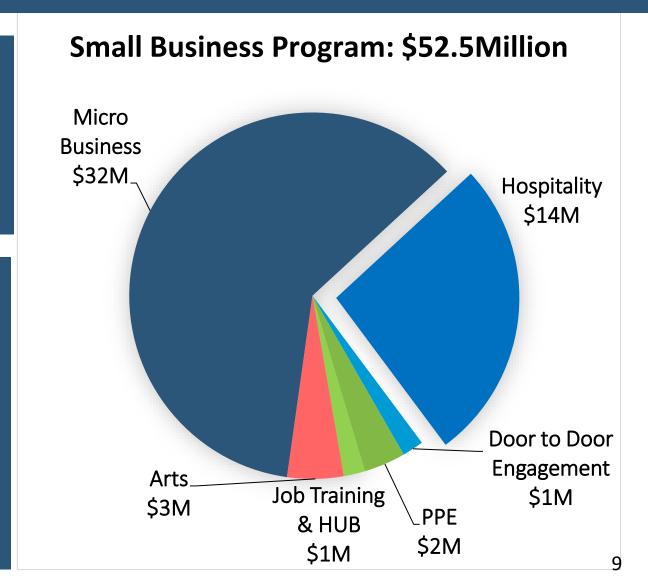

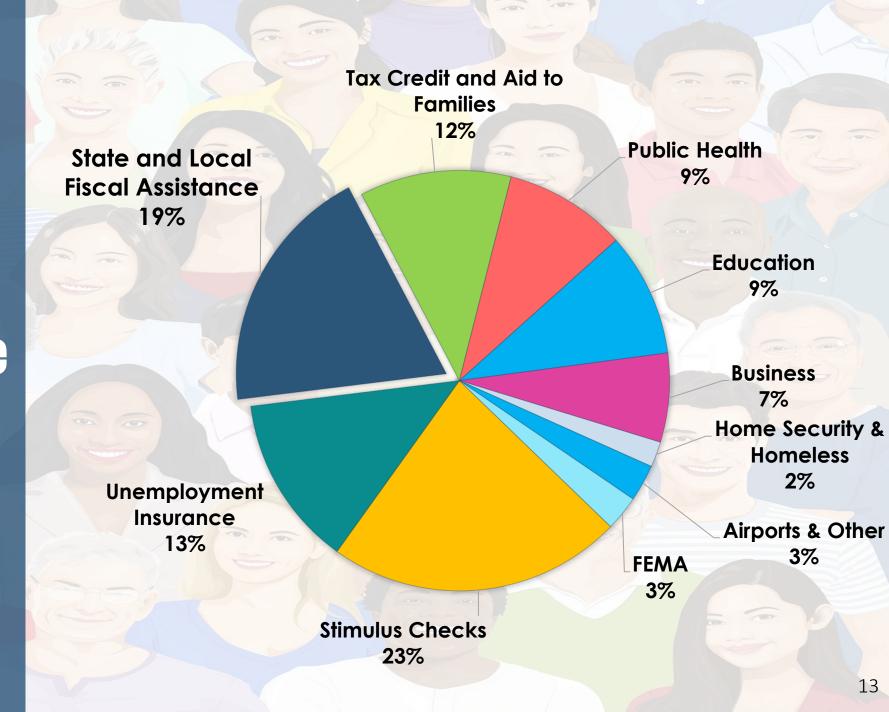

Fiscal Recovery: Uses & Reporting

Eligible Uses

- Providing Government Services to the Extent of Revenue loss
- Responding to the Public Health Emergency and its Negative Economic Impact
- Premium Pay
- Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure

Reporting Requirements

- Quarterly Project and Expenditure Report
- Annual Project and Expenditure Report
- Annual Recovery Plan Performance Report

Loss Revenue due to the pandemic for the Provision of government services

- Infrastructure Maintenance
- Health Services
- Police, Fire, and other public safety services
- Calculation to the extent of revenue reduction as of four points in time in December 31 of 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023

Eligible Uses

Responding to the Public Health Emergency and its Negative Economic Impacts

Public Health Impacts

- New or heightened public health needs
- Behavioral health care
- Improve health and public health programs

Economic Impacts

- Assistance to households and unemployed workers
- Small Business

Disproportionately Impacted Communities

- Investments addressing historical disparities around health and economic conditions
- Greatest flexibility in Qualified Census Tracks

Eligible Uses

Premium Pay City workers or thirdparty employers with eligible workers performing essential work during COVID-19 health crisis

Water, Sewer & Broadband

- •Eligible projects aligned with EPA's Clean Water State Revolving Fund
- •Green infrastructure projects to improve resilience to the effects of climate change

STEPS

- Staff is conducting due diligence on eligibility rules and process for ARPA allocation
- Priority is revenue recovery
- June 16 Trial Budget will include recommendations for use of ARPA funds for Revenue Loss



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
