisis Response Systems

Homeless Crisis Response Systems, or Continuums of Care, end homelessness through the strategic development of systems based on data-driven solutions. These systems can quickly and efficiently use funding to prevent or divert households out of homelessness.

- HB 1260 (Bowers) & HB 1431 (Campos): Rewriting DSN Bill as a study
- Bill # TBD: Continue TDHCA Homeless Housing and Services (HHSP) Program





Priority 2: Expand Affordable, Accessible Housing Opportunities

Ending homelessness requires housing. Texas must support the development and rehabilitation of more affordable housing if we want to end homelessness.



- SB 265 (West) + HB 1470 (Rodriguez) & HB 886 (Rosenthal): Source of Income protections
- HB 191 (Bernal): Prohibits housing discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity or expression
- Bill # TBD: Eviction-related protections for atrisk Texans, COVID-19 eviction sealing

Priority 3: Targeted, Intersectional Assistance

Recognizing and acting on the disparities particularly affecting people experiencing homelessness/housing insecure folks who are also people of color, LGBTQIA+, immigrants, people with criminal histories, and/or people with disabilities and mental illness. •HB 78 (Reynolds): Diversion programs; the creation of a mental health treatment for incarceration diversion pilot program

•HB 131 (Bernal): The creation of a Medicaid buy-in program for certain low-income individuals through the expansion of Medicaid under the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

•HB 1262 (Bowers): Trauma informed peace officer training



Additional Legislation THN will support:

- Bill HB 874: Relating to the issuance of a certified birth record to a homeless individual
- Bill # TBD: supportive housing created through tax credits
- Bill # TBD: George Floyd Act, other racial justice-oriented bills



Coordinated Entry (CE)

What is Coordinated Entry?

Coordinated Entry (CE) is a process to ensure that all people experiencing a housing crisis have fair and equal access to the system and are quickly identified, assessed, referred, and connected to housing and assistance based on their strengths and needs.





Maximizing Federal Funding

Continuum of Care (CoC) Funding

- San Antonio's FY20 Allocation = \$10.3 million, up 17% since 2016
- Funding for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), Rapid Rehousing (RRH), Transitional Housing, HMIS, Coordinated Entry, and Planning

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Funding

- SARAH facilitates TDHCA's ESG Funding Allocation process, which was \$5 million in 2020
- ESG funders required to coordinate with CoC Lead Agency

Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) Funding

- SARAH awarded largest grant in the nation at \$6.88 million
- After "Demonstration", funding will be renewed through CoC Competition process

Improving our System Performance = More Funding from HUD

Reduce:	Length of time individuals and families remain homeless
Reduce:	Extent to which people who are placed in permanent housing return to homelessness
Reduce:	Overall numbers of homeless individuals and families
Increase:	Jobs and income growth for homeless individuals and families
Reduce:	The number of individuals and families that become homeless for the 1 st time
Increase:	Rate of placement from outreach
Increase:	Exits to permanent housing or retention of permanent housing
