San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) celebrated the opening of the Trail at the Schaefer Branch Library on July 21 with outdoor activities and a dedicated online webpage.

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DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

Library Director Ramiro S. Salazar participated in the City of San Antonio's United Way Charitable Campaign Steering Committee meeting on July 6.

On July 9, Mr. Salazar attended a Board Meeting for the Local Government Hispanic Network (LGHN).

The Graphics Team created publicity materials for a variety of programs and events during this reporting period, including materials for Back to School, updates for interim service at Forest Hills and McCreless, signage and hours updates, public meeting at Las Palmas, SAPL's Big Red Zine submissions, and Summer Reading.

DIGITAL SERVICES

On July 1 and July 6, Digital Library Services Analyst Tricia Masterson provided LibAnswers training to the LibPicks group. LibPicks is the new online readers' advisory service being offered by San Antonio Public Library.

On July 2, Coordinator of Digital Services Adam Spana and Ms. Masterson met with Mason Humphrey of Bibliotheca to discuss the library's reopening tactics and new Bibliotheca solutions on offer.

On July 7, Mr. Spana met with Library Services Administrator Ron Suszek, Digital Library Services Supervisor Rolf Laun, Catalog Services Supervisor Katie Enright and Interim Coordinator of Technical Services Heidi Novotny and representatives from EBSCO and SirsiDynix to learn about the current and future state of the library's linked data project.

On July 21, Mr. Spana joined his Public Service colleagues for a site visit to the Gilbert Garza Community Center to plan for using the site as a location for interim library service for Forest Hills patrons.

On July 24, Digital Library Services Assistants Christina Hess and Michael Sheehan helped support the Briscoe Western Art Museum's National Day of the Cowboy event. "Come and Take It" kits, courtesy of Central Children's, were given out to visitors of the Kampmann Portal. The kits, plus reading stations set up by the "fluffy, stuffed campfire," brought in over 500 visitors.

During the last week of July, Ms. Masterson worked with Konica Minolta to begin installing new Multifunction Devices (MFD) at all open locations. The new MFDs feature an easier to use, touchscreen interface.

LITTLE READ WAGON

Little Read Wagon (LRW) staff visited 12 parks on the east, west and south side of San Antonio to invite families to participate in summer reading throughout July. Children gleefully selected a book from the book filled red wagon and adults were given information about library services. Staff offered a bubble and chalk play experience at Elmendorf Park as a step toward offering more outdoor play in a socially distanced manner.

Unfortunately, as July progressed COVID-19 virus numbers rose, and staff decided to delay rolling out regular outdoor activities. LRW staff will reevaluate plans for the fall after the school year resumes. In the meantime, staff provide virtual and drive thru event services while serving as a system-wide resource. LRW staff are thinking creatively about how to offer partner schools and organizations support during the continued pandemic. Staff look forward to unveiling the 2021-2022 teacher training and are beginning to plan for February 2022's annual Baby Day event.

Megan Cruz presented virtually to over 250 people during a Voices for Children training on the topic of authentic representation in children's books. Julia Lazarin visited with Pre-K 4 SA families at Southside Lions Park. Clair Larkin and Ms. Cruz presented a virtual More Mirrors, Windows and Doors training to the childcare staff at Navarro Learning Center.

CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

July continued with summer reading program work. In addition to ongoing registration, children were able to pick up a certificate of completion along with a special Summer with SAPL pencil, button, and sticker. July special guests were Dinosaur George, children's singer and song writer Hot Toast, author Kevin Sherry, magician Richard Blake, and Happy Tails exotic animals. Magik Theatre's "Señora Tortuga" was available to stream on demand July 31-August 2. Matt Sandbank Shadow Camp is available online through the end of August. On July 31 children's librarians hosted an online Summerfest Beach Party to

celebrate all the children did throughout the summer. Activities included a dance party, games, and stories.

Children's Take-and-Make kits for July included materials such as sentence strips, construction paper, pipe cleaners, and sidewalk chalk. Suggested activities were making a party hat, bubble wands, and hopscotch. Children's Librarian Shannon Seglin (Central) appeared on KSAT's SA Live to promote the summer program and demonstrate some activities.

The Explore Opera for Kids video series was re-released each week in July. The award-winning series

was leading up to a live outdoor concert in partnership with Opera San Antonio and The Children's Chorus of San Antonio. However, the concert was postponed due to community health conditions.

The San Antonio Food Bank continued a short summer series of new programs. The July Cooking Around the World class focused on Asia and participants made a green tea smoothie. The July Nibble with Willow class for children 3-5 years old and their trusted adults was about stone fruits like peaches.



Coordinator of Children's Services, Cresencia Huff, represented SAPL at the San Antonio Independent School District back to school fair. The event planners expected 2,000 attendees. However, more than 7,000 people came through the Freeman Expo Center in just a few hours. Ms. Huff shared back to school resources and summer program materials.

TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE) / TEEN LIBRARY @ CENTRAL

Due to the library closure, the Teen Library @ Central staff continued to work on a variety of projects and tasks that had system-wide impacts during the month of July.

Virtual Teen Programs and Activities — The 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza (Assistant Manager, Teen Library @ Central) and consisting of Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons from around the system, worked with off-site teen volunteers ("Teen Mods") to host 8 weekly virtual teen programs on Discord ("the server") along with additional activities and events for Teen Summer 2021. Teens requested new channels to chat about Animal Crossing, LEGO bricks, and Star Wars, and shared their own personal projects such as artwork and Twitch streams. Despite its postponement, teens on the server also provided their input and suggestions regarding what activities they wanted to see at the Teen Summer Bash 2021 event planned for August. In total, for Teen Summer 2021 (June and July 2021), the 210teenlibrary Discord server hosted 66 programs with 525 teens in attendance, with 104 new teens joining the server (bringing the total number of teens on the server to 257).

For the 210teenlibrary Instagram page, Regina Almanza (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) has been creating graphics and videos for posts and stories. These items include teen interest content, young adult fiction books, and highlight general library services. Regina will also evaluate and brand teen-created content for posting as well. With behind the scenes prep, Regina assisted in the third Instagram Live presented by a teen, set up by Edward Mayberry (Teen Services Liaison, Guerra). New teen volunteer Neko promoted and displayed the Teen Summer July journaling kit with Mary Lou Bleichwehl

(Teen Services Liaison, Maverick). She then presented a wonderful demonstration of vegan cauliflower buffalo wings, which complimented a series of dragon books she recommended to viewers.

JD Elizondo (Library Assistant, Teen Library @ Central) continues to assist at Igo Library twice a week. He began bringing a music programming component to Igo as an adjunct to the Teen Time there, hosted by Laura Herman (Teen Services Librarian).

Ciana Flores (Library Assistant PT, Teen Library @ Central) continues to engage with teens via the 210teenlibrary Instagram page. Ciana takes both teen and staff content and presents it as posts and stories, as well as creating indirect programming. She continues to participate in Instagram Live videos with Teen Library staff. Ciana has continued to respond to the 3D printing requests from teens on the Discord server. She prints and sends the requested item out to the teens' preferred library branch for pick up. Ciana also records and submits all monthly statistics associated with the 210teenlibrary Instagram account.

Amisarahi Sarabia (SAPL's Teen Outreach Specialist) shares teen-created Spotify playlists on the 210teenlibrary Instagram account weekly and creates weekly Instagram Spotify questions with which teens interact. Amisarahi also joins Matthew to host Music Mondays on the 210teenlibrary Discord server in which teens stream their favorite songs and artists while chatting with friends on the server.

Kathleen Fordyce (Manager, Teen Library @ Central) joins Connie Hejl (Teen Services Librarian, Las Palmas) Thursdays on Discord to host the "Random Fandom" club, where teens engage in discussions about different fandoms that interest them and stream their favorite anime shows. Kathleen also continues to serve as a member of the Teen Services Discord team and the YA Nonfiction workgroup.

Virtual Teen Content and Resources — The 210teenlibrary Instagram workgroup, led by Matthew Loaiza and consisting of Amisahari Sarabia, Ciana Flores, and Regina Almanza, shared information, resources, activities, and other content for teens on Instagram, created by off-site teen volunteers and Teen Services staff. Highlights from the reporting period include recipes for Fourth of July desserts and unicorn cupcakes, a zodiac shirt craft, an informational video about climate change, and a Super Unknown Superheroes booklist.

Virtual Summer Interns – Teen Services at the San Antonio Public Library continued its participation in the Family Service's Paid Summer Internship Program for teens 14 to 17 years old by hosting two virtual interns, supervised by Matthew Loaiza. This year's interns finished their internship at the end of July; throughout the month, they contributed as teen moderators on the 210teenlibrary Discord server, assisted with virtual clubs and activities on the server, created content for the 210teenlibrary Instagram account, and attended a 210teenlibrary Discord workgroup staff meeting. Despite its postponement, the interns planned a significant amount of the Teen Summer Bash 2021 event planned for August by selecting decorations, activities, and swag for the event while collaborating with teens on the server to ask for their input.

Outreach – On July 7, Matthew Loaiza and Dacari Lambert (Teen Services Librarian, Schaefer) provided information via Zoom about Teen Services at the San Antonio Public Library and careers as a librarian for UTSA's Fostering Career Readiness summer program. On July 21, Loaiza also provided information via Zoom about Teen Services at the San Antonio Public Library to the LULAC Upward Bound Math and Science program at McCollum High School. Throughout the month of July, Loaiza and Amisarahi Sarabia (Teen Outreach Specialist) visited several community centers to provide pop-up programs and deliver Teen Summer 2021 materials to teens enrolled in the Parks and Recreation Department's 2021 Summer Youth Program.

Professional Development – On July 27, Matthew Loaiza spoke with San Jose State University - Master of Library and Information Science students enrolled in a "Programming and Services for Young Adults" class via Zoom about Teen Services at the San Antonio Public Library, focusing on how Teen Services has continued to provide library services to teens through Discord and Instagram over the past year.

ADULTS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

July featured the continuation of this year's summer programming Summer with SAPL. Throughout the month, staff at all locations continued to invite adults to participate in Summer with SAPL for adults by setting their own goal, tracking it, and then claiming a gift of a limited edition Summer with SAPL mason jar. Also, in July, as a part of Summer with SAPL, a number of online programs were presented. On July 1st, the library partnered with Tom & Patsy Inglet, two experienced birders, to present an online program on birdwatching. The presenters explained how to identify birds by feature and song. Participants enhanced their bird watching skills and enjoyed the beauty and fun of our feathered friends. On July 24, another session of Experience Good Energy Flow with Chi Kung and Tai Chi Martial Arts was presented by Nameer Kirma from Good Spirit Tai Chi Chu'an. Participants learned to listen to their mind-body connections and understand the martial arts of Tai Chi and the dynamic relationship between internal and external forces. Participants also learned how slow movement exercises improve their posture, breathing, and mindset, and experience reduced tension and stress, and gain muscle tone. Finally, on July 30th, a special Summer with SAPL edition of the monthly online trivia program SAPL Live Trivia was presented. Participants tested their knowledge of topics such as beaches, musical instruments, board and card games, Sherlock Holmes, and dinosaurs. As part of this special edition, the top three winning teams received prizes - such as the board game Trivial Pursuit, a trivia encyclopedia and SAPL branded swag. In addition to all these online programs, the library also offered a Summer with SAPL Take-and-Make in July - this kit was available at all library locations and gave community members the opportunity (and supplies) to make a mini macramé plant hanger.

In July, the library kicked off a three part online program series on cryptocurrency. The first in the series, "What is Cryptocurrency?" was held on July 20th. This session presented the basics of cryptocurrency including what it is, how many currencies there are, and how it works. Two additional sessions, on how to use cryptocurrency and the basics of NFTs (nonfungible tokens) will be presented in August.

On July 30th, the Texana department hosted an online program called Radio Goes to War. This program was presented by Steve Darnall. Mr. Darnall presented the significance of radio during World War II. World War II was the first war in history to receive almost continuous coverage on radio. Mr. Darnall's one-hour presentation examined how radio rose to the challenge of life during wartime, with sounds clips from news broadcasts, presidential speeches, entertainment shows, programs designed to boost morale (both at home and among the armed forces) and more!

CENTRAL LIBRARY CHILDREN @ CENTRAL





The Central Children's department team was very busy in July promoting the Summer with SAPL children's summer reading program. Children's staff paired up with the Teen Library at Central to connect with families as they handed out free lunches and signed up children for the summer reading program. Assistant Manager Shannon Seglin shared information about Summer with SAPL on KSAT's SA Live program. She got children excited about going outdoors and making crafts with natural materials they find outside and encouraged them to sign up for the summer reading program.

The culmination of the Summer with SAPL program for the Central Children's team was the presentation of an outdoor summer party in the Central Library garden. While every member of the team worked hard to prepare and monitor the variety of different activities, the event was coordinated by Librarian Ashley Stubbs. She developed engaging play areas with social distancing and low touch standards in mind. The event featured a story walk with activity tiles, a nature scavenger hunt, contact paper and sidewalk chalk collaborative art invitations, as well as a bubble machine dance zone and hopscotch play! The highlight of the event was offering icy paletas from the charming yellow paleta cart borrowed from the Latino Collection and Resource Center.

Manager Kate Simpson, Ms. Seglin and Ms. Stubbs worked together to present an online live Scavenger Hunt program. Each took turns leading the group in a series of guessing games, "I Spy" hunts and other activities that got the children thinking creatively. Ms. Seglin enriched the program by sending registrants and list of guessing game and I Spy books available from the library.

Ms. Seglin, Ms. Stubbs and Librarian Olivia Escovedo were very active in online Story Times. Ms. Seglin presented several live virtual Toddler Time and Story Time programs. The highlight of the month was her participation in the Summer Fest live event that capped off a summer full of online fun. For this beach party-themed event, she went above and beyond and dressed like a shark and did yoga sea creature poses!

Ms. Stubbs presented several live online Story Time programs and recorded a story for the Dial A Story telephone service. She also recorded a video that premiered on SAPL's YouTube channel. She supported the Tiny Tots weekly program by maintaining their "Books We Love" section of the LibGuide and their curated online programs.

Librarian Olivia Escovedo participated in the live online Story Time program and recorded a Dial A Story as well. She has become a core member of the group of children's librarians facilitating the new Among Us video game program for tweens.

Central Children's staff continued to develop outreach connections with area child care centers. Ms. Seglin presented an outdoor in-person Story Time for children at Creative Kids Day Camp at Temple Beth El. She also held a live virtual Story Time for children at Madison Square Child Development Center and

delivered books in support of their curriculum. Ms. Stubbs made similar book deliveries to Central Christian Day School. Library Assistant Judith Slaughter shared information about the Library and the summer reading program with families attending the Travis Park Movies by Moonlight event.

Ms. Stubbs and Ms. Simpson worked with the coordinator of children's programming for San Antonio College's Eco Centro Nature Buds program. The theme of their education series was pollinators. Ms. Stubbs shared a list of hands-on activities about butterflies, bees and other pollinators, while Ms. Simpson gathered a large selection of children's books on this topic for the teacher to check out.

REFERENCE

Reference completed 206 LibAnswers and 189 LibChats during July; the Department assisted remote patrons with government resources, downloadable assistance, and readers advisory.

Reference partnered with branch staff on 2 articles published in the Texas Library Journal Special Edition: TLA 2021 Contributed Papers issue. The articles were "Critical Digital Literacy in a Public Library in the Time of COVID-19" written by Lorin Flores, Daniel Gonzalez, Cynthia DeLeon, and Marcella McGowan and "Accessibility and Inclusion in a Library eMentorship Program" by Daniel Alejandro González, Lorin Flores, Cynthia DeLeon, Marcella McGowan, and Jordan Torres.

On Thursday, July 1st, 2021, San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) provided an Adult Summer Reading Program called "Bird Watching through Zoom." The program was presented by two experienced bird watchers, Tom and Patsy Inglet; and was co-hosted by Diana Starrett from San Pedro Library and Jordan Torres from Central Reference. They presented in-depth information about bird watching such as what reference guides to use, what bird watching apps are helpful, shared techniques to identify birds, and demonstrated proper binocular use. By the end of the hour-long program participants were so energized by the topic that it was tough to come to a close.

Liz Garza co-hosted the SAPL podcast Escape the Earth (ETE) with Tim Johnson at Igo. They are coming up on their 600th download of the podcast since launching it this year in March. More information about the podcast can be found on the Escape the Earth (ETE) LibGuide.

Pannaga Prasad hosted several Health & Fitness Zoom programs including a "Beginner's Chair Yoga Class" on July 9 and 23rd. Professional Yoga instructor Shari Miller-Gaienne presented seated postures to a family audience. Additionally, Pannaga hosted "Discover Self-Care Through Ayurveda. Yoga for your Doshas" on July 14th with Maggie Grueskin. Ayurveda provides self-care practices, balance and health restoration.

On July 30th, Sally Bauer presented a Zoom program: "Essentials of Nutrition with Keith Thibodeaux;" Thibodeaux is COSA's Health and Wellness expert. They discussed nutrition basics, serving sizes, portion control, and healthy snack tips.

LATINO COLLECTION & RESOURCE CENTER

On July 10, the LCRC, in partnership with the Mexican-American Civil Rights Institute and Bonham Academy, hosted an online discussion with Guadalupe Garcia McCall, author of "All the Stars Denied,"

and historian Dr. Francisco Balderrama. The event explored the hidden history of the forced deportation of Mexican-Americans during the Great Depression.

On July 20, author Daisy Hernández read from her latest book, "The Kissing Bug," and answered audience questions. Participants expressed great interest in Chagas disease, with one attendee writing afterward via email that "her blend of memoir and journalism is the perfect mix for a book like this, not dry but personal."

TEXANA/ GENEALOGY

On July 10, Librarian II Deborah Countess hosted the second class in a virtual, two-part genealogy series on using the FamilySearch.org website to locate digitized historical records. "Finding Your Past Using FamilySearch (Part 2): Buried Treasure" examined some of the less obvious places on this free website where exciting genealogy gems can be found.

Librarian II Matt De Waelsche conducted an in-person program, "Preserving Family Treasures" for two groups at Blues Skies of Texas Air Force Retirement Village on Friday, July 16. There was a combined total of 29 people at both programs. This program was the Department's first in-person event since March 2020 when the pandemic struck.

On July 17, Librarian I Sylvia Reyna conducted a virtual class featuring the Library's subscription database Access Newspaper Archives.

Ms. Reyna also participated in a San Antonio Oasis Older Adult's Life Long Learning virtual presentation highlighting "Remote Resources in Texana/Genealogy" on July 20 along with Karen Sebesta from Landa and Irene Scharf from Igo libraries who emphasized additional SAPL services.

Ms. Countess presented "Getting Started in Genealogy" on July 28 at the main campus of the San Antonio Oasis affiliate of The Oasis Institute, an organization that promotes lifelong learning to older adults. The enthusiastic group had many questions involving family history research, from birth and marriage information to understanding how to use DNA results to further fill-in their family trees.

Librarian I Andy Crews arranged for radio historian Steve Darnall to present a virtual program on July 30, entitled "Radio Goes to War." The program provided an overview of radio coverage surrounding World War II.

On July 31, Texana staff welcomed 11 visitors from the City's Cemetery Stewardship Program under the leadership of COSA's Parks and Recreation Department in partnership with the Office of Historic Preservation (OHP). The presentation provided attendees an opportunity to learn about city cemetery records and related resources available to researchers in the Library's Texana/Genealogy Department, as well as online through various library databases.

BRANCH LOCATIONS

BAZAN

The Bazan Branch library continued as a destination for summer lunches and Snack Paks for children ages 1- 18. Both programs were well received and provided staff with the opportunity to promote SAPL'S Summer Reading Programs.

Children's Librarian Hope Sonnen continued registering kids, letting them know about the many online programs and handing out Take-and-Makes crafts.

Teen Librarian Georgina Garcia welcomed teens visiting the branch with a free summer reading t-shirt and a Take-and-Make kit (journaling kit for the month of July) as well as information about teen summer programming on the library moderated Discord channel.

Teen online programming continued to be popular in the summer months. The well attended *Gaming Club* was hosted by Ms. Garcia and Teen Liaison Cassie Garza (*Saturdays on the 210Teens Discord server*) who also jointly monitored the channel throughout the week providing feedback as well as reference assistance. Teen *Gaming Club* provided teens with a safe space to make positive connections with each other, their club facilitator, as well as the opportunity for them to build their confidence by leading game play and showcasing their own gaming skills.

Virtual Coloring for Grown-Ups, hosted by Library Assistant Enedina Prater, held a mini reunion in July after a month hiatus. Several of the online participants were eager to show off new coloring books, sheets and supplies. A mother and daughter who had been attending the program for three years, but had not been able to attend for a few months, returned making it a great event for everyone.

The Bad Girls Book Club, also hosted by Ms. Prater, celebrated its three-year anniversary in July and chose to read *The Boyfriend Project* by Farrah Rachon. The workplace rom-com takes place in Austin, TX, a setting that most of the group members were familiar with and could make a personal connection to. Book two of the series is coming out in October and the group looks forward to reading it. The group also caught up with Summer Olympics news, making the meeting extra fun with lots of laughs.

BROOK HOLLOW

Brook Hollow Library (BHL) Manager Jeannette Davies hit the ground running as the new manager by meeting with the Friends of Brook Hollow Library (FOBHL) at their quarterly meeting in July. Davies shared a presentation of staff requests for the branch, discussed library philosophy and engaged in a responsive and welcoming conversation. Davies continues to assist at the Collins Garden Library, (CGL), while transitioning to the BHL, through August. Davies hosted Noon Time Helping of Cooking in SAPL's Virtual Kitchen twice in July with the themes Summer Time Tastes and a segment on More TX BBQ. (Registration for August/September programs is available via the online SAPL events calendar. August topics are Back to School/Back to Work Lunches and Crazy Foods. Mexican flare is on the menu in September for Hispanic Heritage Month.

Adults: Brook Hollow Library Adult Services Librarian Marco De Leon continued to host two very popular virtual programs in July. The Among Us and Spyfall virtual programs were at max-capacity and all attendees had plenty of fun playing and interacting with each other. Attendees commented they hoped that the program would continue for a few more months since it's their way of interacting with the

community due to COVID limitations. De Leon and co-host look forward to continuing the program for a few more months.

De Leon hosted the first in-person meetings in almost a year and a half of the two longest running book clubs @ Brook Hollow Library. The Mystery Book Club met to discuss *Just One Evil Act* by Elizabeth George. Members were overjoyed to finally see each other in person again and are looking forward to continuing to meet in person in the coming months. The La Tertulia Book Club also met in-person to discuss *Gothia* by Santiago Castellanos. Due to a couple of members still hesitant to meet in person, De Leon facilitated a hybrid meeting with some members in person and some virtually so all could participate in the discussion. Additionally, De Leon continued to co-host the Science Fiction & Fantasy Book Club as a hybrid meeting with some members virtually and those who meet in-person at the Potranco Branch Library. The group discussed *The Fifth Season* by N.K. Jemisin and also discussed future books to read.

Children: Brook Hollow Library (BHL) families continue to enjoy branch-created Maker Kits and system-wide Take-and-Make kits with arts and crafts supplies for creating together at home. In July, BHL Children's Librarian Jasmin Salinas helped run Game Time Online; Baby Time Online; Tweens Play Among Us; Read to a Dog Online; Toddler Time Online; and Art Club Online for children twelve years of age and younger. During Baby Time Online, parents have given very positive and thankful feedback for continuing the program and sharing song sheets each week. One mom said that every week she posts the song sheet over her changing table to continue singing with her child throughout the week. Salinas also helped with specialized summer programming to celebrate Summer with SAPL including hosting singer *Hot Toast* for a live concert and watch party; facilitating an online Scavenger Hunt; and hosting children's cooking programs Nibble with Willow and Cooking Around the World in partnership with the SA Food Bank.

Salinas also started a passive program for families to enjoy this summer that helps to promote circulation. Families pick up slips of paper to take home and create paper links for every book read. Then, they return their paper chain segment and staff add it to the growing branch paper chain in the children's area. It's created a festive décor to wrap around the room.

Teens: Teen Librarian Julia Pouliot finished her stint as Brook Hollow's interim manager this month with the arrival of Jeannette Davies to the branch. Pouliot would like to thank the staff for all of their help over the past two months, and for providing her with a chance to lead this amazing team. Pouliot co-hosted Teen Time on Discord twice this month. Teen Time is different every week, but always features a way for teens to connect virtually. The teens played Jackbox games and talked energetically about their favorite new internet memes while listening to music together. Pouliot participated in both Racial Equity Training and Radical Leadership Training during the reporting period. From the former she takes away a deeper understanding of the psychology of hiring and racial bias, and from the later, a more comprehensive view of what makes a great leader.

CARVER

Carver branch resumed its summer lunch partnership with the San Antonio Food Bank but noted that the program did not attract as many families as it had during previous summers. At the same time, some families still found the lunches especially helpful. Young people up to age 18 were eligible to receive the lunches. The program was expected to run through August 5.

CPS Energy became a presence at Carver Branch during July. The mobile energy vehicle began making weekly visits, reaching out to community members to discuss ways in which the utility company could offer assistance to customers.

The United Way Write Start Project got a considerable bump from the Carver Community. Visitors stuffed two bags with school supplies to assist underprivileged families send their children back to school.

The branch revived its popular chair yoga class for seniors. The class had been halted by COVID restrictions. Branch staff were happy to see the regulars return for their workout. In addition, facilitator Gloria Simmons introduced a new class, mat yoga, which is growing in popularity.

CODY

The Cody Branch Library was happy to welcome back our regular book and film clubs in the month of July. Staff participated in the "Codylympics", organized by Library Assistants Luanne Bloom and Angela Olivarez, as part of the monthly Wellness activities. Summer Reading continues see new registrations and the branch surpassed 500 children registrations by the end of July.

The branch welcomed three new team members: Natassja Tela and Yamilex Rosales are new circulation attendants, and Trey Tison is the latest addition to the library aides. Library Assistant Haly LeFlore represented the branch at the District 8 Family Fun Night at Chicken N Pickle on July 28, speaking to attendees about library resources and services.

Children's Librarian Kristin Yourdon took part in several system-wide virtual programs during the month of July. On July 1st Yourdon read the book *The Black and White Factory* by Eric Telchin during *Story Time Online*. On July 8th during *Art Club Online* Yourdon played a zoomed in art guessing game where children tried to guess the zoomed in pictures of popular book characters. On July 14th Yourdon co-hosted Kevin Sherry's virtual author visit. During *Story Time Online* on July 22nd Yourdon sang several songs, had children name things that start with the letter T, and practiced the letter T sound with children. Later that day, during *Art Club Online*, Yourdon led the group in a demonstration of stamp painting with children using objects that they found at their homes and in nature to create unique stamp paintings of their own. Finally, on July 29th Yourdon hosted the *Story Time Online* program.

Yourdon and LeFlore put together a beach-themed *I Spy* game for children to play while they were in the library. A beach scene made up of several items made by LeFlore was set up in the display cabinet and children were given a list of several objects to find.



Yourdon and LeFlore also put together two Take-and-Make craft kits to pass out at the branch. The first was a collage kit, where kids could use the provided tissue paper squares to make a collage on paper.

The second was a bubble wrap stamping kit. Kids could use the provided bubble wrap to dip in the paint and stamp on their paper.

The achievement Teen Librarian Amy Rae Weaver was proudest of this month was the training she led for her fellow Teen Librarians and Liaisons, on relabeling Young Adult Nonfiction titles. Her colleagues left the training ready to relabel teen nonfiction titles to reflect their true audience. Weaver has also been working hard to encourage teens to sign up for the annual Teen Summer Program. In addition to providing journaling kits for teens and macramé kits for adults, she created kusudama flower kits that recycle old book pages into beautiful flowers.

In looking ahead to the fall, Weaver established a new schedule of weekly teen and adult programs, to begin in August, and planned the first activities for these upcoming programs. As the branch's Volunteer Liaison, she began accepting volunteer applications and scheduling interviews with interested teens and adults. When volunteers begin training and volunteering in August, they'll be able to choose from a new slate of activities that Amy Rae and her colleagues developed, in order to provide greater variety for volunteers and help to staff. Finally, she assisted with the soft launch of the LibPicks recommendation service and has provided detailed recommendations for patrons looking for new books to read.

Adult

Children's Librarian Ms. Brudi facilitated the monthly Adult Book Club via Zoom in July. The group read the book **Cool Millions** by Jess Walter. Library Assistant Carlos Loera worked with branch manager Jeannette Davies on Noontime Helping of Cooking, a cooking program on Zoom.

Teen

Teen Services Librarian worked with Teen Volunteer to host 4 weekly programs on Discord and 4 weekly programs led by the teen services librarian, for a total attendance of 54 teens, allowing teens to use their imagination, developing their teamwork skills, and spending time engaged in responsible clubs and after school activities. The Clubs Assistant role on the 210teenlibrary Discord server gives teen volunteers the opportunities to develop their planning and decision-making skills and sees their place and having a place of purpose, being depended on by their peers to write the story and facilitate the D&D event. The game also gives the player the opportunity to develop their empathy, sensitivity and friendship skills with their fellow participants.

Children

As part of the Babies and Toddlers Committee, she engaged children during Toddler Time via Zoom and signed up children for Summer with SAPL reading program.

CORTEZ

Manager and All Staff

The Branch continues to partner with the Parks Department to share Nature Smart Library activities. This month the Branch had kits on oceans, rainbows, and beetles and enough kits were provided that the extras were shared with Collins Garden Branch. Branch Manager Cammie Brantley also created a kit on the topic of hummingbirds and included activities for both children and adults. Circulation Attendant

Children

Teens

Children's Librarian Lea Ann McDonald created new book displays featuring art and artists as well as a large, new non-fiction display as well as the facilitator and contributor of the Art Club Online children's virtual program.

Families enjoyed the July Take-and-Make kits, created especially for Encino patrons by Lea Ann. These included: Shapes Process Art, Animal Cut-Out Collage, a Tween Kit—Mosaics and an Intergenerational Kit—Ice Cream in a Bag (quarterly collaborative kit with Assistant Manager Ann Laird).

The Summer with SAPL scavenger hunt/passive program, created by Lea Ann McDonald, was still highly popular with over 75 participants. Ms. Lea Ann has created a variety of prizes since some patrons like to do the scavenger hunt each time they visit. Coming in Fall, a new scavenger hunt will be created for families to enjoy!

A new Story walk was set up for families to enjoy outdoors. Patron feedback has been positive regarding this engaging outdoor activity and changing it every few weeks gives children something new to do each time they visit.

July kicked off at Encino with another popular adult Take-and-Make craft! On July 2nd kits were distributed to make tassel keychains. Children's Librarian Lea Ann McDonald and Adult Services Librarian Ann Laird collaborated to create an intergenerational/family Take-and-Make kit in honor of National Ice Cream Day! Families were able to take home a kit to make their own "Ice Cream in a Bag" – all ingredients and supplies were included except for the cream. Encino also continued the "Spice in Right" program, featuring green cardamom pods in July.

Encino is one of the pilot branches to begin offering in person programming for adults. Happy Tails presented a program this summer, Ms. Menchaca was thrilled to co-host the program. Children were delighted to see a porcupine, a snake, and other exotic animals. Happy Tails employees shared a lot of information about the animals; children were allowed to ask questions.

Magician Richard Blake showed his tricks and magic during a virtual show, Ms. Menchaca was able to cohost. Children were astonished at the magic that Mr. Blake was able to show them.

She created a curated Story Time for the Tiny Tots Committee based on the book "Piggies" by Don and Audrey Wood. On July 16, Ms. Roberts read "The Wheels on the Bus" by Jane Cabrera on Dial-A-Story.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl welcomed Teens back to Maverick, facilitating programs on Tuesdays, assisted by Library Aid Sarina Hackworth and two Teen Volunteers. The first week Bleichwehl set up Ping Pong and Teens enthusiastically crafted the Journal Take-and-Makes provided by Central Teen Services. The remainder of the month Teens chose to compete at Beat Saber, Ping Pong, Apples to Apples, Uno Flip, Uno Avengers and the ever-hilarious Taco Cat Goat Cheese Pizza card game. Bleichwehl, per Teen request, invented an analog version of the popular game Among Us for the last week of July. Three new Teens requested Volunteer Applications and several new Teens have been attending and getting to know others with common interests.


